News from the Building Department The Importance of Renter's Insurance



While most landlords have insurance policies for their properties, those policies generally cover only the structure itself and not the property of, or expenses incurred by, the tenants. If you are renting an apartment or home, it is important to have a renter's insurance policy. While many

landlords require it, it is your responsibility as a tenant to keep the policy active. Should it lapse, coverage could be denied if needed.

In the event of a fire, flood, theft, or other emergency, you may incur serious injuries, have property damage, lose valuables, or require temporary housing, all of which can be very costly.



Citizen Emergency Preparedness Training





Many of these topics are reviewed in a free 20-hour Emergency Preparedness course offered by Mount Prospect Emergency Management, a division of the Fire Department. These topics will help you, your family, and members of the community be prepared in the event of a local disaster.

The Citizen Emergency Preparedness Training classes will be held on Wednesday evenings, October 5 through November 16, from 6:30-9:30 pm, at Mount Prospect Fire Station 14, located at 2000 E. Kensington.

The training will provide you with an overview on emergency preparedness, how to use a fire extinguisher, basic first aid, light search and rescue, and what you might need in a preparedness kit.

The course outline includes disaster planning, storms and weather, fire safety and utilities and more.

Community/Economic Development

Grant Programs for Businesses

Commercial and industrial property owners will be receiving a mailing related to the recently published **Green Buildings and Website Improvement Grant Programs**. The Village encourages business owners to apply for these programs which allocate funds from the Federal American Rescue Plan.

Qualifying businesses and/or commercial property owners can apply for the Green Buildings Grant to further sustainable initiatives and implement green infrastructure. This grant provides a 50% match or \$10,000 (whichever is less) for projects like installing solar panels on rooftops, installing electric vehicle charging stations, green roofs, micro wind turbines, or other measures which promote sustainability or decrease total energy consumption on a specific property. A total of \$150,000 has been allocated to this fund for the 2022 and 2023 calendar years.

The Website Improvement Grant aims to improve or create a digital footprint for qualifying businesses in the Village. The grant offers a 50% match, or up to \$5,000 (whichever is less). Businesses will hire a third-party consultant which specializes in web design to perform the upgrades or create a website, and the Village will reimburse the costs associated with the improvements up to the maximum amount allowed. Funding has been allocated for the 2022 and 2023 calendar years, with a fund total of \$75,000.

Annual Inspections for Businesses

Any new or established business operating in Mount Prospect must receive an annual fire department inspection. Inspections are conducted to verify that buildings continue to be in compliance with fire and life safety code requirements for the safety of the customers, employees, and first responders. Businesses which are changing ownership must also receive an inspection before a license will be issued to the new owners. To have a successful inspection, review and prepare for the visit by following this checklist.

When checking the exterior of the building or suite, the fire department will look for these items:

- Address and/or suite number is clearly visible from the street.
- Correct keys are in the Knox Box.
- No Parking lanes and signage are maintained to allow for fire department access.
- Fire hydrants are accessible, visible, and operational.
- Fire department connections are accessible and visible with appropriate signage displayed.
- All outside utilities such as gas or electric meters are labeled in multi-tenant buildings.

The inside inspection will cover items such as:

- Exit signs are functional, clear, and unobstructed.
- All emergency lights are properly functioning.
- Current annual inspection tags are kept on site for all fire extinguishers.
- The riser for the fire sprinkler system has a current annual inspection tag.
- The fire alarm is functional with an annual test report available.
- Any kitchen hoods are cleaned, maintained, and operational.
- Kitchen hood suppression systems have a current bi-annual inspection tag.
- Exits and exit access is clear and accessible.
- Exit doors have the correct hardware and are accessible.
- Correct door signage is present on doors for the Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP), the fire sprinkler/riser and the electrical/mechanical rooms.
- Electrical, mechanical and sprinkler riser rooms are clear of combustible storage.
- All electrical panel circuits are properly labeled.
- There are no openings in the electrical panel.
- All electrical switches, outlets and junction boxes have proper covers.
- Any extension cords are for temporary use only and are not used for a permanent power source.
- Power strips are only used for electronics.
- Power strips are not linked together.
- All flammable or combustible liquids are stored properly.
- Aisle widths throughout the facility are maintained.

What to Do If Someone Knocks at Your Door

It has become increasingly common for burglars to simply knock on doors before burglarizing a home. If no one answers, they assume the home is unoccupied and force their way in. This is occurring even during daylight hours.

For many years, it has been common practice to tell children who are home alone not to answer the door when someone rings the bell or knocks. They were often instructed to stay out of sight, hiding in a closet, the basement, or under a bed if someone came to the door. As adults, we often do the same, preferring not to be bothered by someone at the door. With these new tactics by criminals, we all need to review our practices.

When someone knocks on your door or rings the bell, see who is there by looking out the window, through a peephole in the door, or by using a security camera. Acknowledge the person without opening the door. Remember, you are not obligated to open the door. You have the right to ask the person to leave your property at any time. If the person does not leave, or is acting suspicious, call 911 immediately and have an officer come assist you.

Four Signs that it's a Scam

Here are several tips to help you identify scams.

1. Scammers pretend to be from an organization you know.

Scammers may pretend to be with the government, often using an agency name you may recognize such as the Social Security Administration, the IRS, or Medicare, or may make up a name that sounds familiar or official. They may also claim to be from a well-known business, telecommunications company, utility company, or even a charity. They can now use technology to change the name and number that appears on your caller ID.

2. Scammers claim there is a problem or a prize.

If you speak to these individuals, they may try to intimidate you by saying you are in trouble in some way, or that you owe money. A frequent scam involves someone calling you and claiming that someone in your family has had an emergency. Another approach is to send emails saying there is a virus on your computer. Never respond to someone who says there is a problem with an account of yours and asks you to verify personal information. In other instances, calls or emails may tell you that you have won a prize but you need to provide personal information or pay a fee to claim it.

3. There is pressure to act quickly.

Scammers create a sense of urgency to get you to act before you have time to think. On the phone they may tell you not to hang up. Messages may threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you if you are from another country if you do not take immediate action. Others may tell you your computer is infected with a virus that needs immediate attention.

4. Scammers will instruct you to send them money in a specific way. Avoid any instance in which someone instructs you to send money through a

Avoid any instance in which someone instructs you to send money through a money transfer service or by putting money on a gift card and then give them

the number on the back. Others may send you a check (which is fake), ask you to deposit it, and then send them the money.

Now that you are aware of some of their tactics, here are steps you can take to avoid being a victim:

- Block or filter unwanted phone calls or text messages.
- Never share your personal or financial information in a request that you did not expect to receive.
 - Legitimate organizations won't call, text, or email you asking for personal information like your Social Security number, bank account numbers, or credit card information.
 - If you get an email or text message from a company you do
 business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any
 links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy.
 Always look up their phone number instead of using a number they
 gave you or the number from your caller ID.
- Resist the pressure to act hastily.
 - Legitimate businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone
 who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is
 a scammer.
- Be familiar with how scammers ask you to pay.
 - Never pay someone who insists you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service, and never deposit a check and send money back to someone.
- Get advice or guidance from someone you trust.
 - Before you do anything else, tell someone a friend, a family member, a neighbor — what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

Prevent Convenient Crime by Locking Your Car

Thefts from unlocked vehicles represent a large percentage of property crimes reported in the Village. Car burglars look for unlocked vehicles so don't make your car an

for unlocked vehicles so don't make your car an easy target for them. In addition, close windows and sunroofs, park in well-lit areas, and don't try hiding keys in your car — thieves know just where to look.

It's Time for Fall Leaf Collection

The Village's fall loose-leaf collection program for unbagged leaves provides residents with a convenient, no-cost means of disposing of leaves. Through the program, residents can place loose leaves at the curb once each week on scheduled dates between Monday, October 17 and Friday, December 2 for collection by Public Works.

The program is for loose leaves only. Other yard materials including branches, bushes, or grass clippings must still be placed in collection bags and put out under waste collection guidelines. Piles of leaves that include other yard waste will not be collected from the curb by the crews.

Leaves should be raked onto the pavement one foot from the curb line no more than 1 day before the scheduled collection day. If you miss the collection, do not rake leaves to the curb as trucks will pass each street only once on the collection day. **Under no circumstances are residents allowed to burn leaves.**

Recycling for Thermometers and Thermostats

Old thermometers can contain up to 700 milligrams of mercury which poses health and environmental risks. Old thermostats are also likely to contain mercury. The Village and the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) offer residents a recycling program for mercury-containing thermometers, thermostats, and wall switches.

Residents may bring these materials to the Mount Prospect Public Works Department, 1700 West Central Road for safe recycling. Items can be dropped off Monday through Friday from 7:30 am to 5:00 pm. For more information call 847.870.5640.



Take Care of Your Trees This Fall

If you enjoy the beautiful fall colors from trees in your yard, be sure to take care of them even after the leaves have fallen. You can send trees into dormancy on a healthy note by following some important steps this fall.

The first step is to keep trees watered in the fall season. Generally, an inch of rain per week will be sufficient but if we run into a dry period, you will want to do some watering yourself. Simply run a sprinkler under the tree canopy, keeping in mind that roots can extend out as far as a tree is tall, so keep that entire area watered.

A layer of mulch beneath the canopy of the tree will help retain soil moisture and prevent the ground from freezing which will, in turn, promote root growth. Wood chips are a great, natural source of covering. A 2-3" layer will also help reduce weed growth which allows you to keep harmful power lawn tools away from the base of the tree. Be careful, though, not to pile the mulch up against the trunk of the tree, keeping it at ground level right next to the trunk instead.

If trees are lacking nourishment, fall is a great time to fertilize them, though timing is critical. If not completed by early September, it is better to wait until a tree has gone dormant in late November. This prevents a flush of new growth that will not be hardened off prior to the arrival of freezing temperatures.

Spend some time in your yard during the fall to inspect trees, looking for insect damage or pruning needs. While most insect damage occurs early in the season, some control measures may be needed in the fall prior to the next growing season for best results. If significant damage is noted,

it is best to consult a tree-care professional as some insect life-cycles are different and can impact your trees at different times.

Finally, if you are up to the task, some light pruning in fall is a great idea. Removing dead and broken limbs can improve the health of a tree, as well as reducing insect damage and fungi. Removing fallen leaves, fruit, and other tree debris from the landscape can help reduce foliar diseases the following season.



Home Hot Spots for Water Quality

Please review these home water quality tips from the IEPA.

Around every yard are spots where your activities affect water quality. Take a look around your own home and yard with an eye toward water quality.

Good Water Quality Practices:

- Composting converts leaves and grass clippings into a nutrient-rich mulch for your planting beds and gardens.
- Natural areas and planting beds lend variety to a residential lawn, attract wildlife, and mean you have less lawn to mow and fertilize.
- Directing downspouts to unpaved areas lets rain water soak into the ground which controls the flow of runoff into the lakes.
- Safe chemical storage protects the lakes and your family. Make sure your lawn chemicals, car care products, and household cleaners are properly sealed in their containers. Safely store these containers away from people, pets, and runoff water.

Bad Water Quality Practices:

- Limit fertilizer and pesticide use, and sweep these off of paved areas to keep them out of storm sewers.
- A small oil drip or gas leak may not seem like a big deal, but after a
 good rain these toxic chemicals become runoff that washes into the
 lakes. Keeping your car tuned will help prevent these problems.
- Cover bare soil by planting the area with grass or some other vegetation, and then immediately covering with mulch or hay until vegetation takes root.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection September 24

Every home contains some form of household hazardous waste in the form of paint, drain cleaner, gasoline, propane, pool chemicals, fertilizer, and more. These materials should never be disposed of in the garbage, recycling bin, or by pouring them down the drain or storm sewer. You can keep your home free of these toxic materials by dropping them off at our Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event from 8 am to 2 pm on September 24. Household materials only can be dropped off at the Public Works facility, 1700 West Central Road. This service is provided for Mount Prospect residents only. No business or commercial waste please.
