Summer Water Usage Tips

Warm summer temperatures often lead to an increase in water usage. We encourage everyone to be mindful of water conservation when filling the pool or watering plants.

- Installing rain barrels allows you to collect storm water run-off that can be used for watering.
- Watering the grass, trees, and plants first thing in the morning reduces waste caused by evaporation.
- You can save plenty of water by turning the tap off while brushing your teeth or washing dishes.
- Plumbing fixtures with a WaterSense label will help save water.

News from the Building Department

Storm Chaser Scams

As if severe weather were not bad enough, after the weather clears it is not uncommon for suspicious individuals to follow storms and try to scam you out of large sums of money by posing as legitimate contractors. We advise you to be cautious of contractors who:

- Come to your home uninvited or are going door-to-door offering repairs.
- Attempt to scare you by saying you are in danger if you do not make immediate repairs to your home.
- Talk quickly and push you to sign papers right away.
- Quote you a price that is out of line with other estimates.
- Offer to drive you to the bank to withdraw funds to pay them.
- Can only be reached via an answering service.
- Drive an unmarked vehicle or have out of state license plates.
- Require payment in full before work begins.

Tips on Choosing a Contractor

If you are looking to have work done on your home, be cautious when choosing a contractor. Start by calling the Illinois Attorney General or the Better Business Bureau to check on their record. Be sure to get written estimates from several providers but don't always go with the lowest bid. If you intend to hire a contractor, ask if they will be using any subcontractors. If so, ask to meet them and be sure that they have current insurance coverage and licenses. You should also ask them if the primary contractor has always paid them on time.

Introducing Squad 13

Through the great work of our Public Works Vehicle Maintenance Team, on May 5 the Fire Department held a ceremony to dedicate, bless, and put into service our new Squad 13. Although we had targeted the purchase of a new vehicle for \$350,000, we were able to find a suitably used squad for just \$85,000 that our Public Works crew was able to refurbish for us. After their hard work, Squad 13 looks like it just rolled off the showroom floor.

This new vehicle serves many purposes and responds to a variety of calls including working structure fires, chemical spills, white powder substances, suspicious packages, chlorine containment, and other situations involving hazardous materials. Some of the equipment the squad carries can be used to mitigate smaller fires caused by lithium-ion batteries such as those found in hoverboards, scooters, and lawn care appliances. The squad will also be used as an alternate command vehicle and to assist other regional fire departments when needed.

The completely refurbished squad is just one example of the ongoing behind-the-scenes maintenance done to all Village vehicles by Public Works. It is thanks to their dedication that these vehicles remain operating at an optimum level and allow our first responders to arrive on the scene of emergency calls as quickly as they do. Thank you Public Works Vehicle Maintenance!

Enjoy the Fireworks...Just Not at Home

Each year in the United States approximately 10,000 people are treated for fireworks-related injuries. Here are some good reasons why you shouldn't use any fireworks at home:

- Almost 20,000 fires are started by fireworks each year.
- During the month of July, 44% of injuries treated in emergency rooms are burn-related.
- Of the fireworks injuries treated in emergency rooms, half are for hands, fingers, or legs. Over 30% involve injuries to the eyes or head.



- The highest rate of fireworks-related injuries is to children ages 10 – 14.
- Think you are keeping things low risk? More than 25% of all fireworks-related emergency room visits are caused by sparklers.
- Sparklers burn at about 1200°F. That is hot enough to melt some metals and twice the temperature at which wood will burn.

Let's make it a safe 4th of July this year!

2023 Citizens Police Academy

The Mount Prospect Police Department is now accepting applications for the Citizens Police Academy. The Academy provides a firsthand look at police operations and gives participants the opportunity to experience police work from an officer's point of view.

Applicants must be 18 years of age and have no past criminal history. This year's Academy will begin September 11 and meet for 11 consecutive Monday nights from 6:30 to 9:30 pm, ending on November 20.

Topics covered in the Academy will include traffic enforcement, traffic crash investigation, crime scene processing, and criminal law. Academy students will also be allowed to make simulated traffic stops and learn from the department's master firearms instructors on the department's pistol range.

Document Destruction Event

The Village will host a secure document destruction event this August in conjunction with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC). Mount Prospect residents are invited to drop off sensitive documents such as bills, medical and financial records, tax forms, and other paper materials on **August 5 from 8 to 11 am at the Mount Prospect Public Works Facility**, 1700 West Central Road.

Documents must be in paper bags or cardboard boxes; plastic bags cannot be accepted. Paper clips and staples may remain in place, but large clips or binders must be removed. There will be a limit of 6 bags or boxes per person. As you pull into the facility, have your ID ready. Our staff will check the ID

and then take materials directly from your car to be placed into carts. Carts will then be emptied into the shredding truck for secure, on-site destruction.

Overhead Sewer Rebate Program

The Village maintains an overhead sewer rebate program to provide financial assistance to residents who want to convert their existing gravity-fed sanitary system into an overhead sanitary sewer system. To be eligible, the single-family homeowner must be a Village wastewater utility consumer.

The program offers a rebate for costs incurred by a homeowner for the conversion. The Village will reimburse an eligible homeowner for up to 50%, but not more than \$7,500 of actual costs incurred. 2022 Water Report Available Online

The Illinois and Federal Environmental Protection Agency is now allowing water suppliers to offer electronic delivery of their annual Consumer Confidence Reports. This use of electronic delivery or e-delivery will save thousands of dollars in printing and postage costs for the Village. The use of the e-delivery method fully meets the public notification requirements. Watering Restrictions

As part of the Lake Michigan water allocation program, water suppliers are required to take steps to restrict outdoor water use. Water conservation measures are an important first step in maintaining a continuous adequate water supply for drinking, bathing, and fire protection.

Water usage laws are designed to regulate water usage for watering lawns, filling swimming pools, and other outdoor uses. In Mount Prospect, water usage is limited in the following way:

- Watering and/or sprinkling of yards is permitted for odd numbered addresses on odd numbered dates and for even numbered addresses on even numbered dates, only between the hours of 4 pm and 10 am.
- Newly sodded areas of lawns may be watered at any time on any day for the two-week period following installation.

These rules are in place 7 days a week. If you have any questions, call Public Works at 847.870.5640.



Water Your Drain Traps

The traps in your floor drains can dry out if not used on a regular basis which can lead to sewer gas from the Village's sewer system entering your home. You can eliminate this possibility by keeping a small amount of fresh water in the trap and topping it off with a bit of cooking oil. The oil will float on top of the water preventing evaporation and reducing the chance of sewer gas being an issue for you.

Tree Planting

Our continuous reforestation efforts will carry on into the fall as we attempt to replace all trees that have been removed from parkways. If you have lost a tree from the parkway in front of your home, you should expect to receive notification with details about the potential replacement. Our goal is to replace trees in the order they were removed, but in some cases, replacement may not take place until next year.

Trees will still be hand-selected by Village staff at an Illinois nursery. They will be planted by a landscape contractor and guaranteed for one year. To maintain a healthy variety of trees, eight to ten different species are generally available per planting season.

at Public Works no later than August 1.

Cost Sharing Opportunity for Water Lines

The Village has established a cost sharing program to provide financial assistance to residents who want to replace their existing lead or galvanized steel water service with a copper water service from the public water main to the water meter inside the property.

Single-family and multi-family homes, and commercial buildings, are all eligible to participate in the program which offers a rebate for costs incurred by an owner to replace an existing lead or galvanized service line with copper. The Village will reimburse 100% of the cost to replace the service line from the water main to the water shutoff valve, known as the B-box, and two-thirds of the cost to replace the shutoff valve to the water meter, but not more than \$10,000 of the actual expenses incurred. Low-income homeowners may be eligible for a 0% interest deferred loan.

To be eligible, work must be performed with a valid Village of Mount Prospect permit issued by the Building and Inspection Services Department. Applicants must be Village of Mount Prospect water customers. Illinois American Water Company customers and residents with privately-owned wells are not eligible. All applicable permit fees and bonds will apply. The program is not retroactive; work performed in the past is not eligible.

No appointment is required. Clinics include free checks on blood pressure, heart rate, and oxygen saturation. Message from the Mayor

As your Mayor, I am extremely pleased to tell you that the Village's financial position is stronger today than it has ever been before. You should also know that the Village of Mount Prospect has had a long tradition of being fiscally responsible and laser-focused on reducing the financial burden on its residents and businesses.

The Village has maximized its alternative revenue sources allowing for less reliance on property taxes. Additionally, the Village Board has suspended the Vehicle Sticker Program due to the strong sales tax revenues, state-shared income tax revenues, and other revenue streams which have outperformed projections. In addition, a sharp focus on spending reductions by all Village Departments in 2022 produced a \$13.4 million surplus.

The Village will be using part of the surplus in abating/reducing various taxes for its residents and businesses. These abatements combined with the suspension of the Vehicle Sticker Program will save the average household \$212. In my opinion, it was and is a highly responsible action for your Village Board to deploy some of the surplus toward these abatements and tax reductions.

At the same time, the Village Board recently approved a new Fund Balance Policy. The new fund balance requirement is set at 30% to 50%, which equates to four-months' worth of operating cash. The revisions to the fund balance policy will help to ensure the continuity of Village operations.

In addition to the new Fund Balance Policy, the Village Board also approved the creation of an *Economic Emergency Fund* which was funded with \$6.5 million from our General Fund surplus. This move equates to one-months' worth of operating cash.

Over the past 30 years, we have seen some extremely difficult economic times. A prime example of such times was the economic recession of 2009-2010. While the Village weathered that economic storm well, the Village Board was forced to make many responsible but difficult spending cuts to programs, projects, and staffing. Had we had an Emergency Fund in place at that time, it would have helped us smooth out the impacts of the recession. Unfortunately, creating such a fund was not financially possible until now.

Our recently gained financial strength has allowed the Village to create this new *Economic Emergency Fund* and set aside dedicated dollars for natural or man-made disasters, economic downturns, unplanned expenditures, or other emergencies. However, I want everyone to know and understand that accessing the *Economic Emergency Fund* will require that certain criteria be met as well as discussion and approval by your Village Board.

As a final point, the S&P Credit Rating Agency recently affirmed the Village's very positive AA+ credit rating. However, one of your Village Board's strategic goals is to attain a AAA credit rating which will allow the Village to borrow at lower market rates thus reducing the cost of borrowing for capital projects and again, reducing the overall tax burden for residents and businesses. The Economic Emergency Fund will be critical factor in helping us attain a AAA credit rating.

In closing, your Village Board and Village Administration are committed to providing our citizens and businesses with continuity of outstanding service, reducing reliance on the property tax, and being prepared for the uncertainties of the future. As your Mayor, I guarantee your Village Board will continue to support policies aimed at accomplishing these key goals.
