Mount Prospect's VFW Post 1337 and American Legion Post 525 will host Diane Carlson Evans as the keynote speaker at the annual Memorial Day

ceremony held at Lions Park Veterans Memorial Band Shell. Ms. Carlson will also serve as the Grand Marshall for the Village parade.

Ms. Carlson served as an Army nurse in Vietnam treating our wounded soldiers as well as those of our allies and civilians. Upon her return home she experienced hostility toward the war and its veterans. In 1983 she began a 10-year journey that, despite numerous obstacles and deeply rooted sexism, resulted in the dedication of the Vietnam Women's Memorial located adjacent to the Wall.

Ms. Carlson is the author of Healing Wounds, a book that recounts her military service and her fight for women to have a place of honor in Washington DC. Copies of her book will be available for sale at the event and proceeds will be donated to the Vietnam Women's Memorial Foundation.

The ceremony also will feature Mount Prospect Community Band, the Marching Knights of Prospect High School, and a 21-gun salute by the Mount Prospect Veterans Color Guard.

News from the Building Department Backyard Fun

Is this the year you install a new pool or hot tub in your yard? If either has a water depth of more than 24" you will need to submit the following to the Village to obtain a required permit:

- Define the type of pool you are installing spa/hot tub, above-ground, in-ground, permanent, or temporary.
- Provide a current plat of survey with the location of the pool on the parcel with dimensions to all structures and property lines. All pools shall be located behind the home, out of the front, side, and exterior side yards.
- The location of existing underground or overhead electric lines. Be sure to call JULIE at 811 to help locate underground utilities prior to submitting for a permit (see page 8).
- All pools and hot tubs must be a minimum of 5 feet horizontally from underground electric services and 10 feet horizontally from overhead electric services.
- The location of pump, filter, and heater as applicable must be shown.
- Identify the location of existing or proposed electric receptacles. You can
 download information on required receptacles and locations on the village
 website at mountprospect.org.
- An existing and proposed panel schedule for the electric service. If the service is less than 200 amps, a set of load calculations will need to be submitted.
- The methods of grounding and bonding the pool and equipment.
- Show the size and location of any surrounding patio or deck and the methods for construction. Decks will require frost depth piers and/or footings, and the proper sizing of all wood members.
- A minimum 48" tall barrier is required; please show the location of any
 gates or safety barriers. An above-ground pool with the top edge of the pool
 at 48" or taller from grade can be the required barrier. Otherwise, a fence
 will be required around the pool itself or around the entire yard. Selfclosing and locking gates will be required.
- Location and type of ladder.
- If the house opens directly onto the pool deck with no barrier in between, an alarm will be required on any doors exiting to that pool area.

A permit and inspection are required to ensure the safety of you, your guests, and your neighbors. The simple inspection will confirm that the desired location is allowable prior to the actual pool installation being approved.

EyeOnWater

Mount Prospect offers direct and secure access to your water usage data with the EyeOnWater



suite. The secure website allows you to review and analyze your water usage patterns. You can also download the EyeOnWater app to your smart phone.

With this tool, you can view your hourly usage activity, gaining greater understanding and control of the amount of water you use. The EyeOnWater online portal provides easy to understand graphs and the ability to establish alerts, including identifying potential leaks.

To register for an account you will need your zip code, account number (enter only the digits before the dash), and email address.

Water/Sewer/Refuse Bill Delivery and Payment Options

Enroll to take advantage of electronic billing for your water/sewer/refuse bills at mountprospect.org/BillPay. Once you are registered, you will receive automatic email notifications when a new bill is ready for viewing. You can view your current bill and your billing history from the time you enter the program, navigate to the optional online payment portal, and manage account preferences.

Choose from among these payment options for your water/sewer/refuse bills.

- One-time online credit/debit card payment.
- Recurring credit/debit card or bank account payment (no additional service fee). Funds are withdrawn on the due date of the bill.
- Visit our 24-hour payment kiosk located outside of Village Hall, 50 S.
 Emerson St. You may access your account by entering your account number or simply scanning the QR code that appears on your bill. The kiosk accepts credit/debit cards, checks, and cash. The kiosk can scan

the account information on a blank check and process the payment for the amount entered on the kiosk screen. Partial or entire balance payments are accepted. Receipt options include print, text, or email.

- Drop check payments in the 24-hour payment boxes located outside the front door of Village Hall and on the north side of the parking deck.
- Of course, in-person and mailed-in payments are accepted at the Finance Department as well.



Community/Economic Development

Sustainability Report

The Sustainability Ad Hoc Committee that was introduced in the Village's most recent Strategic Plan has shared several longterm goals and a draft of an Implementation Plan to promote sustainability in our community. Several of the top goals include promoting environment-friendly alternatives for landscapes, reducing solid waste tonnage, and constructing new shared-use paths and sidewalks for walking and biking. To achieve these goals, consider these ideas:

- Turn off lights and appliances when not in use and utilize smart power strips to save energy. ComEd and Nicor both offer free home energy assessments, energy efficiency products, and rebates on qualifying products.
- Consider walking and biking on short trips. Carpooling and public transit help reduce transportation emissions.
- Use rain barrels to capture rainwater from your roof. This water can be used to water your lawn and plants, , filling bird baths, and more, but should not be used for drinking.
- A Community Solar Program supports renewable energy by reducing your carbon emissions without installing equipment or making a personal investment. Visit, mountprospect.org/ community/sustainability/community-solar for information.
- Composting food scraps saves space at the land fill and reduces greenhouse gas emission. Consider using the Village's organics recycling service that is provided from April to mid-December.

Several new retail, restaurant, and service venues will be coming soon to the Prospect Avenue district in downtown Mount Prospect.

F45 Training was the first to open this year at the southeast corner of Main Street and Prospect Avenue. F45 is a high-intensity physical training provider that merges three separate training styles into one 45-minute training class.



Angelo Caputo's Fresh Market will make its long-awaited debut in the Maple Street Lofts development in late April. The 15,000 square foot grocery store will offer a full array of fresh and dry goods as well as a full deli and wide selection of prepared meals to go. The Mount Prospect store will be their first prototype downtown store with a smaller format than their traditional



Lady Dahlia Tequila Bar will be opening at 127 West Prospect Avenue in mid-summer. The 3,500 square foot restaurant will feature authentic Mexican cuisine with a wide variety of tequilas for specialty drinks.



Whiskey Hill Brewing Company and Salerno's Pizzeria will both be opening around Labor Day in the new Prospect Place development at the southeast corner of Prospect Avenue and Wille Street. Whiskey Hill has a fully operational brewery on site making a variety of beers and will feature live music at the facility. Salerno's Pizzeria will be relocating their existing restaurant from Wolf and Kensington Roads to the downtown.

Aging in Community

In 2019, the Village kicked-off an initiative to make aging in our community a priority and leading to acceptance in the AARP Network of Age Friendly States and Communities.

A group of Village staff members, community partners, and residents on an Age-Friendly Task Force was tasked with creating a 3-year plan to address aging concerns in Mount Prospect.

Using an Aging in a Changing Region grant, and through a series of workshops, meetings, and surveys, the task force created Elevating Aging-in-Community in Mount Prospect – A Strategic Guide.

The task force identified five priority areas: housing, transportation, social engagement, information/communication, and health/wellness. Two goals, with corresponding objectives, have been identified for each.

A draft action plan was presented to the Village Board and the Task Force received feedback from both the Village Board and residents. The plan will now be submitted to AARP for final approval while working groups begin addressing goals and objectives. National FMS Week

Show appreciation and acknowledge those who work in Emergency Medical Services (EMS) by celebrating National EMS Week May 21 through 27. This week is an opportunity to recognize the hard work done by those who work on the medical front line, responding to potentially fatal situations every day.

Whether it is on the scene of an accident, or administering medical care in traumatic emergencies, EMS workers are dedicated to saving lives. If you happen to have a neighbor, a friend, or family member who is an EMS worker, please take a moment during this week to thank them for their service.

In 2022, the emergency medical personnel from the Mount Prospect Fire Department responded to 4,986 EMS-related incidents – that's almost 14 incidents a day. Collectively, that is 71% of all fire department calls for the year. Our EMS members are in integral part of the fire department as well as the entire Mount Prospect community.

Keep an Eye On Your ION Batteries



Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many types of devices including smart phones, laptops, toys, and even cars. They are long-lasting batteries that need to be recharged. However, improper use or damage to the battery can cause them to catch fire or explode.

To stay safe while using these devices, always purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory, such as UL. Following the manufacturer's instructions is an essential part of using products correctly. Only use batteries that are designed for that device and be sure to install them properly.

Charging your devices per the instructions will keep the batteries in top working condition. When charging your devices, only use the charging cord that came with the device. Most important, never charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or the couch as this could cause the device to overheat.

Weather Alerts

As temperatures heat up in May, there is plenty of moisture in the air, creating the perfect recipe for thunderstorms. Knowing the signs of bad weather approaching is crucial to keeping yourself safe and limiting property damage. Here are a few quick ways to prepare when you know a thunderstorm is approaching.

- Unplug as many corded appliances as you can to prevent damage or electrocution.
- Park vehicles in the garage and secure outdoor lawn furniture.
- Closing curtains and drapes can protect your family from flying glass if wind or pressure cause them to break.
- Avoid standing on concrete or leaning against concrete walls as lightning can travel through it.

The most dangerous component of any thunderstorm is lightning. It is estimated that lightning hits Earth 100 times every second. Lightning, which is 5 times hotter than the sun, is the second leading cause of weather-related deaths.

A common misconception of lightning is rubber shoes and tires will protect you when in fact they will not. A steel roof of a car will add some protection but there is still a chance of getting hurt if your vehicle is struck by lightning.

If you see power lines or trees on the ground during or after a storm, report them immediately and keep your distance until appropriate teams can clear the area.



Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month

During Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in May, we encourage riders and drivers of vehicles to reduce the number of fatalities on our roadways by working together to exercise safe practices. We remind drivers of other vehicles of these tips:

- Motorcycles are often hidden in blind spots or can be masked by other objects such
 as bushes, fences, bridges, and even the sun. Before turning or changing lanes, keep
 motorcycles in mind and always double-check before making your move.
- Always assume a motorcycle is closer than it appears; its speed and distance can be difficult for drivers to judge.
- Don't assume that a motorcycle can always maneuver out of the way.
- If you are following a motorcycle, keep extra distance between you and them as a
 motorcycle may take longer to stop under certain conditions. In addition, motorcyclists
 often slow down by downshifting or rolling off the throttle, thus not activating the brake
 light.
- When you have a greater awareness of motorcycles, the more likely you are to see them.

As for those of you riding motorcycles, do your part by keeping these items in mind:

- Be visible. Wear bright clothes and a light-colored helmet.
- Always have your headlight on, even during the day.
- Avoid riding in the blind spot of vehicles.
- If possible, flash your brake light when slowing down and before stopping.
- Pretend you are invisible. If you assume others on the road can't see you, and any car
 that can hit you will hit you, you will tend to ride in a hyper-aware mindset and learn
 to notice every detail in your surroundings. Take extra responsibility for your safety and
 ride defensively.
- Wear proper riding gear from head to toe. Full-face helmets provide the best protection, and jackets, pants, gloves, and boots that are made for riding will generally be made of abrasion-resistant material, include protective armor, and provide additional comfort.
- Use good street strategies. Constantly search the road for changing conditions and use

the Search-Evaluate-Execute (SEE) strategy to assess and respond to hazards before you have to react to an emergency.

Call Before You Dig

Springtime means planting, gardening, new decks, patios, or other additions to your home. No matter how small your project might be, before you put a shovel in the ground, be sure to call JULIE (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators). It's not only recommended, it's the law.

JULIE will find any underground utilities and mark your property accordingly. Call 811 or 800.892.0123 to schedule your free locate. Place the call at least 48 hours (not including weekends or holidays) before you begin any excavation. You can assist in the process by marking the area where you will be digging with white paint or flags. For more details visit illinois1call.com.

Our Green Thumb

To help beautify our community, annual flowers will be planted at various locations throughout the Village. You can see the designs we have developed at 15 locations including:

- The monument sign at Central and Rand Roads
- The entrance to Public Works at 1700 West Central Road
- The intersection of Rt. 83 and Lincoln Street
- The intersection of Wolf Road and Feehanville Drive
- The south end of Village Hall along Busse Avenue
- Under the water tower at Maple Street and Northwest Highway

You'll also see decorative hanging baskets throughout downtown and along Prospect Avenue.

Visit our Monarch and Pollinator Gardens

- The largest of our numerous butterfly gardens is at the intersection of Mount Prospect and Central Roads.
- The Garden Club of Mount Prospect maintains a butterfly garden at Moehling Park which serves as a central feature of the park.
- The Village also maintains five gardens as part of the Monarch Waystation program.

By creating and maintaining these gardens Mount Prospect helps to contribute to useable habitat for the purpose of increasing monarch butterfly populations.

Seasonal Tree Care

Prepare your trees for a healthy growing season with these basic steps:

- Inspect trees for signs of damage or disease before leaves appear.
- Prune dead, diseased, or unsafe branches before spring growth to minimize the spread of pests or disease.
- Pests and disease are also kept at bay by applying a slow-release fertilizer now
- Add 2" to 4" of mulch around trees.

Keep Pet Waste Out of Waterways

Cleaning up after your pet is a helpful way to protect the waterways that run through the Village. Pet waste that enters a creek in Mount Prospect can have a long journey and impact a variety of plants, animals, ecosystems, and even people.

Pet waste left on sidewalks, streets, or yards contains numerous pollutants such as nutrients and bacteria that can easily be washed into nearby storm sewers. Please discard your pet's waste by wrapping it in a plastic bag and throwing it in the garbage.

New Styrofoam Recycling Program

Current estimates indicate that expanded polystyrene (EPS), or Styrofoam, comprises as much as 30% of landfill volume worldwide. EPS is 98% air and 2% polystyrene plastic, and due to its light weight and bulky form, it is very expensive to transport. Most curbside recycling programs do not have the capability to accept this material.

To reduce our community's contribution to landfills, Public Works has been awarded two grants to purchase a foam densifier that will allow our staff to process both packaging and food service foam into reusable and resalable EPS foam ingots.

Please assist us in this effort by dropping off Styrofoam materials (except packing peanuts) at Public Works, 1700 West Central Road, every Tuesday from 10:00 am to noon, or Thursdays from 1:00-3:00 pm, holidays excepted.

Coolers, cups, foam packing blocks, egg cartons, plates and to-go containers that are clean of food residue, dry, and free of tape and labels are welcome.

Protecting Your Property from Flood Damage

In our last newsletter we began a series on flood preparedness and protection. In this installment, we'll look at things you can do to reduce damages if you are in a location that is susceptible to flooding. Before utilizing these or other floodproofing measures, contact the Mount Prospect Building Division at 847.870.5675. Building on, filling, altering, or regrading your property can have an adverse effect on other properties and likely need a permit to ensure compliance with Village Code before you begin working.

- Create watertight closures over doorways and windows to prevent water from entering during a large rain event. This is not recommended for homes with basements.
- Protect appliances like furnaces, air conditioners, and water heaters by elevating them on platforms or even moving them to higher floors if possible.
- If heavy rains are predicted, you can prevent some water from entering by placing sandbags around the exterior.
- Research property regrading options that may help keep water away from your building.
- For as little as \$25 you can purchase a plug or standpipe to prevent a sewer back-up into your basement. This is effective for water levels approximately 2-feet or less. If your location is prone to deeper levels of flooding, contact a reliable plumber to discuss overhead sewers or back-up valves. Information on these tactics, known as floodproofing or retrofitting, is available at the Mount Prospect Public Library.

The Village Floodplain Regulations help minimize the impact of flooding. If your property is within a floodplain, a permit is required for any construction activity on site.

General design parameters usually have a building at the high point of any piece of property so stormwater will run toward and then along property lines or swales, leading to a storm sewer or street. If the low points along property lines are blocked, water flow will be obstructed which can lead to backyard

flooding. Preserve the process of water flowing correctly with these steps:

- Do not install sheds, detached garages, raised gardens, or other elements that could block the flow of water along property lines.
- Avoid planting trees or shrubs with growing roots that will raise the ground along property lines.
- Fences may be installed along the property line, but any largely solid fence (not chain link or split rail) crossing a swale should have the bottom elevated 6" above the ground to allow for the passage of water.
- Don't dump lawn clippings or other yard waste in your yard, particularly along the drainage path.
- Avoid placing woodchips in a swale as they may float onto neighboring properties during heavy rains.
- Do not fill in or otherwise change the grade of any swale without first obtaining a permit from the Village.
- It is a common misconception that adding dirt to fill a low area will solve any ponding when, in realty, the water will likely still reach the area. With the low area no longer available to store the water, the water may be diverted, possibly causing damage elsewhere. A more effective means of eliminating ponding is often removing an obstruction and reestablishing a flow path to allow the area to drain.

The Village is responsible to keep the public drainage system including storm sewers, combined sewers, and parkway drainage ditches clear and functioning properly. If you see a blocked inlet or water ponding over a grate during or after a storm, please contact Public Works at 847.870.5640. While the Village maintains these drainage ditches, if a culvert passes below your driveway, it is your responsibility to ensure that there is no blockage.

Our Engineering Division can provide additional information or answer questions about flooding or drainage. In addition, you can visit the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) website at fema.gov for further information.

Law Requires Annual Inspection of Sprinkler Systems

To protect the public drinking water supply, the State of Illinois requires that all lawn irrigation sprinklers have cross-connection and backflow protection to protect against back-siphon and cross-connections. All backflow devices are to be certified by a State Licensed Cross Connection Control Device Inspector (CCCDI). A copy of the annual certification is to be sent to the Public Works Department.

If the system has been removed, please have your plumber/inspector notify Public Works.
