We encourage you to use some of these resources which are available via the Mount Prospect website (mountprospect.org) or through iPhones and Android device downloadable apps to stay connected regarding Village services.

Our Customer Response Module (CRM) is the first action button on the homepage at mountprospect.org. It provides access to Village services from initial request to completion.
 CRM programs include mp-Delivers which can be used for a wide range of requests from street, sidewalk, or other public property maintenance and Freedom of Information
 Requests to reporting sewer

You can even snap a picture of the issue and submit it with your request.

As always, residents and businesses may pay their water, sewer and refuse bills online by using the Payments tab on the homepage of the Village website. The Village offers direct debit, an automatic payment deducted directly from your checking or savings account or residents can

Vehicle Sticker Deadline Extended to May 31

The deadline for displaying the 2020-2021 vehicle stickers has been extended to May 31. Stickers may be purchased at mountprospect.org/vehiclestickers. Residents who change vehicles during the year should remove the sticker from the vehicle and contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee.

Community/Economic Development

Redevelopment Proposed for Block 56

In March, the Village Board heard a proposal from Greystar, a development firm, for the redevelopment of Block 56. The plan calls for a mixed-use building with high-end amenities, which includes approximately 250 apartments, 8,250 square feet of commercial space, an outdoor public plaza, and a memorial plaza dedicated to first responders.

Block 56 currently consists of the parcel that is home to the Police and Fire Building and the Chase Bank

Building at 111 East Busse Avenue. The Police and Fire facility will soon be vacant as we transition to our new municipal facilities and the Chase Building is less than 50% occupied, making this a highly transformative project for our downtown.

The project is anticipated to go before the Planning and Zoning Commission this summer before the Village Board completes a final review of the project. Please contact the Planning Division at 847.818.5328 if you have any questions on this project.



If you have not yet completed your 2020 Census form, please do so immediately. It is extremely important that we achieve a complete count in Mount Prospect to secure the appropriate funding needed to maintain Village operations and services and fund local schools. The online portal, phone line, and hard copy surveys are all available to fill out only until July 31st.



Beginning in May, Census workers will begin visiting those who have not yet responded. For your safety, these Census workers will have an ID badge with their photo, a watermark for the U.S. Department of Commerce, and an expiration date. These workers are not associated with law enforcement in any way and the data you submit will not be available to

any agency outside of the Census Bureau.


What Do Different Fire Trucks Do?

Do you know the difference between a fire engine and a fire ladder truck?

A fire engine is typically the first vehicle that arrives at the scene of a fire. It helps firefighters use water to battle flames at the site. Fire engines usually have a pump panel, a water tank and hundreds or thousands of feet of powerful hoses. The tank holds approximately 750 gallons of water and serves as the water source until firefighters can connect to a fire hydrant or other external water source. The fire engine also carries nozzles and other tools that are needed for the hoses.

A primary piece of equipment on the engine is the pump panel. The pump panel consists of a series of levers and switches that control how much water is flowing and which lines are being discharged.

Another critical piece of equipment on the engine is known as the *Jaws of Life*. Usually stored on the front bumper, this powerful tool is used to extricate an accident victim from a serious car crash.



Other equipment on the truck includes large gas-powered saws for cutting ventilation openings and large fans for smoke ejection.

So next time you see a Mount Prospect Fire Department truck heading toward an emergency you'll have a better understanding of which type of equipment you are seeing.

Playground Safety for Everyone

As warmer spring weather and extended daylight hours allow kids to enjoy backyard playground equipment, this is a great time to learn more about playground safety. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), playground injuries send 200,000 children to the emergency room each year in the U.S.

Follow these important tips to keep everyone in the family safe:

- Monitor behavior as falls account for most of all playground injuries.
- In addition to the equipment, look out for tripping hazards such as protruding concrete, bricks or tree stumps.
- Check your equipment on a regular basis to make sure everything is in good working order.
- Watch for dangerous hardware like open "S" hooks or exposed bolt ends.
- Install and maintain shock-absorbing surfaces such as woodchips, sand or mulch underneath equipment.
- Never attach ropes, jump ropes, pet leashes or clotheslines to playground equipment to prevent the threat of strangulation.
- Be sure that equipment meets current safety standards.

Pet Preparedness

Preparing your loved ones for any potential emergency can seem stressful. However, it is this very preparation that eases stress during an emergency. While accounting for spouses, parents and children seems a given, don't forget the furry members of your family that provide comfort and love during the best and worst of times.

Leaving a pet behind in an emergency can cause them to be lost, injured or worse. Never leave an unattended pet chained outdoors.

It is recommended that you build an emergency kit for your pet, including food and water, medications and important documents. Visit ready.gov/pets and find the *Build a Kit* section for a comprehensive list of items for your kit.

As you work on your family's emergency plan, keep your pet in mind with these important considerations:

- Create a system with a neighbor to have them check on your pet if you are away.
- Identify shelters that accept pets:
 - Find pet friendly hotels along your evacuation route and keep a list in your pet's emergency kit (gopetfriendly.com).
 - Locate boarding facilities/animal hospitals near your evacuation shelter. Bring your pet's medical records as these facilities will make sure that vaccinations are current.
 - Find an out of town relative who is willing to take your pet.
- Locate a veterinarian or animal hospital in the area where you may be seeking temporary shelter in case your pet needs medical care.
- Have your pet microchipped and keep your address and phone number current.

Police Department

Pass It On in 2020

Pass It On is an education campaign originated by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), which provides new ways for friends and neighbors to keep each other informed

about scams and how to prevent becoming a victim. The Mount Prospect Police Department encourages everyone to share what you know to help protect one another. In each of Mount Prospect's 2020 Village Newsletters, we will explain one type of scam along with helpful information on how to identify and avoid it.

Health Care Scams – Scammers follow the headlines. During Medicare open season or when health care is in the news, they will develop scams that may include a phone call offering you a big discount on health insurance or someone saying they are from the government informing you that you need a new Medicare card. You might even see ads on tv about recent health care laws.

In any of these cases, the scammer will ask for personal information such as a Social Security number, banking or investment information, insurance numbers or your Medicare card number. Always take a minute before you respond. Do you really have to get a new health care card? Is that discounted insurance

a good deal? Is that *government official* really from the government? The answer to all three is almost always, no. Before sharing any information:

- 1. Stop and check things out. Before you share your information, call Medicare (800/MEDICARE), do some research, and check with someone you trust to get the real story.
- **2. Pass the information on to a friend.** Even if you saw through the requests, someone you know may need a friendly reminder. Find out more information on health care scams on the FTC website at ftc.gov/passiton.

Home Improvement Scams

Spring and summer also bring an increase in certain types of home repair scams. Be aware of these specific scams in the coming months:

- Someone *just passing through the neighborhood* offers you materials left over from another job. These materials are usually substandard, and the scammer requires that you pay them up front.
- If you are having work done, get a written contract before proceeding with any work. Some unscrupulous contractors will offer work at a certain rate but then demand more money before finishing.
- Be sure to check out companies that offer driveway sealing, chimney repair or roof sealing services. Don't pay a discounted price for materials that will wear off in a short time.
- Someone knocks at your door claiming to have done prior work at your home. While they engage you in conversation, someone else enters your home through another door.

Remember, if an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is. Do not let anyone you do not know or that you did not first contact, inside your home. Finally, if you are ever in doubt of someone at your door or you do fall victim to a scam, please call 911 to assist us in catching these criminals and protecting others.

Get to Know Patrol Beat 3164

The Village is made up of 6 police patrol beats, each with permanent beat assignments for officers. All officers are assigned a shift and a beat for the course of a year to build better relationships and serve the community. Each beat has a sergeant who is responsible for the entire beat as a beat coordinator. Beat 3164 is found in the central part of the Village and is bordered by Golf Rd, Douglas Ave, Northwest Highway, Prospect Ave and Marina St. Sergeant Chris Rondeau serves as the Beat Sergeant for 3164. owners that Village Code requires that owners or the person in control of a dog must have the dog securely fastened to a leash or tether while in public or private property. While electronic borders and kennel runs are acceptable means of keeping a dog secure, even an unleashed dog that is left unsupervised in a fencedin yard could lead to a violation.

Owners or those handling the dog are also obligated to properly clean up after the animal. A violation of either of these two sections of the Village Code may result in the owner or the person in

> control of the dog receiving a ticket and a fine.

Let's all keep our dogs on their leashes and pick up after them so that everyone can enjoy being outdoors this summer.

The Recycle Coach app is available for computers, mobile devices and digital assistants such as Amazon Alexa and Google Home. By leveraging the power of voice technology, this free app makes it easy to get disposal information about thousands of household items.

- Stay current with custom curbside collection and events calendars.
- Receive real-time updates about any service disruptions.
- Set reminders for yourself.
- Become a recycling expert with the comprehensive What Goes Where? tool that includes details about Mount Prospect disposal information and collection requirements for items large or small, common or uncommon.

Call JULIE Before Digging

As we move outdoors and begin clean-up or landscaping projects that require any digging, remember that Illinois law requires you to first call JULIE (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) to locate underground utilities. JULIE is a one-call service that will locate and mark all utilities on your property. Simply call 811 or 800/892-0123 to request a locate on your property.

To assist with the process, please pre-mark the area in which you plan to work with white flags or white paint. Please call at least 48 hours, or 2 weekdays, prior to the start of your work.

To prepare your trees for a healthy growing season, follow these easy steps:

- Inspect your trees for signs of winter damage or disease while they are still bare.
- Prune dead, diseased or unsafe branches before spring growth. Waiting
 to prune in warmer weather may lead to an unwelcome spread of pests
 and diseases.
 - Remove fallen leaves, branches and waste from your landscape to set the stage for healthy growth.
 - Use a slow release fertilizer for your trees to defend against pests and diseases.
 - Add 2 to 4 inches of mulch around your trees to improve soil moisture and control weeds.

Sidewalk Cost Share Program

Each year one of our most visible projects is the maintenance of public sidewalks. The Village's Shared Cost Sidewalk Program has proven to be a successful partnership between the Village and property owners. We are currently accepting applications from property owners interested in replacing sections of sidewalk adjacent to their home or business.

Applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis through May 29 while funding remains available. The cost to property owners is \$75 per sidewalk square which represents half the overall cost. Contractors will remove the existing square, replace it with new concrete, and backfill along the edges with topsoil.

Applications for the program are available on the Village website.

Lawn Sprinkler Protection

If you have a lawn irrigation system, the State of Illinois requires that all sprinklers have cross-connection and backflow protection to protect the public drinking water supply. All backflow devices are to be certified by a State Licensed Cross Connection Control Device Inspector (CCCDI). If a system has been removed, please have your plumber or inspector notify the Public Works Department.

As part of the state monitoring requirements a copy of the annual certification is to be sent to the Public Works Department. For more information,

Please Clean Up After Your Pet

Cleaning up after your pet is a helpful way to help protect the waterways that run through the Village. Pet waste left on sidewalks, streets or yards contains numerous pollutants that can easily be washed into nearby storm sewers when left behind. Pet waste that enters

a creek in Mount Prospect can have a long journey and impact a variety of plants, animals, ecosystems, and even people. Please discard your

pet's waste by wrapping it in a plastic bag and throwing it in the garbage.

2020 Street Resurfacing Plan

Each year the Village of Mount Prospect implements a street resurfacing plan to efficiently and cost-effectively maintain the safety and usability of the 136 miles of Village-owned streets and alleys. The program also addresses damaged sidewalks, curb and utility structures within the public right-of-way.

For 2020, we have identified 7 miles of streets to be resurfaced. If you reside on one of the blocks identified, you will receive a Resident Information Bulletin on your front door prior to the beginning of work.
