







THE VILLAGE OF MOUNT PROSPECT CELEBRATES ITS **100TH BIRTHDAY!**

The Village of Mount Prospect officially turns 100 on February 3, 2017 and the Village's Centennial Commission and Special Events Commission are teaming up to bring residents an exciting weekend to mark the anniversary.

On February 3, a number of special events are planned for the community including:

- Dinner specials at many downtown restaurants.
- 7:30 p.m. | Complimentary hot chocolate and cookies provided by the Mount Prospect Lions Club in a heated tent at the Village Green in front of Village Hall.
- 8:15 p.m. | Mayor Arlene Juracek and the Village Board will formally re-dedicate the Village Green as Centennial Green.
- 8:30 p.m. I Unique winter fireworks show, synchronized to music, will be launched from the top of the downtown parking garage. Fireworks sponsored by Randhurst Village.

"This will be a wonderful opportunity for all families, residents and businesses to join as a community to celebrate the 100th birthday and dedicate a lasting memorial to our heritage," explained Juracek. "Fireworks synchronized to music is something we have never done before so it will be really special and fun for the family."

In the weeks to come, watch MPTV for a re-enactment of the founding events including the incorporation vote (sponsored by B&E Accounting and Busse Automotive), the election of trustees and the first trustee meeting. The re-enactments will be

recorded in the recently-restored 1896 Central School using local residents in the portrayal.

On Saturday, February 4, the Special Events Commission invites all Mount Prospect residents and families to honor the past, celebrate the present and embrace the future at the Centennial Celebration Dinner Dance from 6:00 p.m. to midnight at The Cotillion Banquets in Palatine. The evening will include dinner, an open bar and dancing to the Orchestra 33 Band.

State of the Village

As we begin our Centennial year, I am proud to share with you some of our community's successes and achievements in 2016. Our Vision for Mount Prospect is to *Represent the best of suburban communities — thriving, proud, diverse, and connected, having a rich heritage, strong values, and a timeless yet contemporary atmosphere.* I am pleased to report progress this past year towards achieving our future.

Our Village financial position is strong; conservative fiscal practices have resulted in a surplus of more than \$830,000. While using a portion of our reserves to mitigate a tax levy dollar increase, we plan to maintain a sufficient general fund reserve to enable us to weather the State of Illinois financial crisis, which could eventually impact our State shared municipal revenues. Building our fund balances was a factor contributing to a recent reaffirmation of our AA+ bond rating by S&P Global. Sales growth for our Mount Prospect businesses is at record levels, and our sales tax revenues have exceeded property tax revenues for the first time. Our focus on economic development allows for less

reliance on property taxes to fund operations. The Village proportion of the total property tax bill for residents and businesses remains at 12 percent.

Our key commercial corridors are doing exceptionally well. Randhurst Village is more than 95 percent occupied and plans to develop additional retail and restaurant space along Main Street and where the former Chase Bank building is located on Euclid Avenue. Kensington Business Center has experienced substantial growth this year with the addition of the Mount Prospect Ice Arena, Sam's Beauty, Northland Laboratories and others, bringing vacancy rates in the center down to single digits. Overall industrial vacancy across the Village now stands at 3.7%, down from 14% in just two years. We are advancing a more proactive approach to economic development to ensure investors choose Mount Prospect for their business ventures.

A series of recent and proposed annexations in the southern area of Mount Prospect are allowing for life safety service consolidation to enhance Police and Fire/Paramedic services. The annexations, which will eventually include the United Airlines campus, also enhance the Village's Equalized Assessed Valuation (EAV). This aids in reducing the tax burden on existing Village property owners. The planned annexations will add over \$50 million in EAV to the Village, an overall increase of 3.5% for the Village. Newly annexed properties add to our overall economic base by capturing new sales and property taxes. In turn, we strengthen and improve services to those newly incorporated areas at minimal additional cost - resulting in more complete and efficient operations for key service providers, including our police and fire departments.

We have a refocused strategy for downtown revitalization. The recent dissolution of Downtown Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District #1, established in 1985, resulted in \$18.6 million of new real estate value being released to taxing districts such as School Districts 57 and 214. Properties redeveloped in TIF District #1 have increased their EAV 620%, compared to an overall Village increase of 2.6%. However, redevelopment opportunities still exist throughout downtown, which would be captured in the creation of the new Prospect and Main downtown TIF. This will be considered by the Village Board in January 2017. The demolition and environmental clean-up at Central and Main was a major step in our efforts to complete the foreclosure process and begin redevelopment activities; this key site would be included in the proposed Prospect and Main TIF. The Village has been a judicious steward in the administration of its TIF and its value creation demonstrates how tax increment financing can be a vital economic development tool.

The Mount Prospect Entrepreneurs Initiative (MPEI), a joint effort between the Village, Library, Chamber of Commerce and Downtown Merchants Association, celebrated its one-year rebranding anniversary in 2016. The program, which was honored with a bronze award for Entrepreneurship programs from the International Economic Development Council in 2016, provides support, advice and direction to entrepreneurs in our community. It has grown significantly since first established in 2012. The success of MPEI is demonstrative of the Village's enthusiasm and support of our small business owners.

We are looking forward to a very productive 2017. We have built a high performing team and our organization is positioned to advance our quality of life through adaptive leadership and leading edge customer service. We know that the keys to continued growth are continuing financial stewardship, building and supporting a diverse business community, open communications with businesses, residents and other governmental entities, and an unwavering commitment to enhancing the quality of life for all who live and work in Mount Prospect. We are proud of our 2016 accomplishments and are confident our path leads toward continued success in 2017.



2017-2018 Vehicle Stickers

Residents should look for a renewal notice in the mail during the first week of February 2017 for Mt. Prospect vehicle stickers. The deadline for displaying the stickers will be April 30, 2017. If you had a 2016-2017 vehicle sticker and do not receive a renewal application in the mail, you are still required to purchase and display a sticker by the due date. Vehicle stickers purchased after April 30 are subject to a late penalty payment. The penalty does not apply to new residents/businesses or to those who have purchased vehicles after

May 1; in these situations, there is a 30-day grace period in which to purchase a sticker. Stickers may be purchased online at www.mountprospect.org or at the Finance Department in Village Hall, 50 South Emerson Street.

The deadline for displaying the 2016-2017 vehicle sticker was April 30, 2016. The Police Department may issue citations to drivers of locally registered vehicles if a current vehicle sticker is not displayed. For more information, please call the Finance Department at 847.392.6000.

Water Rate Increase

The Village Board recently approved a 4% increase to water and sewer utility rates for 2017. Effective with all billings after January 1, 2017, the new combined rate will be \$10.97/thousand gallons, an increase of \$.42/thousand gallons. Based on a Mount Prospect household that uses 8,000 gallons of water during a one-month billing period, the monthly water and sewer usage fee will be \$92.76, an increase of \$3.36; this includes the \$5.00 monthly sewer construction charge. There was no change in the sewer construction flat fee.

Fire Department

Extreme Weather

Unpredictable and extreme winter weather can provide a number of health and safety hazards both inside and outside your home. Here are some tips to keep you and your family safe this winter.

Fireplace Safety

Keep Fireplaces Clean

- Have your chimney thoroughly cleaned and inspected at least annually.
 Make sure that the flue is carefully inspected both inside and out.
- Burn only hard woods as they contain smaller amounts of creosote, a black tarry substance that can block passageways and/or easily ignite.
- Put cool ashes in a metal container when you clean out your fireplace.

Safely Burn Fuel

- Never leave a fire in your fireplace unattended.
- Burn only seasoned firewood.
- Never burn paper, charcoal or rags.
- When using artificial logs, burn only one at a time.

Protect Your Home

- Keep flammable and combustible articles at least three feet away from the open fire.
- Make certain that your smoke detectors are working.
- Always use a fireplace screen in front of your fireplace.
- Supervise children at all times when using your fireplace.

Space Heaters

If certain rooms in your home are not well served by your furnace and you utilize a space heater, be sure to carefully follow these safety procedures:

- Look for a space heater equipped with a guard around the heat source to keep children and pets safe.
- Select a heater approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory.
- Follow manufacturer instructions for proper use and safety measures.
- Only use space heaters in well-vented areas and at least three feet away from any objects such as curtains, clothing or furniture.
- Always place a space heater on a flat, level surface.
- Do not use an extension cord to power the space heater.
- Use K-1 kerosene only for kerosene space heaters (do not use gasoline, camp stove fuel, or any other flammable liquid).
- Store all fuel outdoors. Never refuel the heater inside the home.
- Never leave a space heater unattended or on overnight.
- Never place objects on the space heater to dry.

Keep a Clear Path

When the snow flies, please help us out by ensuring the fire hydrant near your home or business is kept free from snow on all sides. Please keep a clear path from the street to the hydrant as well. Unimpeded access to a fire hydrant can make a huge difference in our ability to control a fire.

Reminders for Drivers and Pedestrians

The Police Department would like to remind drivers of their lawful obligations when approaching pedestrians in marked or unmarked crosswalks:

- Drivers must stop their vehicles to allow pedestrians in any marked or unmarked crosswalk to walk across the roadway safely when the pedestrian is on their half of the roadway or so close from the opposite half to be a danger.
- A driver of a motor vehicle approaching from the rear may not pass another vehicle stopped for a pedestrian in a crosswalk.
- Whenever stop signs or red flashing lights are in place at an intersection or at a crosswalk in between intersections, drivers will give the right of way to pedestrians.
- When signs are posted warning of pedestrians, bicyclists, or school crossings, drivers must exercise greater caution and be aware of the presence of people crossing the roadway.

Also, the Police Department reminds pedestrians and bicyclists of their lawful responsibilities:

- Bicyclists on the roadway must follow the rules of the road like any
 motor vehicle including stopping at stop signs and traffic lights,
 stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks, and using the right hand side
 of the roadway.
- Pedestrians and bicyclists using marked or unmarked crosswalks at intersections controlled by traffic signals must follow the walk and don't walk signals.
- Pedestrians and cyclists using marked or unmarked crosswalks at locations not controlled by traffic signals or stop signs may not walk, ride, or run off a curb or place of safety into the path of a moving vehicle which is so close as to present an immediate danger.
- Pedestrians and bicyclists are reminded to look for traffic in every direction as they cross any roadway to increase their safety as they cross.

Being a *Nosey* Neighbor

When people hear someone say they have a *nosey* neighbor, it is usually thought of as a bad thing. But is having a *nosey* neighbor all that bad? With the majority of residential burglaries taking place during the daytime while most people are out of their homes, we need to rely on those neighbors to watch out for us. Our neighborhoods could benefit from everyone being a little more nosey and calling 911 whenever they see or hear any suspicious people or activity.



Don't Leave Your Car Running

During the winter months many residents start their vehicles and let the engines run while sitting in the driveways or parking lots unattended. Last year several cars were stolen or taken for a joyride. This behavior is not only dangerous but also illegal regardless if the car is locked or not. You can also be held responsible in civil court for damages or injuries if your car is taken and involved in an accident. The bottom line is, never leave your car running unattended.

Winter Driving Tips

Winter driving can be dangerous especially on slick roads when visibility is low. Please consider these suggestions for safe travel:


- Keep your gas tank full
- Reduce glare and reflection to help with visibility by NOT using high beam headlights during a snowstorm
- Completely clean all ice and snow from windows before driving
- When ice or snow are present, allow for more space between you and the car in front of you; pump brakes slowly and gently to prevent skidding
- Allow for more travel time
- Be aware that bridges and less utilized roads will freeze more quickly than main roadways
- If you are involved in a minor accident, attempt to relocate your vehicle before exiting
- Remain a safe distance behind snow plows and do not pass while they are plowing or salting
- Of course, follow all driving laws buckle up, turn headlights on when windshield wipers



Mailboxes Damaged by Snow Operations

Residential mailboxes that are damaged during Village snow and ice control operations are eligible for repair or replacement under the mailbox replacement policy. Examples of damage that demonstrate eligibility for replacement may include a resident's mailbox that is struck by a Village snowplow or equipment and other snow-related impact from Village snow and ice control operations.

Upon notification of damage, the Village will verify eligibility and provide residents with a temporary, barricade-mounted mailbox until weather permits repairs or replacement. If the damaged mailbox is identified as beyond repair by the Village, then the resident is provided with two methods for replacement:



Option 1 — Village Replacement

Replacement by the Village will include a wood post with post anchor stake and a standard black or white steel mailbox in compliance with Village Code. Image below represents the mailbox that will be installed. Residents that prefer to have a different style mailbox will need to install the mailbox on their own.

Option 2 — Resident Replacement

Residents have the option to replace their own mailbox and are eligible to receive up to \$125 in reimbursement. To be eligible, the mailbox must be installed according to specifications defined in the Village Code.

Holiday Light and Extension Cord Recycling Program

The Village is accepting unused and non-working holiday string lights and extension cords to be recycled free of charge. The materials will be reclaimed and reprocessed into new products; most importantly they will be kept out of landfills.

Residents can drop off their unwanted string lights and extension cords at the Public Works Department, 1700 West Central Road between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday - Friday. The program tentatively ends April 3. Call 847.870.5640 for more information.

The Village cannot accept garland, live greens, wreaths, or other non-recyclable materials.

2017 Comprehensive Plan Update

The Village of Mount Prospect is updating our Comprehensive Plan and your input is of great value in the process. A Comprehensive Plan sets goals, policies and strategies for addressing a wide range of issues in a community, including growth, mix of uses, facilities and service needs, mobility, community character, quality of life, economic vitality, health, recreation, and environmental conservation. While not a legal document, the Plan creates a road map for the future of our community. Originally adopted in 1965, the Plan undergoes periodic review with the most recent taking place in 2007.

Village Code Updates

The Village Board recently approved updates to several chapters of the Village Code.

The updates were needed to better address current development trends, resolve code conflicts, and to make the regulations easier for the public to understand. The updates to the zoning and sign codes specifically were comprehensive in nature and included the following:

Sign Regulations (Chapter 7)

The sign regulations were revised to address the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in the Reed v. Town Gilbert. The ruling prompted staff to initiate a thorough review of its sign code to ensure that it does not violate constitutionally protected free speech.

Zoning (Chapter 14)

Notable changes included the allowance for brighter parking lots, the addition of a *Unique Use* to the Land Use Table for uses not currently in existence or defined in our code, and bringing driveway and parking pad regulations in line with current development trends. The landscape requirements were simplified without reducing the amount of landscape required and prohibited and recommended plant lists were reintroduced.

Tips to Keep Your Home Healthier During the Winter Months

Here are some tips to keep you and your home healthier during the ever-changing conditions of Chicagoland winters.

- Ensure that duct work for exhaust fans that vent through the ceiling is routed to the exterior of the home and not inside your attic. This will keep moisture out of your attic and reduce chances of ice dams and moisture related damage.
- Make sure that you run the fan during, and for 10-15 minutes after your shower to reduce moisture.
- Run your kitchen exhaust fan while cooking.
- Purchase a hygrometer

(humidity gauge) to measure the humidity level in your house. According to the North Dakota State University, recommended maximum levels of humidity in

- the winter is 30-40 percent in cold climates.
- Check your roof for ice dams after heavy snows and especially after several days of freezing. Ice dams are caused by warm and dry air leaking from inside a home into the attic space or roof overhangs, and can damage a roof surface or cause water leaks into the home. The warm air melts the snow on the roof which then drains along the roof and freezes when it crosses a cold roof overhang. An ice dam is created and may continue to increase in size as the process repeats.
- Do not attempt to remove snow from the roof yourself. Contact a licensed roofer to remove the snow and repair your exhaust fan ductwork so that it exhausts to the exterior of the home.

Upcoming Appointments Needed for Senior Citizens Programs

The Call Check Program initiates a well-being check by phone during extreme weather conditions for individuals without family or friends to check on them. This program starts when extreme weather conditions occur: frigid temperatures or when heat indexes over 105 degrees exist or during power outages expected to last an extended period of time. Conditions must be widespread so that the Village is aware of the problem.

Senior Assessment Program

Homebound seniors who are

finding it difficult to remain in their homes due to a variety of circumstances can contact the Human Services Department for a free private assessment in their home by a social worker and nurse to receive resources to improve their situation.



Mount Prospect Medical Reserve Corps
