### **Holiday Decorations**

As much as we enjoy holiday decorations, Village code requires that temporary exterior lights be removed 60 days after a holiday. In addition to maintaining the look of your neighborhood, the requirement serves as a benefit to you as well, as the ultra violet (UV) rays from sunlight can deteriorate low gauge wire over time, as can ice and wind. After you remove the lighting, inspect it for

wear before storing it for next year. Any damaged lights should be recycled to prevent causing a fire if used again.

### Exciting Changes Taking Place in Mount Prospect!

It's become quite common to see hard hats, cranes and bulldozers throughout Mount Prospect as multiple new developments continue to take shape around town.

The new industrial and commercial project at 1731 Wall Street is nearing completion, with February 2019 as the target end date. This key project on the Village's southern end is part of a mixed-use district as designated in the Village's Comprehensive Plan. A number of potential tenants are currently inquiring about the project.

Summer 2019 should bring an end to the construction of Park Terrace, a development featuring 12 townhomes at 15-19 North Elmhurst Avenue. The foundations have been poured and construction is underway on the new units which will feature rooftop terraces in one of this currently underutilized site.

A high-profile development at 20 West Northwest Highway is moving along as underground parking and first floor construction have taken place. The construction of steel framing on the remainder of the project will continue into 2019.

With The Tile Shop, Texas Roadhouse and Buona Beef planned as tenants, the site at 801 East Rand Road has been undergoing site work in advance of construction being complete by the fall of 2019.

### **Water and Sewer Rate Increase**

The Village Board enacted a multi-year rate structure in 2017 for water and sewer utility rates. Following are the rates for in-village water customers, effective for billings after January 1, 2019:





FIXED FEES

Water: \$4.00/month (for service lines up to 1" meter)

Sewer: \$5.00/month

Refuse: No change; rate remains \$19.58/month

VOLUMETRIC (USAGE) FEES

Water increases from \$9.65 to \$10.33 per thousand gallons Sewer increases from \$1.90 to \$2.09 per thousand gallons

### 2019-2020 Vehicle Stickers

Residents should look for a renewal notice in the mail during the first week of February 2019 for Mount Prospect vehicle stickers. The deadline for displaying the stickers will be April 30, 2019. If you had a 2018-2019 vehicle sticker and do not receive a renewal application in the mail, you are still required to purchase and display a sticker by the due date. Vehicle stickers purchased after April 30 are subject to a late penalty payment. The penalty does not apply to new residents/businesses or to those who have purchased vehicles after May 1; in these situations, there is a 30-day grace period in which to purchase a sticker. Stickers may be purchased online at mountprospect.org or at the Finance Department in Village Hall, 50 S. Emerson Street. Stickers may also be purchased at the Elmhurst Road Currency Exchange, 1698 S Elmhurst Road, Suite 106 as of Feburary 1, 2019. The deadline for displaying

the 2018-2019 vehicle sticker was April 30, 2018. The Police Department may issue citations to drivers of locally registered vehicles if a current vehicle sticker is not displayed. For more information, please call the Finance Department at 847.392.6000.

### Do you have an emergency supply kit in your car for the winter months?

Before you head out for any traveling this winter, make sure your vehicle is winter ready! Prior to traveling, check road and weather conditions for our area and of your destination. Pack an emergency supply kit for your vehicle to keep you prepared for winter weather or any emergency road closures.

When creating an emergency supply kit, consider adding items such as:

- Blankets
- Flashlights
- First Aid Kit
- Snow Brushes
- Jumper Cables
- Sand or Kitty Litter
- Cell Phone Charger
- Hank Crank NOAA Weather Radio
- Water and High Protein Snacks
- Extra mittens, scarves and hats

### Help Keep Hydrants Clear

Every winter fire hydrants become buried by the snow. This creates a situation where it becomes difficult for the Fire Department to locate and use the hydrants.

You can help the fire department by ensuring the hydrant near your home or business is kept free from snow on all sides. Please keep a clear path from the street to the hydrant as well.



### Top 10 Space Heater Safety Tips

- 1. Look for a space heater equipped with a guard around the heat source to keep children and pets safe.
- 2. Select a heater approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory.
- 3. Follow manufacturer instructions for proper use and safety measures.
- 4. Only use space heaters in well-vented areas and at least three feet away from any objects such as curtains, clothing or furniture.
- 5. Always place a space heater on a flat, level surface.
- 6. Do not use an extension cord to power the space heater.
- 7. Use K-1 kerosene only for kerosene space heaters (do not use gasoline, camp stove fuel, or any other flammable liquid).
- 8. Store all fuel outdoors. Never refuel the heater inside the home.
- 9. Never leave a space heater on overnight or unattended.
- 10. Never place objects on the space heater to dry.



### Don't Tempt Criminals with an Unlocked Car

The majority of instances of items being stolen from cars in the Village occur when cars are left unlocked. These burglaries can be very hard to solve as there is usually very little physical evidence left behind. In order to avoid being a victim of this type of crime, follow these easy steps:

- Always close your vehicle's windows and lock the doors. An open window or unlocked door is an invitation to a criminal.
- Remove loose valuables from your vehicle. A car burglar loves to see items that can be grabbed easily and carried away without much effort.
- If you must leave valuables in your car place them out of sight in the trunk or under the seats.
- Don't hesitate to call or text 9-1-1 to report suspicious persons seen wandering around

parking lots or driveways or looking into cars as they walk by (your call can by anonymous).



 Turning on outside driveway and porch lights help make your vehicle a less desirable target.



### Winter Driving Tips

Even the most experienced drivers can have their driving skills challenged when the worst of winter weather hits. Stay safe by following these key winter driving tips:

- Keep your vehicle properly maintained. A well-maintained vehicle is better suited to meeting the challenges of winter driving.
- Keep a First Aid Kit in your vehicle. Your kit should include these items:
   Ice scraper | Snow brush | Matches | Candles | Flashlight | Warning triangle or flares | Bag of sand | Blankets | Emergency Help sign | Cell phone
- Check driving conditions before leaving home. Always be alert for hazardous conditions, watching for hard to see patches of ice (black ice) that may form in shady spots or over bridges.
- Keep a safe 5 second interval between you and the vehicle in front of you.
- Keep headlights on during overcast days.
- Remove all snow and ice from the windows as well as the roof of your vehicle before driving.
- Make sure your windshield wiper fluid is topped off.

Above all else, SLOW DOWN. Most car accidents are the result of driving at excessive speeds.

### Overnight Parking

As a reminder, there is no overnight parking on Village streets from 2 — 6am every night. This allows our Police Department to quickly identify suspicious vehicles in the community. If you need to utilize street parking overnight for guests or while having work done on your driveway, permission can be granted when you call 847.870.5656.

### When to Call 9-1-1

We frequently receive questions about when it is or isn't appropriate to call 9-1-1. A call to 9-1-1 is the most immediate way to get a police officer to your location. Whether you need to report a crime or want to alert the police to a dog barking at 2am, a call to 9-1-1 is the way to go. Residents are encouraged to use 9-1-1 to report any suspicious behavior in their neighborhood. If you are simply looking for information or would like to request permission to park on a Village street overnight, please call the Police Department at 847.870.5656.

### Street of the Week Program

Mount Prospect police officers will concentrate their traffic enforcement efforts on designated roadways for one week periods. Here are the dates and the corresponding roadways for the *Street of the Week* program this winter:

### **Christmas Tree Collection**

Please recycle your used fresh Christmas tree through the Village's tree recycling program. You can leave your tree at the curb on your regular pick-up day December 31 through January 11. The refuse handler will pick it up at no additional charge to you; no lawn refuse sticker is needed. Please do not cut or trim the tree — simply place it at the curb whole.

Trees must be free of all decorations including lights, tinsel, ornaments and any string or wire.

Trees placed at the curb prior to December 31 or after January 11 will also be picked up free of charge but will be considered refuse and not composted.

Wreaths will also be collected at no additional



cost on your regular refuse collection day, but are considered refuse due to the metal frame. Please place your wreath in your green refuse cart for disposal. In addition, artificial wreaths are not recyclable. Artificial wreaths should be placed in the green refuse cart for disposal not the blue recycling cart.

### Holiday Light and Extension Cord Recycling

As you pack away the holiday decorations, don't throw away your old,

unused strings of lights, or the ones that didn't work properly this year. Mount Prospect offers a free light recycling program

at Public Works, 1700 West Central Road. You can drop the old lights or extension cords off from 7:30 am – 5:00 pm any weekday, all year long, except for holidays.

We do not accept garland, wreaths, live

greens or other non-recyclable materials.

### Damaged Mailboxes

If Village snow clearing operations cause damage to your residential mailbox you may be eligible for repair or replacement under the Village's mailbox replacement policy.

Upon notification of damage, the Village will verify eligibility and provide residents with a temporary, barricade-mounted mailbox until weather permits repairs or replacement. If the damaged mailbox is identified as beyond repair, the resident is provided with two methods for replacement:

1) Replacement by the Village will include a wood post with post anchor stake and a standard black or white steel mailbox in compliance with Village Code. Residents that prefer to have a different style mailbox will need to install the mailbox on their own, or 2) Residents may replace their own mailbox and are eligible to receive up to \$125 in reimbursement. To be eligible, the mailbox must be installed according to specifications defined in the Village Code.

### 2019 Holiday Solid Waste Collection Schedule

There will be no solid waste collection on the following holidays:

### Snow Shoveling Made Easy(er)

With an early winter storm this November, most residents have experienced snow removal already this season. As more accumulating snow is likely this winter, keep these steps in mind to make your snow removal efforts easier. PILE SNOW DOWNSTREAM

First, please remember

that it is hazardous to shovel, plow or blow snow from your driveway or sidewalk onto a public street. By following the simple diagrams below, you can maintain your property and keep surface streets clear. Shovel the snow away from your driveway apron to the side, in the direction of traffic. Clear a space on the side that the Village snowplow will approach from so that the snow fills in the pocket before it hits the end of your driveway. Doing so will allow you to have the widest entry possible to your driveway after a measureable snowfall.

### Your Winter Forecast

Is there a more difficult job than trying to forecast the winter weather in the Chicago area? As we have already seen in recent weeks, our weather can be quite varied and unpredictable. Our seasonal snowfall averages approximately 36 inches, but has ranged from 9.8 to 89.7 inches in a single winter. It is not uncommon to have multiple accumulations of around 2 inches. While our neighbors on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan are likely to experience more heavy snowfalls, a shift in the wind can bring us significant lake effect snow at any time. Snowfalls of 10 inches or more in a single day occur every few years in this area and we all need to prepare accordingly.

Temperatures can swing widely as well. The average daily high as measured at O'Hare airport in January is 31° with average lows for the month ranging right around 16°. Our area will experience approximately 8 nights of sub-zero temperatures per year, but some nasty winters have brought as many as 20 such days. While we are used to hearing "cooler by the lake" in the summer, temperatures closer to the lake tend to run warmer in the winter as the heat retained in the lake offsets the cold air. Those slightly warmer temperatures usually don't extend to Mount Prospect, however.

Based on 30-year averages obtained from NOAA's National Climatic Data Center for the months of December, January and February, the Chicago area ranked the sixth-coldest major U.S. city as of 2014.

While we are all ready for spring by March, temperatures don't always meet our expectations. It is certainly possible to see temperatures as high as 80°, including 2012 when we experienced 8 days that reached that level!

Needless to say winters in our area are not for the faint at heart, but it is also the reason why we Chicagoans are consider some of the toughest when it comes to nasty weather. Think Spring!

### Tips for Safe Winter Driving

Wet, snowy and icy roads, along with impaired visibility can make winter driving especially dangerous. To stay safe when you must be on the road in the winter weather, please follow these tips:

- Keep your gas tank full.
- Remember that as in foggy conditions, using high beam headlights during a snowstorm will actually decrease your visibility due to glare and reflection, so only use low beams and reduce your speed.
- Be sure to completely clean all snow and ice from every window on your vehicle before driving.
- With snow or ice on the surface of the road, braking can be more difficult. Leave extra space between you and the vehicle in front of you and gently pump your brakes when stopping to prevent skidding.
- Slow down! Always give yourself a few extra minutes when driving in the winter.
- Roads that are less utilized and bridges will always be icier than main surfaces. Be cautious.
- If you have the misfortune of being involved in a minor accident, move your vehicle to a safe location before getting out.
- Leave some separation between you and a snowplow ahead of you. Do not pass them while their plow or salt spreader is engaged.
- Of course, adhere to all standard driving laws including wearing your

seatbelt and having headlights on when windshield wipers are in use.

Let's keep our roads safe this winter.



### Caring for Your Trees in Winter

After a wet spring and a dry summer, the trees in your yard have gone dormant, but this winter can be a perfect time to do some maintenance to keep them healthy in 2019.

It's not too late to do some clean-up work around them by removing any leaves which are still on the ground. This will help reduce any inoculum left on the material that may infect the tree next spring. Although most foliar leaf diseases are insignificant to the health of the tree, reducing its presence will improve the aesthetics of the tree.

Now is a great time to do some pruning, removing broken, dead, or diseased branches to improve the overall health of the tree. Take care not to remove healthy limbs or to over-prune by reducing the crown by more than 25%. A certified tree professional can safely and properly trim your

trees, avoiding the damage that can be done by incorrectly pruning.

You can maintain soil temperature and reduce water loss by applying a 2" to 4" layer of mulch around the tree. Do not, however, place the mulch up against the tree itself.

Finally, if the ground has not yet frozen, don't be afraid to water your tree. It needs moisture during the winter, too, so water as temperatures permit.

### **Upcoming Senior Programs**

We will be offering the following special programs for seniors in our community in the months ahead. Please note that these programs require appointments or registration.

- Real Estate Senior Exemptions and Tax Freeze Applications | Applicants must be 65 years old and if seeking a tax freeze, must bring a record of your 2018 income.
- AARP Income Tax appointments are available to those over 50 years of age who cannot afford a tax preparation service. Tax preparers are trained to complete standard forms; individuals with very complicated tax situations are advised to seek the services of a professional preparer.
- State of Illinois Benefits Access Program License Plate Discount, Seniors Ride Free and Persons with Disabilities Ride Free benefits. | This certificate remains valid for a 2 year period. If you applied for the Benefits Access Program in 2017, you will need to reapply this year. You are advised to apply 90 days prior to the expiration of your current sticker.



### Senior Assessment Program

If you, a family member or neighbor is a homebound senior who is encountering circumstances that make it hard to remain in your home, a private assessment is available to identify solutions. A Senior Services Social Worker and the Public Health Nurse will visit your home to evaluate your situation. Qualifying circumstances may include decreased mobility, medication management problems, difficulty monitoring chronic illnesses like diabetes or hypertension, transportation issues, meal preparation, and family members living far away.
