Prestige Feed Products to Cease Manufacturing in Mount Prospect by December 31, 2025

The Facility Will Be Allowed to Manufacture Under Limited Hours

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

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COOK COUNTY, IL— The Village of Mount Prospect (“**Mount Prospect**”), the City of Des Plaines (“**Des Plaines**”), and Prestige Feed Products, LLC (“**Prestige**”) agreed to settle all disputes between them.

As part of the settlement agreement, Prestige has agreed to cease manufacturing operations at its facility at 431 Lakeview Court, Suite A, in Mount Prospect by December 31, 2025. Prestige will also reduce its manufacturing hours from 84 to 53 per week. The only manufacturing hours allowed are the following:

- Monday evening through Friday morning: 8 p.m. to 7 a.m.
- Friday: No operations after 7 a.m.
- Saturday: No operations
- Sunday: 10 p.m. to Monday morning at 7 a.m.

Until Prestige ceases manufacturing, it will continue to be subjected to rigorous third-party monitoring.

The Village published the fully executed settlement agreement on its Prestige-dedicated landing page on Mount Prospect’s website within the [Community Information and Fact Check Portal](#). The parties have agreed to limit their comments about the settlement to the press releases and the statements in this agreement. When it comes to previously commissioned reports and, if necessary, tests related to those reports, the Village will make those reports available to citizens in accordance with the Illinois Freedom of Information Act, 5 ILCS 140/1 *et seq.*

*“The Village, the City, and Prestige were looking at a trial date that would take the parties into October with potential appeals after that,” said **Mount Prospect Village Manager Michael Cassady**. “This agreement gives everyone certainty on an end date, allows for limited manufacturing hours including limited weekend hours through the*

summer, mitigates the risk of trial for both sides, gives Prestige the ability to determine its next steps, and saves our taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars in litigation and litigation-related costs.”

*“The City deeply appreciates our partnership with the Village in this litigation,” said **Des Plaines Mayor Andrew Goczkowski**. “Both municipalities engaged in the litigation to protect the quality of life of our residents. I am pleased that this intergovernmental collaboration has led to a beneficial resolution. I thank our residents for their patience and understanding during this process.”*

The Court will continue to have jurisdiction during the remainder of Prestige’s manufacturing operations.

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
