

VILLAGE ADOPTS THE SOUTH **MOUNT PROSPECT TIF**

On May 3rd, the Village Board adopted a set of ordinances officially adopting a tax increment financing district for an area on the south side of Mount Prospect. TIF is one of the key financing tools available to local governments to help assist in the funding of public improvements and spur economic development in areas of need.

Over the past several years, parcels have been incorporated into the Village, changing the landscape on what defines the south side of Mount Prospect. With these incorporations, the Village has identified infrastructure needs in this area such as water, roads, and bike/pedestrian access, as well as opportunities for economic development such as the former United Airlines campus. In addition, the Village has prioritized south Mount Prospect by the approval of the 2020 Connect South Mount Prospect sub-area plan and goals contained in the Village's 2021-2022 Strategic Plan.

These improvements have significant costs, and the Village began exploring the use of tax increment financing (TIF) to fund these much-needed public projects. In October 2021 the Village Board

commissioned SB Friedman to conduct a study of the area to determine its eligibility status. The resulting report: South Mount Prospect Redevelopment Project Area (RPA) Tax Increment Financing District Eligibility Report and Redevelopment Plan and Project demonstrated the area meets state statutes for TIF eligibility and also provides a plan for the use of TIF financing.

The approval process of the South Mount Prospect TIF continued with Village Board meetings to approve dates for future meetings (March 1, 2022), a Joint Review Board meeting on March 22nd, and a public hearing held on April 19, 2022. News from the Building Department Property Maintenance

Each property owner in the Village is responsible for maintaining their property, structures, and landscape. Summertime is a great time to get out and make sure your property remains in compliance with Village code. This Village's Environmental Health and Compliance Inspectors will be surveying the community and providing notices to those properties that may need a reminder of the following common property maintenance issues:

- Grass and weeds should be kept from growing beyond 8".
- Wood trim and siding should be in good condition. Cracked or rotting wood and peeling paint should be repaired.
- Preventing trees and shrubs from growing into neighbors' property.
- Outdoor storage of items should be limited to exterior furniture. Excess construction materials, metal recyclable collections, and debris shall be kept inside structures.
- Cracked or heaving pavement shall be patched or replaced to prevent tripping or further damage.



We appreciate you keeping all property in Mount Prospect well maintained. If you have concerns about unkept property in your neighborhood or to request service, visit mountprospect.org/services/customer-service-request or call 847.870.5668.

News from the Finance Department Electronic Bill Delivery

You can now enroll to take advantage of electronic billing for your water/sewer/refuse bills at mountprospect.org/BillPay. Once registered, you will receive email notifications when a new bill is ready for viewing, be able to view the current bill and your billing history from the time you enter the program, navigate to the optional online payment portal, and manage ebilling delivery and email address preferences.

Payment Options

If you choose to use traditional payment methods, the following options are available:

- One-time credit or debit card payment (with no additional service fee) at mountprospect.org/BillPay.
- Recurring credit or debit card payment (with no additional service fee) at mountprospect.org/BillPay. With this option funds are withdrawn on the due date of the bill.
- Visit our 24-hour payment kiosk located outside of Village Hall, 50 South Emerson Street. You can access your account on the kiosk by entering your account number or scanning the QR code on your bill. The kiosk accepts cash, checks, and credit or debit cards. The kiosk can scan the account information on a blank check and

then process the amount you enter on the kiosk, allowing you to make partial or in-full payments. Printed, text, or email receipts are available.

• Drop your payment off at the 24-hour payment boxes outside the front door of Village Hall and on the north side of the parking deck.

Of course, you can always mail your payment to the Finance Department as well.

Vehicle Stickers

The deadline for purchasing 2022-2023 Mount Prospect vehicle stickers was April 30. Stickers purchased after April 30 include a late fee unless

you are new to the Village or if you are a resident who purchased a new vehicle after May 1. In those instances, you have 30 days to purchase a sticker with proof of purchase or a document reflecting a move-in date. Documents accepted as proof of move-in include: transfer stamp documents, a rental lease or moving company bill. Residents who change vehicles after having purchased a 2022-2023

vehicle sticker should contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee.



Keeping Your 4th of July Celebration Safe

Before you go out and buy any fireworks for the 4th of July, we'd like to recommend some safer substitutes like glow sticks, glow-in-the-dark toys, flashlights, and party poppers.

We hope you have big plans to celebrate with family and friends at a party or barbeque, but we encourage you to keep things safe. All fireworks are dangerous and can result in serious burns, hearing loss, and many other serious injuries. In addition, fireworks lead to fires that can cause significant property damage. Thousands of people, mostly children, are seriously injured every year due to illegal fireworks, with one-third of these resulting in permanent eye damage. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in 2019 there were more than 9,000 people treated for fireworks-related injuries and according to the National Fire Protection Association, fireworks started an estimated 19,500 fires in 2018 alone. Sparklers, which many people think are safe for kids, can reach temperatures of up to 1800°F and remain hot even after they are extinguished potentially causing burns.

The Mount Prospect Fire Department would like to remind all residents that the Village



prohibits the use, purchase, and possession of all types of fireworks, including sparklers. Fines for use of fireworks can range from \$500 to \$2,500 per incident. Please leave the use of fireworks to professionals with proper permits and training.

Summertime Burn Safety

Summertime is filled with so many great sights, sounds, tastes, and activities – backyard barbeques, decorative tiki torches in your yard, fire pits, s'mores around an open fire, and celebrations including the 4th of July. Unfortunately, many of these introduce an increased risk for burn injuries. To keep you, your family, and guests safe, keep these important tips in mind:

- Wear short sleeves or roll-up long sleeves when using the grill.
- Use barbeque tools with long handles.
- Keep everyone, including pets, at least 3' away from grills, firepits and campfires.
- Leave fireworks to trained professionals.

Should any burns occur, these first-aid treatments can minimize the impact:

- Cool the burn. Hold the area under cool (not cold) running water for about 10 minutes. If the burn is on the face, apply a cool, wet cloth until the pain eases. For a mouth burn from hot food or drink, put a piece of ice in the mouth for a few minutes.
- Remove rings or other tight items from the burned area. Try to do this quickly and gently, before the area swells.
- Don't break blisters. Blisters help protect against infection. If a blister does break, gently clean the area with water and apply an antibiotic ointment.
- Apply lotion. After the burn is cooled, apply a lotion, such as one with aloe vera or cocoa butter. This helps prevent drying and provides relief.
- Bandage the burn. Cover the burn with a clean bandage. Wrap it loosely to avoid putting pressure on burned skin. Bandaging keeps air off the area, reduces pain, and protects blistered skin.
- If needed, take a nonprescription pain reliever, such as ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin IB, others), naproxen sodium (Aleve) or acetaminophen (Tylenol, others).

SAFETY RULES:

Burning in a fire pit/portable approved fire container is allowed provided:

- The fire pit/portable approved fire container is less than 3 feet in diameter
 The burning pile is less than 2 feet in
- height • The fire pit/portable approved fire container is at least 15 feet from any structure if it has a spark/flame
- arrestor; The fire pit/portable approved fire container is at least 25 feet from any structure if it DOES NOT have a spark/flame arrestor
- Gas fire pit/portable approved fire container is at least 10 feet away from any structure and has a remote shutoff control valve
- Burning seasoned firewood
- Burning that creates a limited amount of smoke and is not a nuisance to adjoining properties
- Burning that is attended by a person at all times (never unattended)

**NOTE: These rules do not apply to propane or charcoal grills. For any questions or concerns, contact the Fire Prevention Bureau at 847-818-5253

Freezee Fridays are Back

Be ready to enjoy a nice break from the heat every Friday this summer as your Mount Prospect Police Department officers will be handing out freeze pops throughout town. It's a great way to meet your local patrol officers and enjoy a tasty treat. Our officers look forward to sharing the fun.

Protect Your Kids and Pets

As summertime temperatures heat up, the police department would like to remind everyone about the danger of leaving kids or pets unattended in a car. On hot days, the inside of a car heats up very quickly, reaching dangerous levels, even up to 125 degrees, in just a few minutes. Cracking windows does not help slow the heating process or decrease the temperature.

To build good safety habits, try these simple steps:

- Place the child's diaper bag or other item in the front seat to remember that the child is with you.
- Make it a habit of opening the back car door every time you park to ensure no one is left behind. To enforce this habit, place an item that you can't start your day without in the back seat such as an employee badge, laptop, phone, or handbag.
- Instruct your childcare provider to call you right away if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.
- Clearly announce and confirm who is getting each child out of the vehicle. Miscommunication can lead to thinking someone else got the child out of the car.

It's equally important to make sure kids can't get into a parked car:

• Keep parked vehicles locked at all times, especially in the garage or driveway. Ask neighbors and visitors to do the same.

When Should I Call 911?

In short, any time you feel you or someone is in danger, when you see suspicious activity, or need any type of police assistance you should call 911.

Dialing 911 is the best way to get a police officer to your location, even

if the situation is not an emergency. Whether you need to report a crime or a dog in the neighborhood is barking at 2 a.m. keeping you awake, 911 is the way to go.



- Never leave car keys within the reach of children.
- Install childproof knob covers and door alarms to prevent children from exiting your home unnoticed.
- Teach children to honk the horn or turn on hazard lights if they ever become trapped inside a car.
- If a child is missing, immediately check the inside, floorboards, and trunk of all vehicles in the area carefully, even if they're locked.

You should never leave a child unattended in or around cars, even for a brief moment. If you see a child alone in a vehicle, call 911 immediately. If the child seems hot or sick, get them out as quickly as possible. Holidays, a period that includes a new schedule, or during a crisis are all times when tragedies occur so be extra cautious during those times.

Finally, use drive-thru services when available if you are picking up food, going to the bank or making other quick stops and pay for gas at the pump.

Caution in Work Zones Saves Lives

For many workers, simply going to work can put them at risk. It is incumbent on all of us to take special care to protect construction workers, utility professionals, police, fire, and EMT personnel, truck drivers, and even sales personnel as we drive through their workspace. The American Society of Safety Engineers (ASSE) has developed some essential safety tips for everyone to follow:

DO

- Pay attention to the orange diamond-shaped warning signs or electronic message boards posted in advance of a road construction project.
- Dedicate your full attention to driving when passing through a work zone.
- Watch for flaggers in work zones and follow their direction or posted instructions.
- Keep an eye out for construction workers, their equipment, and vehicles, as well as the vehicles around you.
- Monitor traffic flow around you, watching for stopped or slowing traffic.
- Obey posted speed limits in and around work zones.
- Expect the unexpected. Anticipate potential dangers.
- Watch for detours and lane diversions.
- Use extra caution at night.
- Watch for emergency vehicles and give them extra space as needed.

DON'T

- Change the radio or use your phone to call or text while driving.
- Follow too closely to the vehicle in front of you. Most of the accidents within a work zone are rear-end collisions.
- Speed up or slow down significantly while going through a work zone.
- Slow down to look at the construction work being done.
- Change lanes within a work zone.
- Resume normal speed until after you emerge completely out of the work zone area.

Remember, most states have instituted laws regarding work zones. Penalties for speeding in these areas are double that of the normal penalties in a non-work zone stretch of road.



Update to Textile Recycling Program

Effective April 1 of this year, the following changes were made to the Village's Textile Recycling Program:

- Simple Recycling no longer provides curbside collection for textiles.
- To schedule a front-door pick-up visit at simplerecycling.com/ schedule-a-pick-up or call 866.835.5068.
- Orange recycling bags are no longer required. Simply place your textile materials in a clean box, paper bag, or plastic bag and place

at your door.

The Village's Textile Recycling Program accepts men's, women's or children's clothing including boots, shoes, sandals, socks, undergarments, belts, ties, handbags, purses, coats, jackets, gloves, hats, scarves, sheets, pillow cases, pillows, blankets, comforters, table linens, towels, stuffed animals, tools, and dishes.

Become a Better Recycler



Mount Prospect residents can now become better and more active recyclers by downloading the free Recycle Coach app. Available for computers, mobile devices, and through digital assistants like Amazon Alexa or Google Home, Recycle Coach makes it easy for you to get local disposal information on

thousands of household items with a simple voice command.

You can use the app to:

- Access custom curbside collection and events calendars.
- Receive collection reminders and real-time updates on any service interruptions.
- Get local disposal information and collection requirements for everything from everyday items to more uncommon ones by using the What Goes Where? search tool.
- Take the What Type of Recycler Are You? quiz to see your status as a recycler and to get tips and suggestions to improve your recycling awareness.

Spring Beautification

The Village has launched a number of planting projects this spring with great progress being made already. Tree planting is underway as we replace recently-removed trees along streets and in parkways. The Village designs, plants, and maintains annual flower plantings at fifteen different locations throughout the village. Some of the larger plantings can be seen at:

- Central Road/Rand Road monument sign.
- Public Works entrance 1700 West Central Road.
- Rt. 83 and Lincoln Street intersection.
- Wolf Road and Feehanville Drive intersection.
- South end of Village Hall along Busse Avenue.
- Water tower at Maple Street and Northwest Highway.





You will also see a number of hanging baskets throughout downtown and along Prospect Avenue.

The Village has a number of butterfly gardens, with the largest located at Mount Prospect and Central Roads. The Village also maintains five gardens as part of the Monarch Waystation program. By creating and maintaining these gardens, Mount Prospect helps to contribute to useable habitat for the purpose of increasing monarch butterfly populations. The Garden Club of Mount Prospect also maintains a butterfly garden at Moehling Park.
