### Did You Purchase a Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for displaying 2019-2020 vehicle stickers was April 30. The Police Department may issue citations to owners of locally registered vehicles that do not display current stickers.

If you are an established resident who purchased a new vehicle after April 30, or a new resident who moved into the Village after April 30, you have 30 days to purchase a vehicle sticker at Village Hall. Proof of vehicle purchase or move-in date is required to ensure that a late fee is not imposed.

Residents who change vehicles after having purchased a 2019-2020 sticker should contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee.

### Community/Economic Development

### Supporting Our Seniors

The Village of Mount Prospect is committed to supporting projects that serve our senior residents. The North West Housing Partnership (NWHP) offers two programs aimed at assisting seniors to live independently and remain active and engaged in daily activities.

The CAPABLE (Community Aging in Place, Advancing Better Living for Elders)

**Program** helps those 65 and older who live at home by coordinating the services of an occupational therapist (OT), a nurse and a handyman. The OT and nursing services are provided at no cost.



NWHP also operates a **Handyman Program** for those 60 and older who need minor repairs done in their home. The resident shares a portion of the cost which is calculated on a sliding scale. Fees are typically under \$40 an hour depending on income, and in some cases may be free.

### New Mount Prospect Restaurant Guide

As part of an enhanced economic development initiative, the Village will be creating an interactive web-based map of all Mount Prospect restaurants to familiarize patrons with new and established places to eat within the Village. ### Mount Prospect Pointe

Mount Prospect Pointe is taking shape along Rand Road across from Walmart as three commercial buildings are under construction. A fourth commercial pad is available.

Planned tenants include The Tile Shop, Texas Roadhouse and Buona Beef. Construction for all should be completed this year, with a new stoplight planned at the Walmart and Mount Prospect Pointe.

The development is expected to generate approximately \$250,000 in annual property taxes and \$150,000 in sales taxes once completed. Greatly improving the appearance of the locale, the project develops a long-vacant site along the Rand Road corridor.

### Stormwater Pollution

**What is stormwater pollution?** When it rains, some of the rainwater is absorbed into the ground. However, when rain falls on hard surfaces like concrete, or when the ground is too saturated to absorb the additional rain, some of the rainwater will flow over the surface and directly into creeks, streams or rivers.

This runoff collects pollutants as it moves across various surfaces, carrying them into those natural bodies of water. The pollution can be something you can see such as discarded bottles, cans or papers floating on top of the water. Other types of pollutants are not as visible, such as when oil from a car washes into a creek or stream. In any case, rainwater runoff is the number one cause of water pollution in the United States.

Among the concerns related to stormwater pollution is the volume and timing of the runoff, as well as the po-

tential contaminants being carried in it. These contaminants are picked up as water from a storm, or even garden hoses and sprinklers, drains from streets, parking lots and lawns, and enters the water system through our catch basins and storm drains. That water travels directly into rivers and streams without being cleaned or treated in any way. Anything that is dropped on the ground or hard surfaces contributes to stormwater pollution. Because it is so wide-spread, rainwater can not be collected and treated before reaching streams, rivers, or lakes.

In a separate sanitary and storm sewer system the sanitary sewer system collects all the water from household usage and directs it to a treatment plant. Storm drains are designed to quickly route rainwater from the street during heavy rains. Unfortunately, this runoff collects chemicals, trash, and debris from lawns, parking



lots and streets, and is routed directly into water ways.

Polluted stormwater runoff impacts humans, fish and animals as it carries its various contaminants with it. Sediment from the ground damages the water and can destroy aquatic habitats, while debris such as plastic bags, bottles and cigarette butts can choke, suffocate or disable ducks, turtles, fish and birds. Humans are impacted when beaches are closed due to high levels of bacteria and other pathogens in the water.

The runoff can carry household hazardous waste such

as pesticides, paint, solvents, motor oil and other fluids from cars and trucks into the water, further threatening natural resources and aquatic life. Should fish or shellfish ingest polluted water, they can cause illness in humans when we consume them. The same is true if our drinking water sources are compromised.

Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms cannot exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.

Let's all do our part to prevent the impact of stormwater pollution one drop at a time.

### Water Your Traps

If unused for an extended period, the traps in your floor drains, or any drain in your home, will dry out. A dry trap can cause a room to fill with sewer gas from the Village's sewer system. To prevent this from happening in your home, add a little fresh water topped with cooking oil into the traps. The oil will float on top of the water and prevent evaporation, allowing the trap to hold water longer.

### Watering Restrictions

Despite the wet spring we experienced, we should all be reminded that the Lake Michigan Water Allocation Program requires water suppliers like the Village to restrict outdoor water use. Restrictions are in place to ensure that there is a continuous adequate water supply for drinking, bathing and fire protection. Water conservation measures are an important first step in protecting our water supply.

The Village has enacted policies for watering lawns and gardens, filling swimming pools and other uses such as large-scale cleaning. **Watering is permitted for odd number addresses on odd number dates, while even addresses can water on even number dates between 4 pm and 10 am.** Newly sodded sections of lawns may be watered at any time, any day, during the first two weeks after installation. For months with 31 days such as July and August, residents with odd number addresses may water on both days. If you have any questions, please contact Public Works.

The Illinois and federal Environmental Protection Agency is now allowing water suppliers to offer electronic delivery of their annual Consumer Confidence Reports. This use of electronic delivery or e-delivery will save thousands of dollars in printing and postage costs for the Village. The use of the e-delivery method fully meets the public notification requirements. ### Taking Care of New Trees

To ensure that the Village's beautiful urban forest thrives, the Forestry/Grounds Division of Public Works encourages all residents to pay close attention to tree watering throughout the summer and fall.

As you know, the Village has planted many new trees in recent years and it is during those first few years that proper watering is critical to establishing the tree. Young trees should receive at least one inch of water every seven to ten days. Thorough, deep watering is much better than more frequent but more shallow watering. Watering is easy to do, and inexpensive considering the numerous benefits that trees provide.

A lack of water can cause serious stress to a young tree. Primary effects occur as plant tissues dry and become desiccated, damaging leaves, twigs and roots. You may notice a yellowing and browning of the leaves, first along the margins, then progressing toward the center of the leaves. Prolonged drought will also cause the death of fine roots. This inhibits water absorption into the tree, reducing the vitality of the plant.

The secondary stress can inhibit the production of defensive chemicals in trees, making them more susceptible to climate extremes. A lack of water can also make trees more vulnerable to insect and disease pathogens.

Established trees, although generally fine with normal precipitation, may need to be watered in extreme dry or hot periods. For more tips on keeping your trees properly watered contact Public Works.

### Work Zone Safety Tips

For many workers, such as police officers, sales personnel, utility workers, truck drivers, construction workers, fire fighters and emergency personnel, the *office* is actually a vehicle. According to the American Society of Safety Engineers (ASSE), transportation accidents have been the leading cause of on-the-job deaths in the United States every year since 1992. In 2007 alone, 835 deaths resulted from motor vehicle crashes in U.S. road construction work zones.

Everyone plays a role in maintaining a safe work zone area during roadway construction. To keep these workers and others safe, ASSE members have developed safety tips for drivers passing through work zones. You are encouraged to do your part by following these important work zone standards:

- Keep your eyes on the road; minimize distractions, put your phone down and focus your attention on safely driving in work zones.
- Watch for and adhere to the orange, diamond-shaped warning signs or other electronic signs posted in advance of road construction work zones. Signs and work zone flaggers save lives.
- Drive carefully and slowly through the construction site; always obey the posted speed limits in the work zone area and maintain a steady speed. Watch for detours and lane diversions. Do not change lanes when in a work zone.
- Watch for construction workers, their equipment, and their vehicles as they move in and out of the roadway.
- Monitor how traffic ahead is flowing, watching for stopped or slowing traffic.
   Maintain appropriate speeds and do not tailgate. Resume normal posted speeds when safely out of the construction zone.
- Expect the unexpected; anticipate sudden, potential dangers.
- Use extra caution at night.
- Do not get distracted by looking at the work being done while moving through a construction zone.

Be advised that in most states penalties for speeding in these areas are double that of the normal penalties for speeding in a non-work zone stretch of road.

### Reforestation Efforts Continue

The Village's reforestation efforts will continue in the fall, budget permitting, as we look to replace every tree that has been removed. If you have lost a parkway tree, you can expect to receive a notification from the Village once plans are made for replacement. Trees are being replaced in the order in which they were removed. In some cases, trees are not replaced until the following year.

Trees will still be hand-selected by Village staff at an Illinois nursery and planted/guaranteed for one year by a landscape contractor. Eight to ten different species are generally available per planting season. All requests for fall planting must be received at Public Works no later than August 1 of this year.

If you are interested in having a parkway tree planted, please contact Public Works.

### Organics Collection Program

The Village's traditional yard waste collection program is now known as the Organics Program. The new name reflects the fact that in addition to collecting traditional yard waste, the Village is now accepting organic material such as fruits and vegetables.

All yard waste and organics material will be collected in unlimited quantities for no additional charge, but residents must provide their own rigid container or obtain one through the cart rental program for collection. **Organics Service will be provided from April through mid-December.** For more information contact Public Works or visit mountprospect.org/organics.

### Guidelines for Storing Refuse and Organics Carts

Refuse carts and yard waste containers may be stored in your garage, or on the side or back of your property. Storing carts in front of your home or garage is not allowed under Village code and doing so may result in a citation being issued.

For residents who live on a corner lot, if you are storing your carts on the side of your house that faces the adjacent street, the materials must be shielded by bushes or a fence.

You may place your cart at the end of your driveway the night before your collection day beginning at 4:30 pm. Carts should be placed back into their storage position the day of collection after the refuse trucks have come through. Do not leave them out overnight after your pick-up day.

If you live in a multi-family townhome, check with your association for further restrictions on cart storage.

### Secure Document Destruction Event

As a courtesy to residents who have sensitive documents such as medical records, tax forms, and bank statements to recycle, the Village, in partnership with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), will be hosting a Document Destruction Event on Saturday, August 3. The event will take place at the Public Works Facility, 1700 West Central Road from 9:00 am to noon.

Paper documents must be brought to the event in either paper shopping bags or cardboard boxes; we cannot accept materials in plastic bags. There is a limit of six file-size boxes or paper shopping bags per vehicle. Paper clips and staples do not need to be removed, but please remove binders. Also, please have your ID ready, as staff will be checking each vehicle to confirm residency. Workers will help take paper out of vehicles and place in toter carts. The documents will then be loaded into a shredding truck and cross-shredded on site for baling and recycling.

No business or institutional waste will be accepted.



Did you know that July is the peak month for grill fires? Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling:

- Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year by applying a light soap and water solution to the hose.
   A propane leak will release bubbles.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck, railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.

- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

  - charcoal grill, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.
