








# MOUNT PROSPECT CELEBRATION OF CULTURES

The inaugural Mount Prospect Celebration of Cultures will take place on September 29th between the hours of 11 am to 7pm, at Kopp Park, located just behind RecPlex, 420 Dempster Street. The Mayor and Village Board recognize the value of our diverse population and established a celebration of our diversity as a top priority in the strategic plan. A high priority on the Village's strategic plan has been a way to celebrate the diversity in our population. As a result, the Mount Prospect Celebration of Cultures has been planned as a commemoration to honor the many diverse populations that live side by side in the Village.

The Mount Prospect Celebration of Cultures is a partnership between the Village, the Mt. Prospect Park District and the Chamber of Commerce and will feature entertainment, cultural booths, craft fair and food from around the world. The day will begin with a parade of cultures. Each Mount Prospect culture represented will march in native garb and carry the flag of their country. Each group will come up on stage and introduce themselves in English and their native tongue.

There will be a day long line up of cultural entertainment featuring bands, singers, dancing groups and other cultural performances. Cultural booths manned by residents will feature each participating group and allow residents to learn about other



fair trade crafts from a variety of countries. Local ethnic restaurants will offer tastes from around the world and there will also be a beer tent selling a number of foreign brews.

# **Permits**

It is very common for residents to question the need for permits for work being done on their home. The fact is, avoiding the permitting process is not only a direct safety hazard for you, your family, and even your neighbors, it can also adversely affect the value of your home.



The Village specifically requires permits on any project that involves structural items, gas, electricity, and/or water for our community safety. This includes items like water heaters, furnaces, air conditioners and generators.

As part of the permitting process, inspections are required to ensure that your contractor performed the work and/or installed your new mechanicals correctly.

Without minimizing the importance of public safety, permits are also essential to protecting the value of your home. For instance, if you install a gas fireplace without a mechanical permit and your house burns down because of faulty installation, your insurance may not cover the damage.

Further, when it comes time to put your home on the market, permits and inspections can help validate your home's value. If the sellers can't substantiate that the work was done with permits, the appraiser might not give full value for the improvements. If the house doesn't appraise for the sale price, your sale could be in jeopardy.

# Inspection Services

## Be Aware of Construction and Home Repair Scams

According to the Illinois Attorney General's Office, unscrupulous home repair contractors try to gain the confidence of home owners with common techniques such as attempting to frighten you with claims that your house has health concerns or code violations. They may also say they will work with your insurance company or offer you a *free* roof inspection or furnace cleaning. We urge you to be cautious of actions like these, particularly any offer of free services.

The Attorney General's Office recommends avoiding a home repair contractor that:

- Contacts you or comes to your home uninvited
- Tells you that your safety is in danger if you do not conduct repairs immediately
- Pressures you to sign papers or contracts before you are ready to do so
- Offers to drive you to your bank
- Drives an unmarked vehicle
- Asks you to pay for your entire project, or a large portion of the work, up front

If a construction company won't put its promises in writing, look for a company that will. Here are some easy ways to check the complaint history on construction contractors.

- Contact the Better Business Bureau
- · Check Angie's List
- Check local references; get at least 3
- Google the contractor's name and the officers of the company
- Check with the Illinois Attorney General's office

# Did You Purchase a Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for purchasing 2018-2019 vehicle stickers was April 30th. The Police Department may issue citations to owners of locally registered vehicles in which the current sticker is not displayed. If a citation is issued for not having the current sticker, the recipient may have to pay a fine, the basic cost of the new sticker, and the late purchase penalty. The penalty will not initially apply to new Village residents or to residents who have purchased new vehicles after May 1. In these limited cases, residents have 30 days to purchase a sticker in person at Village Hall, as proof of purchase or move-in date is required to assure that a penalty is not imposed. Residents who change vehicles after having purchased a 2018-2019 vehicle sticker should contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee. # Pocket Park Coming to Downtown

The Village is in the process of developing the Edwin and Elsie Meyn Busse Pocket Park at the northeast corner of East Busse Avenue and South Emerson Street, and is seeking your input. To date the Village has purchased two parcels of land at 19 and 21 South Emerson Street, removed existing homes, and then hired an architectural design firm, Altamanu, Inc.

Altamanu held a pop-up activity at the recent Block Party and will hold a public design meeting in mid-September followed by an open house in late October. At these meetings, the firm is seeking public input and consensus on the proposed park design. Village staff has already gathered preliminary public input at the Talk & Chalk held at Centennial Green in mid-July.

# South Mount Prospect Sub-Area Plan

The South Mount Prospect Sub-Area Plan is a long range planning document covering the portion of Mount Prospect that is south of Golf Road. Since its completion in 2009, a number of recommendations have hinged on the development of the Metra STAR line, a proposed train line designed to connect the outer Chicago suburbs with each other. This project is no longer moving forward, thus the Village is looking to revisit the Sub-Area plan. The update will also evaluate how the areas that were recently annexed into the Village can be enhanced to improve the community.

To date, the village has held an open house, and participated in several village-wide events to gather public input for the update. # FALL LEAF COLLECTION | October 15th thru November 30th

The Village's fall loose-leaf (not bagged) collection program provides residents a convenient method to dispose of leaves at no cost. The program allows residents to set out loose leaves to be picked up by Public Works at the curb on scheduled collection days between Monday, October 15th and Friday, November 30th.

The loose-leaf collection program is for leaves only; leaf piles will not be collected if the pile contains grass clippings or other yard material. Yard material other than leaves must by disposed of according to the Village's yard waste collection guidelines that can be found at mountprospect.org/departments/public-works/solid-waste/yard-waste. Please visit the Village's website for more information on leaf collection and a map identifying the collection schedule.

Please rake leaves onto the pavement one foot from the curb line one day prior to the scheduled collection day. Do not rake leaves into the street after the truck has passed your home. The machines travel each street weekly during the collection period, but only once on each side.

Burning leaves in Mount Prospect is a violation of Village code and in not allowed under any circumstances.

# Caring for Your Trees in Fall

Fall is just around the corner, and soon the leaves will be changing color. Although we're coming to the end of the growing season, trees still need care to make sure they go into dormancy on a healthy note. Following these easy tips can help ensure your trees are healthy when they leaves return in spring.

The first thing to note that trees still need to receive adequate water though the fall. Generally an inch of rainfall per week will take care of this, but during extended dry periods, supplemental watering is essential. You can do this by running a sprinkler under the canopy of the tree keeping in mind that the roots can extend out as far as the trees is tall, and this entire area should be watered.

We recommend that you place mulch around the base of the tree to help retain soil moisture and keep the ground from freezing, allowing more time for roots to grow. Wood chips are a great and natural material to use as mulch. A 2"-3" layer of mulch will help reduce weeds, allowing you to keep weed whips and lawn mowers away from the trunk of the tree. Mulch should not be piled up against the trunk of the tree, but rather be placed at ground level right next to the trunk.

Fall can be a good time to fertilize trees that are lacking nutrients. Timing is important to prevent a flush of new growth that will not be hardened off prior to freezing temperatures. If not completed in September, wait until the tree has gone into dormancy in late November. Should you miss the optimum window of time, fertilization can be done in spring.

Use the fall to evaluate trees for insect damage or pruning needs. Most insect damage occurs earlier in the season but some control measures require treating in fall before the growing season to get the best results. The life cycle of most insects differ, so a tree care professional should be consulted if significant damage is noted.



Finally, fall can be a great time to get a dormant prune scheduled.
Removing dead and broken limbs can help improve the health of the tree, as well as reducing

overwintering insects and fungi, and removing fallen leaves, fruit, and other tree debris from the landscape can help reduce foliar diseases the following season.

# Mercury Thermometer/Thermostat Recycling

The Village and the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC)

are proud to offer residents a recycling program for mercury-containing thermometers, thermostats and wall switches.

Because mercury poses health and environmental risks, mercurycontaining products should be

recycled whenever possible. Old thermometers contain up to 700 milligrams of mercury, 140 times more than a CFL.

Residents may bring their mercury thermometers, thermostats and wall switches to Mount Prospect Public Works Department at 1700 West Central Road, between 7:30 am and 5:00 pm on weekdays.

Storm drains and roadside ditches lead to our inland lakes, streams, rivers and Lake Michigan, which means that any motor oil, pet waste, leaves, grass clippings, or dirty water from washing your car that enters a storm drain gets into our water without being treated. For this reason, never dump motor

oil, chemicals, pet waste, dirty or soapy water, or anything else down the storm drain or into a ditch. Pollutants like this that get into our lakes and rivers through storm drains can poison fish, birds, and other wildlife, and can find their way into drinking water supplies. Dirt, litter, branches and grass clippings can also



clog storm drains and cause flooding. Be sure to report anyone dumping materials into a storm drain or ditch to Village officials.

# Ten Things You Can Do to Prevent Water Pollution

- 1. Sweep up driveways and sidewalks instead of hosing them with water.
- 2. Never dump anything down a storm drain or into a ditch.
- 3. Plant bare spots in your yard.
- 4. Compost your yard waste.
- 5. Use fertilizers sparingly and avoid pesticides.
- 6. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces.
- 7. Take your car to a car wash instead of washing it in the driveway.
- 8. Check cars for leaks and recycle motor oil.
- 9. Pick up after your pet.
- 10. If you are on a septic system, have it inspected and pumped regularly.

# Fire Department

The Mount Prospect Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) for Fire Prevention Week 2018 this October 7th through the 13th. This year's theme is: *Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere*.

In a fire, seconds can mean the difference escaping safely or tragedy. This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign works to educate residents about three basic but essential steps that can help prevent fires in the home, and how to escape safely in the event that one should occur.

- **LOOK** for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home, identify potential fire hazards, and take steps to eliminate them.
- LISTEN for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes
  to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Have everyone meet at a
  pre-arranged spot outside your home. The spot should be a safe distance
  from the home.
- **LEARN** two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

In conjunction with Fire Prevention Week, the Mount Prospect Fire Department will once again be conducting its annual Poster Contest for students in Kindergarten through 5th grade. All Mount Prospect schools have been given the guidelines for the contest and we encourage all students to participate in this educational activity. # Change Your Clocks, Change Your Batteries

The end of Daylight Savings Time is November 4th. Remember to change your smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector batteries while changing your clocks.

### Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms save lives. According to the National Fire Protection Association, smoke alarms that are properly installed and maintained play a vital role in reducing

fire deaths and injuries. Three of every five home

fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. If there is a fire in your home, smoke spreads quickly and a working smoke alarm will give you time to get out.

Follow these important tips to keep your smoke alarms functioning properly

• Install new batteries at least twice a year and immediately if the low battery signal chirps on your alarm.

- Test smoke alarms every month.
- Choose a device that bears the label of a recognized testing UL laboratory.
- Install smoke alarms on every level of the home, outside all sleeping areas and in every room where people sleep.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Replace smoke alarms every 10 years and carbon monoxide detectors every five years. An easy way to remember is to write the install date on the base of the device.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.

Residents who have purchased a smoke alarm, and are in need of assistance with installation should contact the Fire Prevention Bureau at 847.818.5253. The Fire Prevention Bureau can also inspect existing smoke alarms to verify they are working properly.

# Halloween Fire Safety Tips

According to the National Fire Protection Association, taking these simple safety precautions can prevent fires this Halloween.

- When choosing a costume, make sure fabrics and decorative materials are flame-resistant and stay away from long trailing fabric.
- Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper catch fire easily. Keep all decorations away from open flames and other heat sources like light bulbs and heaters.
- Use a battery-operated candle or glow-stick in jack-o-lanterns.
- If using real candles, remember to *Candle with Care* and keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.

With Halloween just around the corner, here are some tips to help your little vampires and princesses enjoy a safe celebration.

- Do your trick-or-treating during the Village's stated hours of 3 pm to 8 pm.
- If your kids will be out after dark, avoid dark colored costumes. If costumes are
  dark, be sure your children carry a flashlight, glow stick, or reflective belt so
  they are visible to drivers.
- Avoid wearing masks that restrict vision; use face paint if possible.
- Make sure kids trick-or-treat in groups; have an adult tag along for extra safety.
- When crossing streets, only use crosswalks; instruct the kids to never walk from between parked cars.



- For all of the drivers in town, take extra caution on Halloween; drive a bit slower and keep a watchful eye out for excited monsters and superheroes who might try to run across the street without looking.
- Mom and dad should do a safety check on all of the candy and treats that the kids bring home.

# Phone Scams on the Rise

The incidence of scams perpetrated over the phone continues to rise across the country. One scam we see frequently targets our senior citizens, and is often called the *Grand-parent Scam* or *Money for Bail* scam. The scammer calls during the overnight hours and claims to be the victim's grandson or granddaughter. The scammer will prey on the grandparents' concern by stating that they have been involved in a serious traffic accident in another state or have been arrested and need money. The callers asks for hundreds of dollars to be sent or wired to them to get them out of trouble.

The Mount Prospect Police Department wants to remind everyone of these practical steps to prevent being victimized by this type of fraudulent behavior.

- Do not wire money to anyone unless you are absolutely sure it is someone you
  know and trust. Once wire funds are picked up, there is little law enforcement can
  do to recover it.
- Do not purchase gift cards and provide card number information over the phone or via email.
- Do not send a check, cash, or money order or give out your account information to anyone insisting on immediate payment.
- Do not let anyone rush you into making a decision. Take your time to ask questions
  and gather information about the product, contest, company, or charity and ask for
  written information to be sent to you. Scam artists typically will not take the time to
  provide this.
- Always check out unfamiliar companies with your local consumer protection agency, Better Business Bureau, Illinois Attorney General, the National Fraud Information Center, or other watchdog groups. Unfortunately, not all bad businesses can be identified through these organizations.

And always remember that if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

# The Kids are Back in School - Drive with Care

Children all across Mount Prospect are ready to learn this school year, but moms and dads can always learn something new, too. While our local schools invest heavily in security hardware, video cameras, and hall monitors to keep your children safe and faculty and staff receive training in safety drills and how to identify and report suspicious

activity in and around the schools, the greatest threat to your child's well-being and safety can be a parent dropping off and picking up their child.

Every parent who drops off or picks up a child at school knows the streets and neighborhoods surrounding schools get very congested during these times. Parents often block driveways preventing homeowners' access to their property while other cars regularly park in fire lanes and crosswalks. The most dangerous incidents occur when parents double or triple park in the street and then call out to their children who dart out between parked cars to get to the waiting parent. Regrettably, adult volunteers are verbally abused daily when they ask parents to comply with the safety rules. If we all obey the traffic and parking laws and follow the school's pickup and drop off procedures, we can prevent the injury or death of a child.

The Mount Prospect Police are asking parents to schedule after school events and appointments accordingly so that you have the time to park safely and drive away from the school at a safe speed. And remember, the use of cell phones by drivers in school zones is strictly prohibited unless the vehicle is parked.


