

Choose Your Contractor Carefully

Before hiring a contractor to work on your home, do as much research as possible. Resources are available via the Illinois Attorney General's office and the Better Business Bureau.

While you are encouraged to get several estimates for your project, it is not always recommended that you select the lowest bidder; in fact, you should avoid working with anyone whose estimate is significantly out of line from others. During the evaluation process, ask the contractor if they will be using sub-contractors; if so, ask to meet them and confirm that they have current insurance coverage and licenses. Don't ever pay for an entire project upfront.

During this time of year, it is not uncommon for untrustworthy contractors to appear shortly after storms have occurred. You should never do business with a contractor who shows up at your home without an invitation or appointment, pressures you into a quick decision, offers to take you to a bank to get money to pay them, can only be reached by answering machine, or drives a vehicle with out-of-state plates.

News from the Finance Department

Did You Purchase Your Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for purchasing 2021-2022 Mount Prospect vehicle stickers was April 30. Stickers purchased after April 30 include a late fee unless you are new to the Village or if you are a resident who purchased a new vehicle after May 1. In those instances, you have 30 days to purchase a sticker with proof of purchase or a document showing move-in date such as transfer stamp documentation, rental lease, or moving company bill. Residents who change



vehicles after having purchased a 2021-2022 vehicle sticker should contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee.

Budget Process Recognized with Award

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) has presented the Village with the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the current fiscal year. This award is the highest given for governmental budgeting and is presented to government units whose budgets are judged to adhere to program standards. Those standards include publishing a budget document that meets program criteria as a policy document, as a financial plan, as an operations guide, and as a communications device.

Prospect Place

Construction is about to begin on the new Prospect Place development on Prospect Avenue abutting Wille Street and Evergreen Avenue. This 5-story, mixed-use development will add 80 luxury apartments and over 10,000 sq. ft. of retail space to our downtown.

Three of the existing merchants in that parcel will be moving to new locations:

- Al's Shoe Repair will be located in the Metra station.
- Purple Rose Florist will be moving to Mount Prospect Station Center on Northwest Highway.
- The Kensington Business Center will be the new home for Colonial Dental.

Prospect Place will be a beautiful addition to the downtown with ample masonry, large windows, and a variety of architectural accents. The development will also include upgrades to stormwater and drainage for the area, an improved streetscape, and two large patio spaces. We anticipate project completion by the end of 2022.


Gateway Signs

Last December, the Village adopted the Connect South Mount Prospect Sub-Area Plan. The Sub-Area Plan sets forth long-term goals, policies, and strategies for addressing and guiding future development for the next ten years and beyond, for the south side of the Village. One of the objectives outlined in the Sub-Area Plan is to create a clear identity for the south side of the community. To achieve this goal, the Community Development Department was given the task of looking at potential sites for a new Village of Mount Prospect gateway sign that will introduce and welcome visitors and would offer a first impression of the community.

Six intersections were identified as potential sites in the Sub-Area Plan;

- · Elmhurst Road and Golf Road
- Elmhurst Road and Dempster Street
- Elmhurst Road and Algonquin Road
- Elmhurst Road and Enterprise Drive
- Busse Road just north of I-90
- Algonquin Road and Dempster Street

The Village plans to pursue applicable local, state, and federal grants to fund the new Village gateway sign. Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week is one of the Mount Prospect Fire Department's favorite events of the year. This year, we recognize Fire Prevention Week from October 4 to 8. That last date coincides with the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire that began on October 8, 1871 and lasted several days. As Illinois residents, we remember the 300 people that lost their lives in a fire that also destroyed 3.3 square miles of the city.

Time during this week is also spent with our residents to focus on an important fire prevention topic. This year's theme is, *Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety!* We would like our residents to stay safe with working smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms, and being able to distinguish between the different sounds.

When an alarm makes noises — a beeping sound or a chirping sound — you must take action. If you or someone in your home is deaf or hard of hearing, there are smoke alarms and alert devices that are made to have a different alert system. Some use strobe lights to alert people when the smoke alarm sounds and there are pillow and bed shakers that work with smoke alarms to alert the resident of a potential problem. You can also install a bedside alert device that

uses a low frequency alarm, which can wake up a person with mild to severe hearing loss.

Sleeping with glasses, keeping a mobility device, cell phone, and hearing aids close by will keep you safe no matter the time of day. The Mount Prospect Fire Department is happy to replace smoke alarms for adults over 65 and will also install carbon monoxide detectors that were previously purchased by the occupant and replace batteries.

Watch or Warning?

Living in this area, we are all familiar with the National Weather Service issuing Watches and Warnings. Are you aware of the differences between the two?

A Watch will indicate a timeframe in which severe weather may occur, usually covering a duration of 4 to 8 hours, and allows for time to prepare.

A Warning is similar to the warning lights at a train crossing; it should be taken very seriously as there is immediate concern. When a Warning is issued, you should take shelter immediately and be prepared for the conditions to last for up to 30 minutes.

A weather radio or weather app on your phone are two great ways to stay informed regarding severe weather. It is always beneficial to keep an eye on the skies, and if conditions look ominous, move indoors.



Emergency Preparedness Training

Are you and your family prepared should a weather emergency or natural disaster occur? The Mount Prospect Fire Department wants to help and is now taking applications for a Citizens Emergency Preparedness Training class.

Covering 7 weeks, this class will help prepare you, your family, and your neighbors in the event of a local emergency. The course is free and provides a basic overview on topics like how to use a fire extinguisher, basic first-aid, light search and rescue, and how to compile an emergency preparedness kit for your home.

Back to School Time

Students are back in school now and that brings traffic congestion to our neighborhoods. School buses are driving their routes, kids are walking and biking to school, and parents are dropping kids off before beginning their own day. It is critical that drivers slow down and pay attention, especially during hours leading up to the start of school or as it lets out later in the day.

If you are a parent driving kids to and from school, be safe and courteous. Don't block driveways waiting to drop-off or pick-up, don't park in crosswalks or fire lanes, and do not double- or triple-park as this creates a dangerous situation for kids who dart between parked cars to get to their parents.

Please respect the volunteers who are on hand to enforce safety procedures and rules. If you are scheduling events or appointments after school, give yourself

enough time to safely pick-up and depart from school without having to rush.

If we all obey the traffic and parking laws and follow the school's pickup and drop-off procedures, we can prevent the injury or death of a child.

And remember, use of cell phones by drivers in school zones is strictly prohibited when in the vehicle unless the vehicle is parked.



Even as summer turns to fall, many Mount Prospect residents will be out enjoying the opportunity to bike throughout our community. Biking is a great way to get exercise and to reduce your carbon footprint. However, because cyclists share many roadways with vehicles, they face many hazards. Here are some tips to keep you safe when out biking:

- Always inspect your bike before riding.
- Inflate tires to proper levels.
- Check that the seat is locked in place at the appropriate height.
- Make sure that all parts of the bike are secure and working properly.
- Bikes should have reflectors on the front, rear, spokes, and pedals.
- A horn or bell, rear-view mirror, and bright headlight are recommended.
- When biking, wear neon, fluorescent, or other bright clothing so you can be seen by drivers.
- Riding during the day is recommended, but if you ride at night, wear reflective clothing and use flashing lights.

A helmet should always be worn by adults and children when taking a bike ride of any duration. Helmets should be certified by the Consumer Product Safety Commission. The National Highway Safety Administration recommends these guidelines for a properly fitting helmet:

- Adjust sizing pads or fit-ring until the helmet is snug.
- The helmet should be level on your head, covering your forehead. There

should be about 2 fingers of space between your eyebrows and the helmet.

- Adjust the straps so they form a V shape under, and slightly in front, of your ears.
- Fasten the buckle of the chinstrap and position it centered under your chin. The strap should be snug enough that no more than

one or two fingers fit between your chin and the strap.

• If properly fitted, the helmet should not rock more than 1 inch from side to side or front to back on your head.

Finally, be sure to always follow the rules of the road for biking safety:

- Bicyclists must follow the same rules as motorists.
- Ride single-file in the direction of traffic.
- Remain alert, keeping your head up to look around you; watch for hazards such as car doors opening ahead of you.
- Use hand signals when turning.
- Exercise extra caution at intersections.
- Never hitch onto a moving car.
- Before entering traffic, stop and look left, right, left again, and over your shoulder.

Make It a Safe Halloween

Is there anything scarier than knowing it's almost time for Halloween already? A safe Halloween is a fun Halloween, so please follow these important tips:

- Make sure that your children are only trick-or-treating between 3 and 8 pm.
- Dark costumes are much harder to see at night so avoid using them if possible. If a dark costume is worn, have your children carry a flashlight, glow stick, or wear a reflective belt or vest.
- Face paint is a better option than masks that could restrict vision.
- Have kids trick-or-treat in groups and have at least one adult tag along for extra safety.
- If a trick-or-treater need to cross a street, always do so in a crosswalk; never run out between parked cars.
- And because not every kid will remember every tip we offer, drivers need to take caution and watch for little ones in costumes crossing streets and cutting between parked cars.
- Always have an adult check all the candy that was collected before anyone eats it.







Public Works

Get Ready for Fall

Before long, the leaves on your trees will be turning colors and begin falling. When they do, the Village's fall loose-leaf collection program provides residents with a convenient option that doesn't require bagging.

Beginning Monday, October 18 and running through Friday, December 3, residents can set leaves out at the curb once a week for scheduled collection by the Village. This program is for leaves only. Other material such as grass clippings, twigs, and branches must be bagged according to the Village's yard waste collection guidelines.

Please rake leaves onto the pavement one foot from the curb line one day prior to your scheduled collection day. You can refer to the Village's website for a map identifying the weekly schedule.

If the truck has already passed your home, please wait for the following week. The trucks will only travel along each side of the street once.

Burning leaves is strictly prohibited in Mount Prospect.

Keep Your Trees Healthy Year-round

Once those leaves have fallen, your trees still need care to keep them healthy for the winter and next growing season.

The first step is to make sure trees remain well-watered during the fall. Generally, an inch of rainfall will be sufficient, but during dry periods watering should be done. Simply running a sprinkler under the canopy of a tree, with the spray extending out as far as the tree is tall, will take care of your trees.

Fall is a great time to add or refresh mulch around the tree. Wood chips are a great, natural option. The mulch will help retain moisture in the soil and prevent freezing which allows roots to continue growing as they should. A 2" - 3" layer also prevents weed growth and provides a protective barrier for the trunk of the tree, keeping lawnmowers and weed whips away. However, piling mulch directly up against the trunk can cause rotting, so keep a small barrier around the trunk.

Trees will benefit from fertilization if completed in September. After that time,

it is better to wait until the tree has gone dormant, usually in late November, before providing a dose of nutrients.

While out in the yard during the fall, check trees for insect damage. Most insect damage occurs earlier in the season but some control measures require treating before the growing season to get the best results. The life-cycle of most insects differs, so a tree care professional should be consulted if significant damage is noted.

Finally, removing dead branches and broken limbs in fall can help improve the health of your trees. It is also recommended that you pick up fallen fruit and other debris from the land-scape around a tree to reduce potential diseases next growing season.



Mercury Disposal

In conjunction with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), Mount Prospect Public Works offers residents the on-going opportunity to recycle thermometers, thermostats, and wall switches which contain mercury.

Mercury poses a significant health and environmental risk and items containing mercury should be disposed of properly. Any of these items can

be dropped off at the Public Works Department, 1700 West Central Road any non-holiday weekday from 7:30 am to 5:00 pm. Please call 847.870.5640 for more information.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection

Public Works will host a household hazardous waste collection event from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm on Saturday, September 25. Registration is required and will be available beginning September 8 for Mount Prospect residents only at mountprospect.org/hhw. No commercial waste will be accepted.

Please take advantage of this opportunity and avoid the dangerous practice

of disposing materials in the trash, pouring them down the sewer, or flushing them in the toilet.

Water Quality in Your Home

Did you know that certain spots around your home can impact the quality of the water you use inside? Here are some tips to consider.

Best practices

- Compost leaves and grass clippings to use in your planting beds and gardens.
- Create planting beds and leave natural areas to create variety in your yard, attract wildlife, and minimize the amount you need to mow and fertilize.




- Direct downspouts to unpaved areas to reduce run-off and minimize your need to water the lawn.
- Safely seal and store chemical products like fertilizer, car care products, and household cleaners to keep them away from people and pets and to prevent harmful run-off.
- When using fertilizers and pesticides, be sure to sweep up any excess from paved areas to prevent them from entering the water system.
- Keep your car properly tuned and watch for oil or fluid leaks that can sit
 on your driveway, parking lot, or the street, and eventually enter the water
 system.
- Plant grass or other vegetation on any bare spots in your lawn and cover with mulch or hay until it begins to grow.

Overhead Sewer Rebate Program

The Village has established an overhead sewer rebate program to provide financial assistance to residents who want to convert their existing gravity-fed sanitary system to an overhead system. The program is open to Village wastewater utility customers.

The program offers homeowners of single-family structures a rebate of up to 50% of actual costs incurred up to \$7,500. For more details contact Public Works at publicworksdept@mountprospect.org or 847.870.5640.

Medicare D Open Enrollment

They will use a tool on the Medicare website to help guide your decision. As part of the process, they will help determine if you are eligible for financial assistance with your plan premiums and co-pays this year.
