News from the Building Department

A Healthier Home Means a Healthier You

Here are some tips to keep your home healthy and comfortable during the always-changing weather conditions we experience each winter.

- Make sure that any exhaust fans that vent through the ceiling route through duct work to the exterior of your house. Simply venting moisture into the attic can cause significant roof damage.
- Run your bathroom fan for up to 15 minutes after a shower to completely remove moisture from the room and always keep your kitchen exhaust fan running while cooking.
- A humidity gauge, or hygrometer, will measure the humidity level in your home. During our cold winters a maximum humidity level is 30 – 40%.
- Safely check your roof for ice dams or other moisture issues after heavy snows or several consecutive days of freezing temperatures. Ice dams can occur when freezing temperatures follow a heavy snowfall as warm, dry air leaks out through your attic and melts snow on the roof. That melting snow can then freeze as it crosses a cold overhang. As that ice accumulates water can leak back into the home.
- Do not try to remove snow from the roof yourself. Contact a licensed roofer to remove the snow and check roof vents if necessary.

News from the Finance Department

Flexibility and Convenience

The Finance Department offers optional electronic billing and payment options for water/sewer/refuse bills. Enrolling in electronic billing will allow you to:

- Receive automatic email notification when your bill is ready for viewing.
- View current bill and billing history from date of enrollment forward.
- Navigate to the optional online payment portal.
- Manage your ebilling delivery and email address preferences.

Enrollment information is available at mountprospect.org/BillPay.

Our self-service payment kiosk at Village Hall allows you to safely and conveniently pay utility bills at any time. The kiosk is just outside the building and takes payments via debit



and credit cards, cash, or check with an average transaction time of less than 1 minute. Simply enter your account number or scan the QR code on your bill to activate the kiosk to make full or partial payments.

If you prefer to pay online, you can make a one-time payment or securely store your preferred payment method to establish automatic recurring payments with a credit or debit card, or with a bank account by visiting mountprospect.org/ BillPay. You may change your payment method or turn off auto-payments at any time.

EyeOnWater is a service that gives you direct access to your water usage details and

Service Rates for 2022

Listed below are the water and sewer rates for in-village water customers and refuse rates for single family refuse customers, effective for billings after January 1, 2022:

Fixed Fees:

- Water base fee | Increases from \$6.00/month to \$7.00/month (for service lines up to 1" meter)
- Sewer base fee | No change; rate remains \$5.00/month (for service lines up to 1" meter)
- Refuse cart service | Increases from \$21.15/month to \$21.89/month
- Optional organic cart rental | Increases from \$3.82/month to \$3.91/month

Volumetric (Usage) Fees:

- Water | Increases from \$11.85 to \$12.71 per thousand gallons
- Sewer | Increases from \$2.54 to \$2.79 per thousand gallons

2022-23 Vehicle Stickers

Renewal notices for vehicle stickers will be sent in early February. The deadline for displaying the new stickers is April 30. Stickers purchased after April 30 are subject to a late payment penalty. If you purchase a vehicle after May 1, there is a 30-day grace period to purchase a new sticker. Stickers may be purchased online at mountprospect.org/vehiclestickers. Village Adopts Budget with 0% Levy Increase

The Village of Mount Prospect relies on property tax revenue for its day-to-day operations. The property tax revenue accounts for approximately 25 percent of the total General Fund revenues and are used to pay part of the public safety operation (Police and Fire) and pension costs. The 2021 property tax levy totals \$19.4 million; this amount reflects a zero percent increase over the 2020 extended taxes. The Village also had a zero percent levy increase for the 2020 levy. This marks the third year with a zero percent levy in the last four years.

The total debt service payments for the upcoming year are \$7.1 million. Of this amount, \$2.8 million will be levied and paid from the property taxes; the remaining \$4.3 million is paid from the alternative revenue sources. Additionally, the Police and Fire pension levy is abated by \$625,334 to achieve a zero percent levy increase. The abated amount will be paid from the alternative revenue sources and General Fund reserves.

Stay Warm – Safely

Half of all home fires occur during the months of December, January & February. These fires are frequently caused by heating equipment malfunctioning or being used improperly. Heating equipment issues is the source of one in every seven home fires. One in every five home fire deaths can also be contributed to heating equipment.

To stay warm, and safe, this winter, please follow these important home-heating tips.

- Plug only 1 home heating device into an outlet at a time.
- Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from heaters or other heat sources.
- Space heaters should be placed on a solid, flat surface.

Help Your Fire Department by Keeping Hydrants Accessible

You can contribute to Mount Prospect firefighting efforts by clearing snow away from fire hydrants on your property. As the winter months bring higher levels of fires, having quick access to hydrants can be critical during a fire. If there is a hydrant on or near your property (residential or commercial) please remove snow and ice 3' in all directions around the hydrant and clear a path between the hydrant and street if possible.



POC Firefighters

The Mount Prospect Fire Department offers paid Paid-on-Call (POC) firefighter positions to provide assistance during emergency events. POC firefighters members are very involved with the community and Public Education events and are on call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, providing extra support for structure fires, storm damage, power outages, flooding, and other community incidents.

This program has allowed individuals to use the opportunity as a stepping-stone towards a career as a full-time firefighter.

- Have a qualified professional inspect and clean your fireplace, chimney, and vents annually. The same is true for your furnace.
- Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors each month.

Scams at Your Door Increase Burglary Risk

Mount Prospect and surrounding communities are seeing an uptick in a crime known as

ruse burglaries. A ruse burglary occurs when criminals work together to distract a homeowner while others quickly burglarize the home. The victims are often those over 65 years old and live in a single family home.

A common aspect of the crime is someone coming to the door posing as a contractor, perhaps sharing plans for work they are claiming to do at a neighbor's home which may require access to your property. Claiming to be plumbers, tree trimmers, fence installers, or utility workers, they share bogus plans with you as they will lead you outside, away from your unlocked door. At that point, another person will enter your home and quickly search for valuables.

The thieves are often very convincing, often wearing tool belts, hard hats, or other items that make them look like legitimate contractors. They will often be on their phone while talking to you and will be alerted by those in the home when they are done and will then quickly end the conversation.

Similar scams involve asking the homeowner to check something in the house (run water, flush toilets, flip light switches, check circuit breakers or the stove) or ask for a bucket of water. During the distraction, their partner will enter the home and look for valuables to steal.

You can help prevent falling victim to this type of scam by following these tips:

- Do not open your door to speak with strangers; only speak with those you don't know through a locked door.
- Be suspicious of anyone who asks you to step outside of your home. If you ever feel compelled to, always lock your door behind you.
- Do not allow anyone you were not expecting into your home to check your utilities.

- Do not get buckets of water or other things for alleged contractors who come to your door.
- Utilize safe deposit boxes at your bank for valuables. Minimize the amount of cash you keep at home.
- If you must keep jewelry and other valuables at home, keep them in atypical places. Don't leave jewelry in/on your master bedroom dresser or nightstand, or in the master bedroom closet. Be creative; burglars check common hiding places first.
- A good security camera can be a strong deterrent.
- If you see any suspicious vehicles in your neighborhood, write down license plate numbers.
- Turn the tables on any suspicious individuals at your door by distracting them. Keep them outside, with your door locked, by telling them you need to take medication, put on your shoes, finish a phone call. Assure them you'll be right out. Meanwhile, call 9-1-1 to dispatch police officers to your home.

It is always better to have police officers come to your home, even if the situation ends up being legitimate.

Ruse burglaries are an especially cruel crime in that people often lose irreplaceable family heirlooms. People feel victimized twice because they often blame themselves for falling for the ruse. Please share this information with older parents, loved ones, and neighbors who may be particularly susceptible to this type of crime.

Keeping Roadways Safe for Everyone

Our roadways are shared by not only all types of vehicles, but pedestrians and cyclists as well. To keep everyone safe, please adhere to these guidelines:

- Drivers must stop and give the right-of-way to pedestrians in any crosswalk marked or unmarked when the pedestrian is on their half of the roadway or so close from the opposite half to be a danger.
- Drivers may not pass other vehicles who have stopped for a pedestrian in a crosswalk.
- Whenever stop signs or red flashing lights are in place at an intersection or at a crosswalk in between intersections, drivers will give the right-of-way to pedestrians.
- When signs are posted warning of the presence of pedestrians, bicyclists, or school zone crossings, drivers are expected to exercise greater caution when approaching crosswalks.
- Bicyclists must follow the rules of the road as any vehicle would, by remaining on the right side of the roadway and adhering to stop signs, traffic lights, and right-of-way for pedestrians.

- All pedestrians and bicyclists must follow Walk and Do Not Walk signs at intersections.
- Pedestrians and cyclists using any crosswalks not controlled by traffic signals or stop signs may not walk, ride, or run off a curb or place of safety into the path of a moving vehicle which is so close as to present an immediate danger.
- Before crossing any roadway, pedestrians and bicyclists should always look for traffic in all directions before crossing.

Public Safety Portal Serves Multiple Purposes

Simply place your whole tree (don't cut or trim it into sections please) at the curb on your regularly scheduled pick-up day between January 3 and 14. There is no charge to participate. Be sure to remove all decorations prior to placing the tree at the curb. Trees placed on the curb before or after the program dates will be picked up but will not be composted.

Live wreathes generally have a metal ring which prevent them from being composted. They can be placed in your green refuse cart. Artificial wreathes can also be placed in the green cart as they are not recyclable.




Why Make Snow Shoveling Harder?

We've all had the experience of finally finishing the process of clearing our driveway of snow only to have a snowplow come down the street shortly and cover the driveway apron again.

When shoveling or using your snowblower, move all snow to the side, in the direction of traffic, and clear a pocket of snow on the opposite side of your driveway. That should minimize any accumulation on your driveway when the plows come through.



Keep in mind that it is hazardous to shovel, plow, or blow snow out onto the street. All snow should be moved to your lawn or the parkway.



A Gentle Reminder for Winter Driving

Even for those of us who have encountered Midwestern winter for many years, its always good to get a refresher on some safe winter driving tips. Start with these basics:

- Keep your gas tank full.
- Completely clear snow and ice from all windows on your vehicle before driving.
- You can reduce glare and reflection during a snowstorm by not using high beam headlights.
- Reduce skidding by applying brakes slowly and gently.
- Reduce your chances of an accident by allowing more space between you and the vehicle in front of you when snow and ice are present.
- Allow for more travel time.
- Bridges and roads that host less traffic will freeze more rapidly than main roadways.
- When Village trucks are plowing or salting, do not follow closely and do not attempt to pass.
- If you are involved in a minor accident, attempt to move your vehicle to a less busy spot before exiting the vehicle.

Beautiful Trees in Summer Begin with a Healthy Winter

Winter is a great time to start rejuvenating trees for next summer with some routine care.

The first step is to complete a thorough fall clean-up. Removing fallen leaves reduces the risk of infecting trees and



can improve the aesthetic of the tree in summer.

Winter can be a good time to prune trees by removing dead or diseased branches, or those with poor attachments. This will promote the overall health of the tree come next summer. Don't over-do it, though. Avoid removing live limbs or more than 25% of the crown. You may want to hire a certified arborist to ensure trimming is properly done.

You can help maintain soil temperature and reduce water loss by laying a 2"- 4" layer of mulch around the base of the tree. Do not, however, pile the mulch up against the tree as that can actually be harmful to the tree.

Surprisingly, this can also be a good time to water trees, at least up until the point at which the ground has frozen. A periodic watering around the root zone will make for a healthier tree in spring.

Some Weather Facts and Figures

Whether you love Chicago area winters or can't wait for spring, the one thing we can say is that our winters provide some varied and interesting statistics. Did you know

• Seasonal snowfall has ranged from 9.9 to 89.7 inches.



- The average winter accumulation of snow is 36 inches.
- While the eastern shore of Lake Michigan often receives the brunt of lake-effect snow, wind direction can bring heavier accumulations to us as well. Every few years we experience a snowfall of 10 or more inches over several days.
- As measured at O'Hare Airport, January average temperatures range from a high of 31° to a low of 16.5°.
- We generally experience almost 9 days a year during which temperatures drop below 0°.


Let's hope for a safe and pleasant winter this year.

Options for Mailbox Replacement

Occasionally, residential mail boxes may get damaged during snow removal operations on Village streets. If this occurs you may be eligible for assistance with repair or replacement. If your mailbox is damaged, contact the Village so that we can verify the damage and determine eligibility. We will also provide a temporary, barricade-mounted mail box until weather allows for a permanent solution.

If the damage requires replacement rather than repair, the homeowner has two options from which to choose:

• Option 1 – Replacement by the Village. The Village will provide a wood post with anchor and standard black or white mail box that complies with Village Code.



• Option 2 – Replacement by homeowner. Residents may replace their own mail box and receive up to \$125 in reimbursement. To be eligible, the new box must be installed according to Village Code specifications.
