News from the Building Department Backyard Pools and Hot Tubs

If you are looking to enhance your backyard with a pool or hot tub this year, be aware that any structure with a water depth of 24 inches or more requires a permit. You will need to provide the following:

- A current plat of survey with the location of the pool on the parcel with dimensions to all structures and property lines. All pools must be located behind the home, out of the front, side, and exterior side yards.
- Call JULIE at 811 for locating services for all underground and overhead electrical lines before beginning any work. All pools and hot tubs must be a minimum of 5 feet horizontally from underground electric services and 10 feet horizontally from overhead electric services.



- Your application should identify the type of pool you are installing (hot tub, spa, above ground, in-ground, permanent or temporary) and should identify the location of pumps, filters, or heaters as applicable.
- Identify the location of existing or proposed electric receptacles. The Village can provide a document that outlines requirements.
- We will need to see the size and location of any surrounding patio or deck, along with the construction method to be used. Decks require frost-depth piers or footings and proper sizing of all wood members.
- A minimum 48-inch security barrier is required. Your application should show the location of all gates and safety barriers. An above ground pool with the top edge of the pool at 48 inches or taller from grade can be the required barrier. Otherwise, a fence with self-closing and locking gates will be required around the pool itself or around the entire yard.
- Indicate the placement of ladders along with the type, such as permanent, removeable, or lockable.
- If the house opens directly on to the pool deck with no barrier in between, an alarm will be required on any doors exiting to that pool area.
- We require an existing and proposed panel schedule for the electric service. If the service is less than 200 amps, a set of load calculations will need to be submitted. Included should be methods for grounding and bonding the pool and equipment.

The Village will also perform a simple inspection to be sure the desired location is allowable prior to approving the pool installation. You may request a permit online at mountprospect.org/business/licenses-and-permits. Select Online Portal to proceed.

Dynamic Year Breakfast

Mayor Paul Hoefert delivered Mount Prospect's *State of the Village* address on Thursday, April 7, 2022 at the Mount Prospect Chamber of Commerce's Dynamic Year Breakfast held at Old Orchard Country Club.



The mayor reported that the financial position of the Village remains strong and stable. He said the Village has

benefitted from a strong economy and healthy sales tax revenue.

Hoefert touted the Village's accomplishments of the past year, specifically noteworthy projects such as:

- Cloud HQ which was approved for a 1.6 million square foot data center campus. Cloud HQ is proposing to invest approximately \$2.5 billion in Mount Prospect. There will be an estimated EAV of \$100 million, which will increase the total Village EAV by over 5%. The project will also generate over \$1 million in electric utility taxes to Village annually
- Recent Downtown mixed-use projects include 10 North Main (\$30 million investment), Maple Street Lofts (\$100 million investment), Prospect Place (\$26 million) and HQ Residences (\$28 million investment).
- Senior housing developments including Mount Prospect Senior Living with 56 assisted living apartments and 32 memory care units, and the Kenzie with 74 independent living apartments.

Community/Economic Development

American Rescue Plan Funding for Local Businesses

As part of the American Rescue Plan Act passed in March 2021, the Village of Mount Prospect has been awarded over \$7 million in funding. The Village Board has approved a plan to use the funds to cover budget shortfalls, aid capital projects, and support local businesses. \$425,000 has been set aside for economic development initiatives with 3 types of grants being made available.

New Retail Construction Job Recruitment and Retention Programs

The Village will create an incentive program to attract and retain workers to support retail locations related to new construction. The program will help bridge the gap of finding full and part time employees for Caputo's Fresh Market, and potentially other new retail businesses opening up in the future in the downtown district. Program guidelines include the following:

- An initial amount for \$200,000 will be allocated for a pilot program.
- The amount allocated must be utilized by June, 2024. Any unused amount will be re-allocated to fund an appropriate capital project in the second half of 2024.
- The Village will pay a recruitment and retention bonus up to \$1,000 for each hired employee at the qualifying business subject to several terms and conditions.

Green Building Grant Program

As existing businesses shift to sustainable sourced products and materials, the Village will use a pool of \$150,000 to offer matching grants of up to \$10,000 to existing businesses or commercial and industrial property owners that improve, buildout, or remodel a property or interior tenant space with sustainable materials or features. Applicants will be required to demonstrate a reduction in net energy usage or the utilization of renewable energy.

Website Development Program

The Village will offer a matching in-kind grant to qualifying businesses for a third-party consultant to design and implement a new or improved business website. The total amount in the grant is \$75,000. The business would provide a cost estimate detailing the project and overview of the planned improvements. The Village would reimburse costs up to \$5,000, based on payments to the third party. The business will have to publish the improvements on their website prior to reimbursement.

Hidden Dangers in DIY Projects

If you have some home improvement projects lined up that include certain paints, stains, or oils, you need to know about the very real concern of spontaneous combustion. The most common occurrence of fires started by this type of combustion come from oil- and stain-soaked rags that are disposed of improperly.

Spontaneous combustion of oily rags occurs when a rag or cloth is slowly heated to its ignition point through oxidation. If this heat has no way to escape, like in a pile of rags, the temperature will raise to a level high enough to ignite the oil and the rag or cloth. The fire from this can quickly spread to other combustibles and cause significant damage to your home or property. Examples of the types of materials that can heat and combust are oil-based paints and stains, teak and linseed oils, varnishes and polyurethane, and paint thinners.

You can prevent these types of fires by keeping a clean work area and

properly disposing of rags soiled with these materials in the following manner:

- Place the rags in a container that has a tight-fitting lid. A metal can is preferable but a plastic can or even a zip lock bag can be used.
- Place the soiled rags inside the container, fill the remainder with water and seal tightly. Do not reopen the unit. This will prevent the oils from oxidizing.
- Contact your refuse provider about disposal of the container and its contents.

EMS Week May 15 - 21

In 1974, President Gerald Ford established National Emergency Medical Services Week to recognize the hard work and dedication of those who work on the medical front line. This year, we will celebrate Emergency Medical Services Week from May 15 to the 23rd.

On average, about 70% of calls to a fire department are for EMS situations. They range from car accidents with injuries, national emergencies, people facing physical trauma or life-threatening illness, and many other situations large or small. Our EMS professionals must keep up with the latest training and be prepared to respond expediently and appropriately to all types of calls.

This year's theme, EMS: Rising to the Challenge, is particularly meaningful with the recent challenges we have all faced. Our EMS teams continue to rise above all obstacles and respond, support, and care for the needs of our residents. During this year's EMS Week, be sure to recognize Mount Prospect EMS professionals for the work they do to keep us all safe and well.





Paid-On-Call Firefighter Opportunities

In 1913, the Mount Prospect Fire Department began as a volunteer organization and remained that way until the Village Board made the department members full-time employees in 1961. At that time, the Board also called for the inclusion of supplemental paid-on-call (POC) firefighters as needed.

POC positions remain in place today for members to provide extra support for structure fires, storm damage, power outages, flooding, and other community incidents. POC firefighters are on call 24 hours a day, 365 days per year. These individuals are very involved in community and public education events, with some using the program as a stepping-stone to full-time fire department careers.

Home Repair Season Presents Opportunities for Scams

Unfortunately, doing some home repairs in spring and summer can also create prime opportunities for criminals to scam unsuspecting homeowners. Be prepared this season with these important tips:

- Don't do business with a contractor who is just *passing through town* and has materials left over from a previous job. They will ask for money up front and if they provide any materials at all, they will likely be sub-standard.
- Get a contract with a confirmed price. A common scam involves saying that the cost of materials has gone up after work has begun and that they can't finish unless you agree to pay them more.
- People offering low prices on driveway sealing, chimney repair, or roof sealing may do the work but with inferior products that won't last.

Motorcycle Safety Month



Motorcycles share the roadways with all other vehicles and in May we encourage safe driving during Motorcycle Safety Month. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration,

motorcyclists were almost 30 times more likely to die from a traffic accident than were drivers of cars, 4 times more likely to be injured per vehicle-miles traveled. Here are some tips for safely sharing the road.

- Motorcycles are easily hidden in blind spots or by objects and conditions such as bushes, fences, bridges, or even bright sun. Take a little extra time to look for cycles when driving.
- The speed and distance of a motorcycle is harder to judge than those of a car. Always assume that a motorcycle is closer that is appears visually.
- Don't just assume that a motorcyclist can just maneuver out of the way.
- In some road conditions it may take a motorcycle longer to stop than a car. Watch your spacing with motorcycles.
- Motorcycles can slow down by down-shifting or easing up on the throttle. This means a motorcycle in front of you might not display brake lights to indicate it is slowing down. If you are approaching an intersection with a motorcycle in front of you, provide some additional space between them and your car.

Building more awareness about motorcycles and their unique attributes will assist in you being more likely to see them.

• Don't engage in conversation with someone who knocks on your door and claims to have done work on your home before. While they are talking, a partner of theirs is using the distraction to enter your home through another door and quickly grab cash or valuables.

Remember, if an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is. Don't allow anyone inside your home if you do not know them or if you did not initiate contact. If you are ever suspicious of someone who comes to your door or you do fall victim to a scam, please call 911 to assist us in catching these criminals and protecting others in the Village.

Your Actions Matter

In April, members of the police department, along with high school student volunteers, participated in the annual *Your Actions Matter – Don't Buy for Minors* campaign. In an effort to keep alcohol out of the hands of those under the age of 21, bottle hangers were placed on liquor bottles in all of the participating Mount Prospect businesses that sell packaged liquor. The campaign materials serve as a reminder to those old enough to purchase alcohol, that preventing underage drinking is everyone's responsibility. The Your Actions Matter

campaign is sponsored by the Link Together Coalition, working to empower youth to be drug and alcohol free.

Leashes are the Law

As much as you are excited to get out and enjoy the warmer weather, we know your four-legged friends are, too. Please remember, though, that dog owners or anyone in control of a dog are obligated to keep dogs on a leash or tethered; this applies to both public and private property settings. Similarly, it is also their responsibility to clean up after the animal. Ignoring either of these requirements is in violation of the Village Code and can result in a ticket and a fine.

What You Need to Know About 5G

You have probably heard a lot about 5G technology, the next generation of telecommunications technology designed to meet the increasing demand for fast internet and cellular data transmission. Several of the key differences between 5G and 4G are that 5G is a higher frequency, but the signals do not travel as far as 4G does. As such, wireless service providers are using smaller bundles of equipment, known as small cells. Rather than requiring large towers that reached 200 feet or more with 4G, small cells usually sit only about 30 feet tall but are clustered much closer to one another as they must be in close proximity to the area they serve.

Construction of these new small cells has begun in Mount Prospect. As much as possible, we are working with 5G providers to minimize the aesthetic impact of the new equipment by placing the gear on top of existing Village-owned street lights, but in some cases, free-standing poles will be necessary.

In an effort to streamline the roll-out of 5G, in 2018, both the Federal Communications Commission and the state of Illinois provided 5G companies a great deal of latitude in where these small cells could be placed within the public right of way and limited municipal authority regarding our ability to control where equipment can be placed.

Wireless service providers must still submit a permit application and receive approval from the Village for each small cell location. You can track the location of the small cells on an interactive map at mountprospect.org/5Gnetwork.

Requirements for Lawn Irrigation Systems

As a means of protecting the public drinking water supply, the State of Illinois requires that all lawn irrigation sprinklers be equipped with cross-connection and backflow protection. The state requires that all backflow devices be certified annually by a state licensed Cross-Connection Control Device Inspector (CCCDI). A copy of the certification must be filed with Public Works as part of the state of Illinois monitoring requirements. If the lawn irrigation system has been removed, please have your plumber or inspector notify Public Works.

Call for Utility Locates Before Digging

Spring and summer bring opportunities for plenty of lawn and garden projects. Illinois law requires that you call JULIE (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) before doing any digging in your yard, no matter how small or large the project. Call 811 or 800.892.0123 to schedule a locate for all underground utilities in your yard. If possible, pre-mark the general area with white paint or white flags before the locate team arrives. Please call 48 hours before beginning any work. The

48-hour period does not include Saturdays, Sundays, or holidays. For more information, visit illinois1call.com.



Keep Pet Waste Out of Our Waterways

Pet waste that enters a creek or waterway in Mount Prospect can travel a long distance and have a negative impact on a variety of plants, animals, ecosystems, and even people. Properly cleaning up after your pet can help protect the waterways that run through the Village.

Pet waste that is left on sidewalks, streets, parks, or even yards contains numerous pollutants that can easily be washed into nearby storm sewers which can cause it to enter into our waterways. Please discard all pet waste by wrapping it in a plastic bag and throwing it in the garbage.

Early Spring Tree Care

Take advantage of spring weather to get your trees ready for a healthy growing season by following these steps to boost nutrition:

- Inspect trees for signs of winter damage or disease while they are still bare.
- Prune dead, diseased, or unsafe branches before spring growth begins. This helps prevent the unwelcome spread of pests and diseases that can occur if you wait until warmer weather arrives.
- Remove leaves, branches, and other debris from your yard.
- Get started early with a slow-release fertilizer to give your trees a head start on a healthy growing season.
- Control weeds and improve moisture around trees by adding 2-4 inches of fresh mulch around trees.

As part of our ongoing efforts to improve services to residents and businesses, the Village has introduced the EyeOnWater suite. EyeOnWater includes a secure online website to review and analyze your water usage patterns. For customers who prefer a smartphone app, visit your app store to get started.

With these tools, you will be able to view your hourly usage activity, and gain greater understanding and control of the amount of water you use. The EyeOnWater online portal provides easy to understand graphs and the ability to establish alerts, including identifying potential leaks. You will need your zip code, account number (enter only the digits before the dash), and email address to register for an account.

Localgov Platform to Aid Businesses with Tax Payments

The means by which businesses can pay taxes and fees to the Village is being updated with the introduction of Localgov, a secure file and pay platform to assist with submitting municipal motor fuel, food and beverage, hotel/motel, and entertainment taxes.

Localgov provides convenience and security with these great benefits:

- Eliminates paper forms.
- All-digital online filing and payment provides safety.
- Multiple payment options including ACH draft, credit, and debit.
- Easy to file, pay, and track all of your transactions.

As a reminder Mount Prospect requires the following payments:

- Municipal motor fuel taxpayers pay \$0.04 for each gallon sold by the 20th of each month.
- Food and beverage establishments pay 1% for taxable receipts by the 20th of each month.
- Hotel/motel operators pay taxes for gross rental income of 6% each month by the 15th of each month.
- Movie theater operators pay taxes for each ticket sold at a rate of \$0.25 per ticket by the 20th of each month.
