

Community/Economic Development

The arrival of winter will not slow down the economic development happening throughout Mount Prospect. Many portions of the Village have seen significant growth and development during the past year.

Randhurst Village is now home to great fast-casual restaurants including MOD Pizza and McAlisters Deli, and service-related businesses such as Club Pilates, Tide Cleaners, and Aligned Modern Health.

Just south of Randhurst, The Red Barn Restaurant & Brewery opened its doors this fall. It is the Village's first brew pub, helping the Village achieve one of its Strategic Plan Development goals.

There is plenty of excitement regarding the continued development in our downtown area led by the construction of the development known as 20 West, the design process of the Edwin and Elsie (Meyn) Busse Park, and the preliminary stages of the Maple Street Lofts project.

The southern part of the Village has gone through some transformation as well. A new 130,000 square foot industrial spec building is under construction on a long vacant parcel of land at the northwest corner of Algonquin and Elmhurst Roads. The property has been vacant for more than 30 years and has generated limited property taxes during that time. The property is expected to generate approximately \$180,000 in annual property taxes and to create up to 90 jobs for the community.

New Construction at Elmhurst and Algonquin Roads

Once construction is completed, the property is expected to generate approximately \$180,000 in annual property taxes. The new facility is expected to create up to 90 jobs for the community.

Did You Purchase a Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for displaying the 2018-2019 vehicle sticker was April 30. New residents/businesses or those who have purchased vehicles after April 30 have a 30-day grace period in which to purchase a sticker. During the grace period, proof of vehicle purchase or move-in date is required to ensure that a penalty is not imposed. Residents who change vehicles during the year should remove the sticker from the old vehicle and contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee.

Post-Halloween Pumpkin Recycling

The Village of Mount Prospect will hold a collection day for your Halloween pumpkins on Saturday, November 3rd, from 9:00 am to noon. All collected pumpkins will be used in composting efforts.



Bring your clean pumpkin of any size to the Public Works Facility at 1700 West Central Road. Pumpkins which have been decorated with acrylic paint can also be dropped off but all other decorations such as candles, yarn or stickers must be removed before dropping off. The service is available only to residents of Mount Prospect and SWANCC member communities (no businesses please). Pumpkins will be collected by Republic Services and transported to a pumpkin composting site at Organix Recycling, LLC.

Curbside Leaf Pick-up in Full Swing

Each year the Village of Mount Prospect provides a convenient, no-cost curb-side leaf pick-up program for residents. The program allows leaves to be placed at the curb between October 15th and November 30th for pick-up by Public Works crews.

The program is for leaves only. Any pile with grass clippings or other yard material will not be picked up. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to remove unacceptable material from the leaves.

Leaves should be raked onto the pavement one foot from the curb no earlier than one day prior to scheduled pick-up. The machines used to collect the leaves travel each street weekly during the program, once in each direction. If the machine has already passed your home on the scheduled pick-up day do not place the leaves at the curb until the following week.

Please note that there will be no pick-up services on Thanksgiving or the following day.

You may also want to consider keeping your leaves as they make very good

mulch. They can be packed around perennials and flowerbeds where they will provide warm during the cold winter month. Leaving leaves on top of a garden bed to be rototilled into the soil will enrich the growing conditions for next year. Leaves also make an excellent addition to a well-maintained compost pile.

Yard Waste Collection Ends December 14th

Our yard waste collection program concludes on December 14th this year. Please be sure to have properly prepared yard waste and brush at the curb prior to your final pick-up. Yard waste or brush placed at the curb after December



14 will not be collected. Please visit the Village website in the spring for the start date of the 2019 organics/yard waste program.



Be Smart – and Safe – When Winterizing Your Home

Many people contact the Village for tips on how to properly winterize the water service in a home, especially for those who will be spending extended periods of time in warmer locations.

In order to comply with the Village Code and ordinances, here are the steps to properly winterize your water service:

- Please call Public Works at 847.870.5640 at least 48 hours in advance to schedule a water service shutoff at the b-box. If Public Works finds any problems with the operation of the b-box, the property owner will be notified. Sometimes debris or age will make a b-box inoperable.
- After the water service is shutoff by Public Works, you will need to drain
 the interior plumbing by shutting off the water heater and opening the
 water heater drain port or by draining the lowest faucet or spigot in the
 system. Expect to drain several gallons of water from this spigot so have a
 bucket handy. Contact a licensed plumber to properly drain piping, water
 heater, toilets, and traps to prevent damage from freezing.
- Do not turn off the heat to the property. Turning off the heat to a property is not advisable during the winter months as pipes can freeze or worse, burst and cause flooding. Lower your thermostats to maintain a minimum temperature to keep pipes from freezing. Contact an HVAC contractor to install a programmable thermostat if needed.

The Village Code does not allow a property to be winterized by the removal of the water meter. Removal of a water meter is considered tampering with the water system and is prohibited by Village Code. B-boxes, round-ways or road boxes should only be operated by Public Works. Improper use of these devices by untrained persons can result in damage, including main breaks or service leaks causing service disruption to the property and others. Also, fines and fees can be imposed per the Village Code.

Do not use an air compressor to 'blow out' the private service piping. Using an air compressor allows grit, oils and other contaminants to enter the private and public water supply posing a potential health risk to you and others who drink the water. Adding chemicals or antifreeze to your system may contaminate the piping and require expensive cleanup. This practice is not allowed by Village Code, is unsafe, and not sanitary.

Winterizing your property does not relieve you from paying sewer, cross-

connection device and refuse flat fees. These are applicable whether there is water usage or not. Be safe, be smart — winterize the proper way.



Caring for Your Vehicle and the Environment

Don't overlook the importance of proper car care and maintenance as important steps to protect the local environment. Many vehicle fluids can be hazardous to local waters if not disposed of properly. Whatever is dumped into storm drains or onto the pavement will make its way into local creeks, and ultimately, the Des Plaines River.

If you change the oil in your car yourself, that oil must be disposed of properly by placing it in a sturdy container with a label and taking it to a local oil recycling station. You can call Public Works at 847.870.5640 for a complete list of local oil recycling locations.



Antifreeze is also dangerous to the environment. It contains ingredients that are poisonous to people, fish, and wildlife. It should be treated in the same

manner as waste oil. In the case of a spill involving any of these types of materials, use kitty litter, sawdust, cornmeal, or special oil absorbent products to absorb the spill. Sweep up the absorbent after a few hours. For more information about household hazardous collection events, visit the Village website at mountprospect.org.

Thanksgiving Safety

Did you know that more house fires involving cooking equipment occur on Thanksgiving than any other day of the year?

With so much food being prepared all day long, and a crowd of family and friends in the kitchen, safety can't be overlooked. To keep your home and family safe, follow these important tips:

- Never leave your house unattended when cooking your turkey and be sure to check on it frequently
- Test all smoke alarms by pushing the Test buttons in advance of the big day
- When peak cooking times arrive have plenty of activities to keep kids busy and away from the kitchen
- When using appliances that require electrical cords such as electric knives, coffee makers, mixers or plate warmers, make sure that cords do not dangle over the countertop edge

Let's make it a safe Thanksgiving Day in Mount Prospect.



Christmas Tree Safety

Christmas trees account for approximately 200 fires each year, resulting in an average of 6 deaths, 16 injuries and more than \$16 million in property damage. Tree fires can be the result of shorts in electrical lights, proximity to heat sources and contact with open flames such as candles. Having a dry tree can increase the risk.

Certainly, having an artificial tree provides a safer alternative, but if you do have a live tree, be sure to purchase a fresh-cut tree by looking for these features:

- Look for a tree that is completely green
- Needles that are difficult to pull from branches and do not break when bent between fingers (when the trunk is bounced on the ground a shower of needles should not occur).
- A trunk that is sticky with resin

Once you get the tree home, ensure your safety by closely following these important tips:

- Stand the tree up in a bucket of water to maintain freshness until you are ready to set it up in your house
- Before you bring it into your home, cut about 2 inches off the trunk
- Mount the tree in a sturdy stand with wide spread legs on the base; use thin wire or fishing line to anchor large trees to a wall or ceiling to prevent it from toppling over
- Place the tree at least 3 feet from heat sources such as fireplaces, radiators or other heat sources
- With the heat on in your home, your tree will likely dry out more rapidly so keep the basin filled with water at all times; think of the tree as a bouquet of flowers that you want to keep fresh
- Do not rely on chemical coatings or sprays to fireproof trees
- Never put lit candles on or near a tree
- Check all strings of lights before putting them on your tree; look for frayed or split wiring
- Test all lights before putting them on your tree

Enjoy Safe Holidays at Home this Year

Nearly half of all fires related to Holiday decorations are caused by those decorations being too close to heat sources. As the colder weather that comes with the Holiday season approaches keep these few, but critical life-saving tips in mind:

- Choose decorations for your home that are flame resistant or flame retardant
- Connect no more than 3 strands of mini light sets and a maximum of 50 screw-in bulbs
- Make sure that Christmas trees are at least 3 feet away from any heat source such as fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights
- Carbon monoxide is also a critical concern in the winter. Protect your home and your family by checking carbon monoxide detectors regularly to make sure they are in good working order

Enjoy Your Fireplace — Safely

Enjoying a fireplace in your home can be a favorite part of the Holidays and winter time. In order to reduce the risk that can come from using your fireplace, the Mount Prospect Fire Department encourages residents to follow these safety tips:

- All fireplaces should be inspected annually; make sure the flue is carefully inspected inside and out
- Burn only hard woods as they contain smaller amounts of creosote, a black tarry substance that can block passageways and/or easily ignite
- Always use a fireplace screen
- When cleaning your fireplace let ashes cool and place them in a metal container
- Never leave a fireplace unattended when in use
- Never burn paper, charcoal or rags
- If you are using artificial logs, burn only 1 at a time
- Keep any flammable or combustible materials at least 3 feet away from an open fire
- Make sure your home has working smoke alarms
- Supervise children at all times when using your fireplace

Don't Leave Your Car Running

Despite how tempting it may be on a cold morning, do not start your vehicle and leave it running unattended to warm up. Last year several cars in the Village were stolen when left unattended while running with the keys in them. This behavior is not only dangerous but also illegal regardless if the car is locked or not. You can also be held responsible in civil court for damages



or injuries if your car is stolen while running unattended and involved in an accident. Don't let the cold lead you to a bad decision — don't leave your car running unattended at any time.

When you hear someone mention having a nosey neighbor, it is usually thought of as being a negative thing. But having, or being, a nosey neighbor may not be a bad thing. It's easy to fall into a routine and not pay close attention to what is going on



around us. The majority of home break-ins occur during the day time when people are at work. It is at those times that it is good to be, or have, a nosey neighbor. We should all do what we can to be a little more observant in our neighborhoods and when there is something or someone suspicious call 911.
