Environmental Health and Compliance





Summer weekends are often filled with home improvement projects. Whether it is simply mowing the yard or adding a new coat of paint to your home, property owners are responsible for the maintenance of their structures and landscape. The Village's Environmental Health and Compliance Inspectors survey property throughout the community to ensure that all residents can enjoy the look of their property and those around them. Inspectors may provide a notice for issues that are out of compliance including:

- Maintaining grass below 8" in height.
- Keeping wood trim and siding in good condition. Inspectors may provide notice if scraping and painting are needed.
- Outdoor storage of items should be limited to exterior furniture. Excess construction materials, metal recyclable collections, and debris shall be kept inside structures.
- Cracked or heaving pavement that presents a tripping hazard.

Residents may alert the Village of concerns on neighboring property and request an inspection by calling 847.870.5668 or via our website at mountprospect.org/services/customer-service-request.

Summer Sustainability Tips

As the summer heat sets in, you may wonder how to balance staying cool and remaining energy efficient. Check out the following sustainability tips to help:

- Use fans along with or instead of your air conditioner. Fans use far
 less electricity than air conditioners. Fans could allow you to raise the
 thermostat setting 4° with no reduction in comfort, according to the
 U.S. Department of Energy.
- Shade sunny windows to keep your home cooler.
- Use caulk or weatherstripping to seal leaks around doors and windows.

- Solar panels generate electricity you can use to power your home offsetting your electric consumption from the grid while also emitting less carbon emissions.

Respecting Our Flag

A symbol of freedom and liberty, the Flag of the United States is flown to honor our history, pride, and principals upon which this country was founded. In 1942, the U.S. Congress passed a joint resolution establishing guidelines regarding how citizens should honor the United States flag. It has since come to be known as the U.S. Flag Code.

Summer offers some of the most celebrated opportunities to proudly display the flag including Memorial Day (to be flown at half-staff until noon), Independence Day, and Flag Day. It's important that all citizens understand and respect the standards for flying and displaying the U.S. flag.

According to the U.S. Flag Code, the flag may be displayed on any day of the year, according to the following guidelines:

- The custom is to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on flagstaffs in the open, but it may be displayed at night—if illuminated—to produce a patriotic effect.
- In the United States, no other flag should be placed above the American flag or, if they are to be placed on the same level, to the right of the American flag.
- The American flag should be at the center and the highest point when displayed with a group of state flags.
- The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.
- The flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.
- The flag should never be used as covering for a ceiling.
- The flag should never have anything placed on it.
- The flag should never be used for any advertising purpose, nor embroidered on cushions or handkerchiefs, printed on paper napkins or boxes, nor used as any portion of a costume.



SUMMER GRILLING SAFETY

Everything You Need to Know for a Safe and Fun Grilling Season!



Summer BBQ Safety

The smell of food cooking on the grill is a sure sign that summer has arrived. To ensure that you safely enjoy grilling season follow these important safety tips.

Begin by placing your grill at least 10 feet away from any structures and keep it on a non-flammable surface.

If you are using a propane grill, always follow the manufacturer's instructions.

- Check the gas lines for leaks by mixing 1 teaspoon of soap in a spray bottle of water. When you spray the hose, you will see bubbles anywhere you have a leak.
- Only light the grill with the cover open.
- If the flame goes out, turn the burners off and wait 5 minutes before re-lighting.
- To prevent excess gas from leaking, turn the tank off before turning off the burners.

If you are using a charcoal grill proceed cautiously.

• If you use a charcoal chimney starter which allows you to ignite the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel, use a long match when lighting the paper.

- If you are using lighter fluid, make sure it is the appropriate type for
- Never add starter fluid to coals that have already been ignited.
- Never use any substance other than charcoal lighter fluid to start your grill.

While cooking, be sure that children and pets are kept well away from the grill. Be sure to keep items like food wrappers, oven mitts, or towels at least three feet away. Use long-handled grilling tools and never leave the grill unattended while cooking.

Safety doesn't end when the food comes off the grill. After cooking, empty all coals into a metal container; don't ever empty them into your trash can. Place your starter fluids out of the reach of children and away from other heat sources.

Let's make it a safe and fun grilling season!

Police Department



Freezee Fridays Are Back!

Keep an eye out every Friday this summer for Mount Prospect police officers in your neighborhood. They will once again be stocking up on freeze pops to share with residents they see out and about. It's a cool way to get to know the officers in your beat.



Protect Kids and Pets from the Heat

During the hot and humid weather, the inside of your vehicle can heat up quickly, creating a dangerous situation for any children or pets left in the car, even for just a few minutes. Leaving windows open a bit does not reduce the build-up of heat or decrease temperatures in the vehicle, which can reach 125° in minutes.

To ensure you are not leaving a child behind, try these basic tips:

- Place the child's diaper bag or item on the front passenger seat as a visual cue that the child is with you.
- Make it a habit of opening the back door every time you park to ensure
 no one is left behind. To enforce this habit, place an item that you can't
 start your day without on the back seat (employee badge, laptop, phone,
 or handbag).
- Ask your childcare provider to call you right away if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.
- Clearly announce and confirm who is getting each child out of the vehicle. Miscommunication can lead to thinking someone else removed the child.
- Use drive-thru services when available at places like the pharmacy or restaurants.

Of equal importance is making sure kids cannot get into an unattended vehicle. Some best practices include:

- Keeping vehicles locked at all times, especially in the garage or driveway. Ask neighbors and visitors to do the same.
- Never leave car keys within reach of children.
- Use childproofing knob covers and door alarms to prevent children from exiting your home unnoticed.
- Teach children to honk the horn or turn on hazard lights if they become stuck inside a car.
- If a child is missing, immediately check the inside, floorboards, and trunk of all vehicles in the area carefully, even if they're locked.

Besides never leaving your child alone in a car, even for a minute, call 911 immediately if you see a child alone in a hot car. If they appear hot or sick, get them out of the vehicle as quickly as possible. Be especially diligent at peak times, including schedule changes, periods of crisis, and during holidays.

Beware of Possible Home Improvement Scams this Summer

Summer brings with it a unique set of criminal scams to be aware of. Watch carefully for these common scams:

- Someone who is just passing through the neighborhood and has materials left over from another job. Often, the materials used are substandard and money is demanded up front.
- Scammers not providing a written quote before starting work. Get written
 contracts before a job is agreed to including specifics on pricing and
 payment. Scammers may offer services at a certain rate, but after they
 start the work, they demand more money and will not finish the job until
 you pay.
- Be wary of offers to sealcoat your driveway for a discounted price. The person may use cheap materials that wear off in a short time. There are similar concerns with chimney repair and roof sealant offers.
- Someone knocks on the door claiming to have done prior work at your home; however, this is a distraction to allow their partner to enter your home through another door.

Remember, if an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is. Never let anyone inside your home you do not know or that you did not first contact. If you are ever in doubt of someone at your door or you do fall victim to a scam, please call 911 to assist us in catching these criminals and protecting others.

Text to 911 Available in Mount Prospect

Mount Prospect utilizes Northwest Central Dispatch System (NWCDS) for its

911 services. While a phone call is the preferred method of alerting NWCDS of a request for police, fire or EMS, texting can be used as an alternative.

Unlike a phone call, the dispatcher will not be able to determine the location from your text, so provide clear location information in your first text. Send your next text with the nature of what you need assistance with, avoiding slang terms or abbreviations.

While NWCDS accepts texts to 911, many surrounding areas do not. In the event text-to-911 is not available you will receive a bounce back message indicating to make a voice call. If you do not receive a response for a text-to-911 call, make a voice call.

Getting Through Road Construction Season Safely

If you've traveled anywhere in the area recently you know that there are road construction projects happening everywhere—from local street resurfacing to major construction on several area expressways. While it can be an inconvenience to you, it further compounds the danger for many workers whose office is actually a vehicle. Consider the daily routine for police officers, sales personnel, utility workers, truck drivers, construction workers, firefighters, and emergency personnel. According the to the American Society of Safety Engineers (ASSE) transportation accidents have been the leading cause of on-the-job deaths in the United States every year since 1992.

Everyone plays a role in maintaining a safe work zone area during roadway construction. To play your part, follow these tips while driving through a work site:

DO

- Pay attention to the orange diamond-shaped warning signs or electronic message boards posted in advance of a road construction project.
- Stay alert and dedicate your undivided attention to driving. Watch how traffic is flowing around you.
- In addition to monitoring traffic, watch for construction workers, equipment, and work vehicles, paying extra attention at night.
- Minimize distractions. Avoid changing radio stations or making even hands-free calls while in a work zone.
- Always obey posted speed limits in a work zone.
- Pay close attention to directions on work zone warning signs and follow instructions from flaggers.
- Watch for slow or stopped traffic. A work zone is no place for tailgating.
- Expect the unexpected.
- Be prepared for detours and lane configuration changes.

DON'T

- Speed up or slow down significantly when going through a work zone.
- Slow down to look at the work that is being done.
- Resume normal speed until you have exited the work zone.
- Change lanes in a work zone.

Most states have instituted laws regarding work zones; penalties for speeding in these areas are double that of the normal penalties for speeding in a non-work zone area.

Tree Planting Program

Village right-of-ways are home to more than 25,000 trees that provide numerous benefits to the Village and to property owners, including limiting storm water runoff, improving air quality, reducing noise, minimizing heat island effects, and increasing property values.

These benefits are among some of the reasons we attempt to replace every tree that is taken down throughout the year.

Replacing every tree is not always possible due to several factors ranging from previous trees being planted too close to other trees, to existing infrastructure, or the previous tree was simply planted in a poor location not suitable for a new tree. With that in mind, the village does its best to place trees on our parkway in all viable locations to provide a healthy canopy.

Partnering with the Suburban Tree Consortium (STC), the Village procures trees from several nurseries in northern Illinois. Each spring and fall, a member of the Forestry Department visits each nursery and selects the trees to be planted in our community, choosing varieties that have proven to do well in urban areas. While the selection varies from season to season, over the past five years, the Village has planted more than 2,600 trees chosen from among 24 different species covering 62 varieties.

5G in Our Community

You may have noticed workers installing new equipment on Village-owned streetlights and other locations including free-standing poles throughout Mount Prospect. This is part of the next generation of telecommunications technology, 5G, which is designed to meet consumer demand for faster internet and cellular data transmission. While higher in frequency than 4G, 5G signals do not



travel as far. Rather than traditional cell towers that are usually 200 feet or more in height, wireless service providers are turning to smaller facilities — bundles of antennas, transmitters, and other equipment called small cells. Small cells are typically 30 feet tall or less; however, due to their lower height, they must be installed in closer proximity to provide coverage for the areas they serve.

A 2018 state law gives wireless service providers broad permission to install small cell facilities within the public right-of-way. The law was not designed to give municipalities control over the location and number of small cells within their jurisdictions. In addition, a 2018 Federal Communications Commission order similarly limits municipal control over small cell facilities with the intent of streamlining the rollout of 5G services nationwide. Despite that, wireless service providers must still submit a permit application and receive approval from the Village for each small cell location. Using the streetlights helps us protect the aesthetic integrity of your neighborhood.

Message from the Mayor

As Mayor, I recently chartered an Ad Hoc Sustainability Committee charged with beginning to build a framework around the concept of sustainability in our Village. So as not to overwhelm the Committee given the many facets of sustainability, the initial scope of the Committee's mission was limited. However, I must tell you that as a Charter member of the Recycling Commission back in 1988, I am very excited about the work that Alex Bertolucci, Assistant to the Village Manager, and the Village's Sustainability Committee have begun. As we all know, sustainability is a critical movement for our village, our state, our nation, and the world.

What does sustainability mean to the Village and what does sustainability mean to you? On a macro level, sustainability means contributing to saving our planet through use of non-detrimental, alternate resources, stretching our limited and non-renewable resources to go farther, eliminating or reducing emissions through zero or minimized emissions methods, eliminating environmentally harmful products from our everyday use, and so much more. Sustainability, by definition, requires a holistic approach towards a healthy and secure community in an environmental, economic, and social front not just for today's citizens but for our future citizens as well.

Everyday efforts around sustainability can be as simple as keeping in mind the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and Repair.

Reduce | Don't take a shopping bag if you can simply carry your purchased items home. If you have a choice, buy an item that is offered with less packaging. If you can do without, maybe consider not buying the product at all.

Reuse | My son, Alex, frequently lists items our family no longer needs on Facebook via the Mount Prospect Free Group. I often see usable items at the curb on garbage day. Ask a friend or neighbor if they could use the item or please consider donating those items to various service organizations so those items can have a second life in another's home. I realize that some residents do not have time nor the ability to get those items to the donation center. However, many service organizations will pick those items up from you if you contact them.

Recycle | Recycling plastics, glass, and paper goes without saying as Mount Prospect has had our curbside Recycling Program in place for more than 30 years. The Village also has a drop-off at Public Works for plastic bags, fluorescent bulbs, batteries, Styrofoam, electronics, and many other items. The Village even offers household hazardous waste recycling events the make it easier for residents to dispose of a variety of household chemicals.

Repair | Things in our homes break; it is a fact of everyday life. If you can get a few more years of usable life from an item in your home, think about repairing it. Also consider buying items that are made to last. I understand there is an upfront cost, but spreading that cost out over the additional years of usable life may be reasonable on a per year basis.

I absolutely know that people inherently want to do the right thing when it comes to sustainability. Providing convenient and beneficial ways to do those things should be the primary goal of any local sustainability program.

So, stay tuned; new and exciting programs, efforts, and legislation focused on sustainability from which we will all benefit are on their way. Until then, do what you can as all of our individual efforts can really add up and have a positive impact on our world as a whole!
