









Village to Recognize Local Veterans

As a means of recognizing the contribution of Mount Prospect residents to our armed services, the Village is introducing a new street banner program. Banners will be flown along Northwest Highway in the downtown corridor for periods of two weeks before and after Memorial Day and Veterans Day each year. A total of 30 veterans will be honored each year.

Online Permitting and Licenses

Since 2020, more than half the permit and license applications in Mount Prospect have been completed through our online portal that can be found by clicking on the Permits and Licenses button on the left side of the Village's home page at mountprospect.org. The portal utilizes software hosted by Citizenserve and is designed to reduce reliance on paper drawings and applications while speeding up the permit processing timelines.

Vehicle Sticker Program Suspension

In a letter to Village stakeholders on November 22, 2022, Village Manager Michael Cassady announced the suspension of the Village's vehicle sticker program for fiscal year 2023. The decision followed a lengthy review of Village revenues and expenses and the five-year Community Investment Program. Along with feedback from residents, it was determined that due to positive trends in retail sales tax and other high-performing revenues, the Village would suspend the program for this fiscal year.

Staff will closely monitor monthly revenues throughout the year and will have the option to permanently eliminate the sticker program in the 2024 budget.

Emergency Management Disaster Preparedness Expo

There are many things that you can do to be prepared at home for any type of emergency. Disasters and emergencies can happen at any time and the more prepared you are,



the better you can calmly react to protect your family. To assist, the Village's Emergency Management Team will be hosting its first Disaster Preparedness Expo on **April 29**, **from 10 am to 2 pm at Fire Station #14**, **2000 East Kensington Road**.

Among the topics covered will be severe weather, managing power outages, flooding, utility safety, how to properly use a fire extinguisher, 911 calls and procedures, home and auto emergency kits, and much more.

Special guests and presenters will include Nicor Gas, Penco Generators, The Red Cross, The Salvation Army, and representatives of the Mount Prospect Police, Fire, and Building Departments. They will provide tips on emergency planning, how to identify potential risks in your home, ways to limit vulnerability in the case of a disaster, salvage and recovery planning, and knowing how to coordinate the effort required to restore your property and home back to normal after an emergency.

All residents are encouraged to attend this free event, and kids are welcome, too! Stop by throughout the day to win prizes and enjoy some free giveaway items.

Community/Economic Development

Community Development Block Grant Home Improvement Program

The Village of Mount Prospect currently provides two home improvement programs for low- and moderate-income residents: the Single-Family Rehabilitation Loan Program and the Home Weatherization Grant Program. Both programs are financed through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds allocated to the Village by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).



The Single-Family
Rehabilitation
Program provides
an interest-free loan
up to a maximum
of \$25,000, which is
repaid upon sale or
change of title of the
property. Loans can
be used to correct
code violations
including electrical,
plumbing and roof

repairs, replacement of old equipment such as furnaces and water heaters, increasing energy-efficiency, and improvements for disabled persons.

The Home Weatherization Grant Program provides a \$1,500 matching grant to be used for energy efficiency improvements. Grants can be used to install insulation, storm windows and doors, weather-stripping, energy efficient furnaces and water heaters, and other items that can help save on the cost of home utilities.

Applicants may choose one of the two available programs and must meet program qualifications. To be eligible, applicants must live within the corporate limits of Mount Prospect, have owned and occupied their home for at least one year prior to applying, and meet HUD's current low-income limits.

Updated Illinois Smoke Alarm law

Effective January 1, Illinois passed a law that requires any new smoke alarms being installed in a single- or multi-family home to have a 10-year sealed battery. Battery powered smoke alarms currently existing in homes may remain in place until they exceed 10 years from their manufactured date or they fail to respond to operability tests or malfunction in any way. At that time, a replacement unit must have a 10-year sealed battery. This applies to residents that are still using alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired.

Assistant Chief Bryan Loomis wants to stress that the Fire Department strongly recommends using the 10-year life sealed battery smoke alarms, though residents do not need to immediately replace functioning units that are less than 10 years old. The 10-year sealed battery smoke alarms can be purchased at most local hardware and home improvement stores.

There are a few exceptions to this law including homes that were built after 1988 that already have hardwired smoke alarms and homes with wireless

integrated alarms that use low-power radio frequency communications, Wi-Fi, or other Wireless Local Area Networking capability.

2022 in Review

It was a busy year for the Mount Prospect Fire Department in 2022! A review of our activities includes:

- Responding to 7,023 calls, an 8% increase from the prior year. This also represents the largest number of calls in any year on record.
- 4,986, or 71% of the calls, were for Emergency Medical Services (EMS).
- The remaining 29% of calls covered events such as structure fires, smaller contained fires, vehicle fires, outside container fires, fire alarms, odor investigations, and Mutual Aid requests of various natures from surrounding towns.
- Our staff completed 2,530 fire inspections.
- We investigated 20 fires.
- Among our staff, we had 3 new hires, 2 promotions, and 2 retirements.
- We also reached nearly 35,000 citizens through our Public Education
- Fire Prevention completed 322 plan reviews including plans for fire alarms, sprinkler systems, interior remodels, and new construction.

Make It a Safe Exchange

With online transactions between individuals becoming increasingly common, we recommend always meeting in a safe place to complete the transaction. Residents are welcome to conduct transactions in the parking lot or front lobby of Police Headquarters at 911 East Kensington Road. No permission is required, and you do not need to check in with the department when making the exchange. While the area is under video surveillance 24 hours per day, police personnel will not be involved in any transactions. You should assume that if somebody is not willing to come to the Police Department to conduct a transaction, it is probably not a legitimate transaction.

Here are some other tips to help keep you safe while exchanging items you are buying or selling online:

- Only participate in transactions with local individuals.
- Do not go to a transaction alone.
- Make sure a friend or family member is aware of the details of the transaction before you go.
- Always insist on meeting in a public area during daylight hours.
- Never conduct a transaction in your home or anyone else's.
- Be particularly cautious when buying or selling valuable items such as vehicles and jewelry.
- Trust your instincts. If something sounds like a scam, it probably is.

Before being promoted to Sergeant in 2022, Ollech served in the Patrol Section, Crime Prevention Unit, and the Investigative Section. His many roles have included working as a breathalyzer operator, training officer, field youth officer, crime free housing officer, and arson investigator. Dirk was also an Investigator with the Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT) and is a police composite artist. His unique ability to draw a composite of an offender, based solely on the victim's recollection, is a much sought-after skill and has aided several neighboring police departments by helping



them create a composite. Several of his composites have been shown on TV news stations and led to arrests for various crimes, such as armed robbery and attempted kidnapping.

Sergeant Ollech was recognized as the Department's Officer of the Year in 2011, Runner up Officer of the Year in 2019 and Officer of the Quarter in 2011 and again in 2019. He also received the Veterans of Foreign Wars VFW Public Servant of the year award.

Our yard waste collection services resume on April 3 this year. In addition to traditional yard waste such as lawn clippings, branches, and twigs, you may also put out organic materials such as fruits and vegetables.

Using a cart from our rental program or your own rigid container, you can put out an unlimited amount of yard or organic materials without stickers or associated fees. Carts can be rented from the Village for \$4 per month and you can choose from among 35-, 65- or 95-gallon sizes. The monthly fee is paid directly to the Village. Kraft paper bags can be used for yard waste as well.

Electronics Recycling Drop-off

As a means of being a greener community, the Village, in association with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), has developed an electronics recycling drop-off program.

Beginning April 12, residents can drop off appropriate electronic materials at the Mount Prospect Public Works facility, 1700 West Central Road, Wednesdays from 10 am to noon, and at the Glenview Transfer Station, 1151 North River Road, Saturdays from 9-11 am. The transfer station will be closed following any holidays.

Shared Sidewalk Improvements



Keeping sidewalks in good condition is an important part of maintaining our infrastructure. The Village is currently accepting applications from property owners (residential and commercial) who are interested in replacing sections of sidewalk adjacent to their

property as part of our Shared Cost Sidewalk Program. Applications can be found online at mountprospect.org/departments/public-works/engineering/sidewalk-replacement or by stopping by the Public Works Department located at 1700 West Central Road.

Applications will be accepted through May 26 and will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis until allocated funds are exhausted. The property owner will be responsible for \$81.25 of the cost per sidewalk square with the Village paying the remaining amount as established by the contractor's bid.

Replacement Program for Lead Water Service

The Village has established a cost sharing program to replace lead water service components in single- or multi-family homes and commercial buildings. The program will assist owners who want to replace their existing lead or galvanized steel water service with a copper water service from the public water main to the water meter inside the property.

The Village will reimburse 100% of the cost to replace the service line from the water main to the water shutoff valve, known as the B-box, and two-thirds of the cost to replace the service from the shutoff valve to the water meter, up to \$10,000 of the actual expenses incurred.

FLOOD PREPAREDNESS & PROTECTION | Protecting Your Home or Business

Some properties in Mount Prospect experience flooding conditions during heavy rain events. These floods are the result of one or more of the components of the drainage system failing or being overwhelmed. The various components of the drainage system include the following:

- Five waterways carry stormwater into, through, and away from the Village:
 The Des Plaines River, McDonald Creek, Feehanville Ditch, Weller Creek,
 and Higgins Creek. In addition to stormwater running off directly into
 these waterways, storm sewers from our neighborhoods also contribute
 water. When the amount of water attempting to flow through these
 waterways exceeds the capacity of the waterway, the water backs up and
 can flood nearby areas.
- More locally, networks of storm sewers, combined sewers, drainage swales (shallow ditches), and detention ponds exist throughout the Village. All were installed to safely drain stormwater runoff and convey it to one of the waterways mentioned above. As with those waterways, if the amount of water entering any portion of the system exceeds the capacity, the water backs up and can flood nearby areas.
- Individual homes may have downspouts to control the way stormwater
 runoff is shed from a roof and footing drains to drain groundwater from
 around the foundation. Footing drains in newer construction discharge
 to the ground by way of a sump pump. Older construction may have the
 footing drains and floor drains connected directly to the sewer system.
 Excessive groundwater and/or surcharging in the receiving sewer system
 can cause flooding within the basement.

Throughout the Village are several Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs). SFHAs are 100-year flood event boundaries, areas that have an annual 1% chance of reaching flood levels during an event. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has prepared a map that illustrates the SFHAs associated with each waterway. These maps can be used for basic Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) information, which is especially useful for lenders, insurance agents, house hunters, real estate agents, and interested citizens. Our Engineering Department can assist you in finding your property on a map.

Please note that the SFHAs identified on the FIRMs only reflect areas of potential flooding related to overflowing of the main waterways. Localized flooding may occur due to causes unrelated to these waterways and, therefore, would not be reflected on the FIRMs. Thus, an area may still be subject to flooding even if FEMA has not identified it on the FIRMs.

Flooding can be unpredictable and occur with little or no warning. To best prepare and protect yourself, adhere to these guidelines:

- Prepare a list of emergency numbers that can be easily accessed during a flood. Keep a back-up copy at another location.
- In case you should need to identify lost or damaged property, have an inventory of personal property. Photographs and videos of items or complete rooms can be very helpful.
- Use a safe deposit box or other secure location away from your home to

store copies of valuable items such as insurance policies, vehicle titles, deeds, bank and credit card account information, wills, and important telephone numbers.

- Be sure to discuss protection against floods and sewer back-ups with your insurance agent as part of a comprehensive review.
- Keep cleaning supplies on-hand so you can begin a prompt clean-up after a flood.

Should your basement flood, be cautious before entering the basement.

- If evacuation appears necessary, turn off all utilities at the main power switch and close the main gas valve.
- Be alert of gas leaks. Use a flashlight rather than candles or lanterns if checking for damage while the power is out.
- Do not touch any electrical equipment unless it is in a dry area and you
 are standing on a piece of dry wood while wearing rubber gloves and
 rubber-sole boots or shoes.
- Clean anything that became wet from the flood as the water is often contaminated and can present a significant health threat.

So how can you flood-proof your home or business? These retrofitting steps have proven successful in offering protection:

- Elevation | This involves raising the house so that the lowest floor is above the flood protection level.
- Relocation | Moving a building out of the flood area is the surest way to protect it from a flood.
- Floodwalls | They work to keep water from reaching your home by constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and the flood water.
- Dry flood-proofing | Makes the building walls and floor watertight so water does not enter.
- Wet flood-proofing | Modifies the structure and relocates the contents so that when flood water enters the building there is little or no damage.

Because any changes you make could adversely impact other properties, you must get a permit from the Community Development Department before proceeding with any alteration to your building structure or land, including re-grading or filling in the floodplain.

You should know that most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover losses due to flooding. However, because the Village is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), flood insurance is available to all property owners or renters in the Village, regardless of whether the property is in a SFHA. Coverage is available for the building and the contents. Because of the Village's participation in the CRS Program, property owners are eligible for up to a 20% discount on the flood insurance premiums. Please take note that there is a 30-day waiting period after the purchase of flood insurance before it goes into effect. In addition, some insurance companies offer sewer backup and sump pump failure insurance that can be added on to your homeowner's insurance policy. Contact your insurance agent to find out more about flood insurance.

As we have all witnessed, brazen criminal activity is occurring across our nation, and Mount Prospect and our neighboring communities are not immune. We need to be all over this. As such, I am in complete support of hiring three additional police officers as our Chief of Police, Mike Eterno, has proposed for 2023.

These three new officers would be in addition to the three officers hired in 2022. While these three police positions are unbudgeted, we will find the funding to get this done. These officers, fighting crime in Mount Prospect, will help bring a greater level of safety to our citizens given the local criminal activity we are experiencing today.

I want everyone to know that the Police Department is also transitioning its current two-officer Gang Enforcement Unit into a three-officer Special Response Team. In addition, a second dedicated Police Department Social Worker has been added to expand victim and community services offered to our residents. These Village social workers are available to respond and assist our police officers on calls for service. While our officers are trained in crisis intervention, working with our social workers has helped people in crisis and has de-escalated many situations.

Finally, be an active citizen of our Village when it comes to safety. Our police officers cannot be everywhere all the time so therefore, the safety of the community cannot fall solely on our Police Department. Be the eyes and ears of your neighborhood.

Call 911 when you see or even suspect any suspicious activity in your neighborhood. We all must play a part and help.

Working together with our Police Department, we will keep Mount Prospect safe.
