







MOUNT PROSPECT RECEIVES RAVE REVIEWS!

Results from a recently completed 2023 Community Survey indicate high marks for the Village of Mount Prospect, noting residents have a very positive perception of the Village and experience high levels of satisfaction with Village services. The results also show the Village trending in a positive direction when compared to the 2020 and 2016 survey results.

The Village's positive perception is evident as 91% of respondents are satisfied with the overall quality of Village services and 89% are satisfied with the overall quality of life in Mount Prospect. Other services that hold a 90% satisfaction rate or higher include:

Public Safety/Feelings of Safety:
 overall feeling of safety in your
 neighborhood during the day and overall

in the Village; friendliness and professionalism of the Fire Department; quality of both fire protection and emergency medical services

- Public Works Services/Village Infrastructure: maintenance of Village buildings, facilities, and the Downtown; quality of residential garbage collection and curbside recycling; cleanliness of public areas; snow removal on major Village streets; maintenance of street signs and traffic signals
- Quality of Life: quality of Village customer service; quality of Library services

Mount Prospect rated significantly higher (5% or more) than the U.S. average in all 52 survey categories. The Village also rated above the regional average in all 52 survey categories, 51 of which were rated significantly higher (5% or more).

The Village of Mount Prospect takes great pride in the services it provides to the community and the manner of which they are delivered. The Village was rated at 91% for quality of customer service and quality of services offered (as noted above), which is significantly higher compared to the national and regional percentages below:

- Satisfaction with Overall Quality of Village Services rated 42% above the U.S. average and 39% above the regional average
- Satisfaction with Customer Service from Village Employees rated 52% above the U.S. average and 49% above the regional average

When compared against itself, ratings show the Village of Mount Prospect is moving in the right direction. Satisfaction ratings have increased or stayed the



same in 83 of 102 areas since 2016, and satisfaction ratings have increased or stayed the same in 68 of 112 areas since 2020.

The Village of Mount Prospect utilizes the services of ETC Institute of Kansas City, MO, to conduct the community surveys. This is the third survey administered, with the first one taking place in 2016

and the second in 2020. Results from the 2023 survey, which was administered from November 2023 – January 2024, were presented to the Village Board at the April 9, 2024, Committee of the Whole meeting.

The Community Survey consists of seven pages with questions ranging from overall quality of life to specific department services. The survey also gives residents the opportunity to share their opinion on community priorities —helping to identify areas of focus for the Village in the coming years. These priorities are calculated through an Importance-Satisfaction Analysis that examines the level of satisfaction and perceived importance residents place on each Village service.

The analysis showed three top areas of importance: flow of traffic and traffic management; management of Village finances, and crime prevention. According to ETC, it is common among the communities they survey to see these categories identified as *High Priority* for residents.

ETC Institute is a national market research organization and has surveyed more than 900 communities since 2010. Utilizing the expertise of ETC Institute assures equity in representation across the entire Village as well as statistically relevant survey results.

News from the Building Department

Clearing Blocked Sewer Lines

If you are experiencing a blocked residential sewer line, your first step is to contact your provider. Depending on your location in the Village, it will either be Mount Prospect Public Works (847) 870-5640 or Illinois-American (800) 422-2782. Your utility statement will tell you which provider services your home.

You can save time and money by having your plumbing contractor identify the location of the blockage as it could be in the private line or the sewer main. Contact the provider above if the blockage is found in the main or parkway.

Ask your contractor to run a camera in the line to record the interior as they clear the line. Save the recording so if you have future issues there will be a record of what was done.

Time to Put Those Holiday Lights Away

If you haven't put those holiday lights away it's time to get the ladder out. Most manufacturers intend for exterior lights to be displayed only temporarily. The UV light from the sun will deteriorate the low-gauge wire. Don't risk a fire by leaving them out any longer. As you put them away, check the wire for degradation, and if you see damage, plan on getting new lights next year.

Fire Department

EMS Week 50th Anniversary

Beginning in 1974, one week each year has been designated as EMS Week. The purpose of the week is to recognize and understand the dedication of those who work in Emergency Medical Services providing life-saving care to the community. This year we celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the event May 19 through 25.

The Emergency Medical Services system consists of first responders, emergency medical technicians, paramedics, emergency medical dispatchers, firefighters, police officers, educators, administrators, pre-hospital nurses, emergency nurses, emergency physicians, trained members of the public, and other out-of-hospital medical care providers.

EMS plays an integral role in the Mount Prospect Fire Department. In 2023, our EMS personnel responded to 5,394 incidents, a figure that represents 74% of all fire department responses for the year. These incidents include medical problems such as cardiac events, trauma, as well as a myriad of other potentially life-threatening emergencies.

A closer look at our EMS team shows these facts:

- In 2023, 17 paramedics were relicensed for the next 4 years.
- 3 new members started paramedic school.
- 4 new members passed system entry into Northwest Community EMS System and are now practicing within our community.
- All our ambulances passed state inspections.
- A fourth ambulance was put into service on the south side of the village.
- 2,444 hours of continuing education were completed.



National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Weekend

Each year the National Fallen Firefighter Foundation sponsors a tribute to all firefighters who died in the line of duty during the previous year. This year's tribute takes place May 4 and 5. Thousands attend the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Weekend in Emmitsburg, Maryland where a 7-foot stone monument features a sculpted Maltese Cross, the traditional symbol of the fire service. A plaque on the monument bears a message from President Ronald Reagan and an eternal flame symbolizes the spirit of all firefighters — past, present, and future.

Emergency Preparedness Workshop | Saturday, May 18 | 9 am - 3 pm

Residents are invited to participate in a one-day Emergency Management Preparedness Workshop on May 18 from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. The workshop will cover potential disaster situations including power outages, flooding, severe weather, and home fires.

This class, held at Mount Prospect Fire Station 14, 2000 East Kensington Road, will use discussion and hands-on tasks to provide critical training on methods to keep you and your loved ones safe during an emergency. Training will cover severe weather safety, basic first aid, utility safety, and fire suppression using an extinguisher. Instruction will also be given on how to put together a home preparedness kit.

Among the instructors will be members of the Mount Prospect Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). These CERT members are Mount Prospect residents who volunteer their time and give back to our community. CERT has been in existence for 20 years and has been a valuable resource to all Village departments.

The free workshop is limited to 25 people and all attendees must be preregistered. A light lunch will be provided. For more

Public Works

Be Prepared for Spring and Summer Flooding

Unfortunately, some properties in Mount Prosect may experience flooding conditions during heavy rainstorms in spring and summer. A flood occurs when one or more components of the drainage system fails or is overwhelmed with too much water in too short a period. Those components include:

- Waterways Five waterways carry water into, through, and away from the Village. They are the Des Plaines River, McDonald Creek, Feehanville Ditch, Weller Creek, and Higgins Creek. Stormwater runs directly into these waterways while storm sewers from each neighborhood also contribute stormwater at various points. When the amount of water moving into one or more of the waterways exceeds the capacity of the waterway, the water backs up and causes flooding in nearby areas.
- More locally, networks of storm sewers, combined sewers, drainage swales (shallow ditches), and detention ponds exist throughout the Village. This network was designed to safely drain stormwater runoff and convey it to one of the five waterways. Points throughout this network can also be inundated with more water than it can handle during a heavy storm causing it to backup and flood surrounding areas.
- Individual homes may use downspouts
 to control the way stormwater runoff is
 moved from the roof and footing drains
 to drain groundwater away from the
 foundation. Older construction may
 have the footing drains and floor drains
 connected directly to the sewer system.
 Excessive groundwater and/or surcharging
 in the receiving sewer system can cause
 flooding within the basement of a home.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has prepared a map that illustrates the Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs) associated with each waterway. SFHAs are 100-year flood event boundaries, areas that annually have a 1% or greater chance of reaching flood levels during an event. The Village's Engineering Department can assist with locating your property on the map and provide additional information related to the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM),

which can be beneficial to lenders, insurance agents, house hunters, real estate agents, and interested citizens.

The SFHAs identified on the FIRMs only reflect areas of potential flooding related to overflowing of the main waterways. Localized flooding may occur unrelated to these waterways and, therefore, would not be reflected on the FIRMs. An area may still be subject to flooding even if FEMA has not identified it on the FIRM.

Even though flooding can occur at any time with little warning, there are some things you can do to be prepared.

- Prepare a list of emergency numbers that can be easily accessed during a flood. Keep backup records with a neighbor or friend.
- Maintain an inventory of personal property that can be used to identify what has been damaged or lost during a flood. Photos and videos can be very helpful.
- Keep photos of valuable items such as insurance policies, vehicle titles, deeds, bank and credit card account information, wills, and important telephone numbers in a location away from your home, such as a safe deposit box.
- Discuss coverage options for flooding and sewer backups with your insurance agent.
- Keep cleaning supplies on hand to help you recover from a flood.

If your basement or building has flooded, always take these precautions:

- Turn off all utilities at the main power switch and close the main gas valve if evacuation appears necessary.
- Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage rather than candles or lanterns.
- Do not touch any electrical equipment unless it is in a dry area, and you are standing on a piece of dry wood while wearing rubber gloves and rubber-sole boots or shoes.
- Be careful after a flood because the floors are often covered with debris and mud, which can lead to slipping or stepping on uneven or sharp objects.



 Flood water is often contaminated and can cause severe health threats, so clean everything that got wet.

There are several measures that you can take to reduce or eliminate the potential damage to your home or business from a flood. Retrofitting your business can include some of these steps:

- Raising your house so the lowest floor is above the flood protection level.
- Moving a building out of the flood area.
- Constructing floodwalls out of fill or concrete to keep water from reaching your home.
- Preventing water from entering by making your walls and flooring watertight.
- Modifying the structure and relocating some contents away from any area that could be impacted by flooding.

Before proceeding with any alteration to a structure, including re-grading or filling in the floodplain, a permit from the Community Development Department is required.

Regarding insurance, most homeowner's policies do not cover losses due to flooding. However, since the Village of Mount Prospect is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), flood insurance is available to all property owners or renters in the Village, regardless of whether the property is in a SFHA. Coverage can be obtained on a building as well as on the contents. Contact your insurance agent for more details. Because of the Village's participation in the CRS Program, property owners are eligible for up to a 20% discount on flood insurance premiums, though there is a 30-day waiting period after the purchase of flood insurance before it goes into effect.

Some insurance companies also offer sewer backup and sump pump failure insurance that can be added on to your homeowner's insurance policy.

In an upcoming newsletter we will provide useful tips on preventing and correcting backyard drainage issues on your property.

Call Before You Dig

There are plenty of outdoor projects that require you to dig in your yard. Illinois law requires that before you do any digging you contact JULIE

(Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) to locate any underground utilities. A simple call to 811 or 800.892.0123 at least 48 hours before you begin starts the process for you. Whenever possible, pre-mark the area in which you will be working with white paint or flags. For more information, visit illinois1call.com.

Lawn Sprinkler Requirements

To protect the public drinking water supply, the State of Illinois requires that all lawn irrigation sprinklers have cross-connection and backflow protection. The devices are installed to protect the public water supply from back-siphon and cross-connections. As required



by the State of Illinois, all backflow devices are to be certified by a State Licensed Cross Connection Control Device Inspector (CCCDI). A copy of the annual certification is to be sent to the Public Works Department as part of the monitoring requirements as mandated by the State of Illinois. If you have

removed a system, please have your plumber/inspector notify Public Works.

Sidewalk Cost Share Program Returns

The Village is currently accepting applications from property owners, both residential and commercial, for the 2024 Shared Cost Sidewalk Program. The program provides a partnership between the owner and the Village to maintain sidewalk integrity and safety for segments adjacent to the property. For 2024, the property owner will be responsible for the first \$122 per sidewalk square. The Village will cover the remaining amount based on the contractor's bid.

Get an Early Start on Tree Care

Spring is the right time to make sure your trees are prepared for the growing season ahead. Get a start by following these tips to boost tree nutrients before the warmer weather arrives:

- Get out and inspect your trees for any signs of winter damage while they are still bare.
- Prune dead, diseased, or unsafe branches before spring growth begins. Doing so after warm weather arrives may be an invitation to unwanted pests and diseases.
- Set the stage for healthy growth by removing fallen leaves, branches, and waste from your landscape.
- Following the winter months your trees will crave nutrients. A slow-release fertilizer helps and will defend against pests and diseases.
- Add 2 to 4 inches of mulch around your trees to improve soil moisture and control weeds.




Mental Health Matters Community Event

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Message from the Mayor

As the Mayor of Mount Prospect, I am honored and humbled to share the positive results of the recent statistically accurate Citizen Survey that was conducted in late 2023. The purpose was

to obtain feedback from our residents related to what you feel your Village is doing well and what we need to improve.

As a snapshot, based on the feedback received from our Citizens, the Village of Mount Prospect received an 89% satisfaction rating on *Quality of Life* and a 91% satisfaction rating on *Quality of our Services*. Drilling down a little further, the overall satisfaction with Village services is considerably higher in Mount Prospect when compared to the other surveyed communities in the Nation and the Plains Region. Mount Prospect rated significantly higher (5% or more) than the regional average and national average in all 52 categories surveyed. These two ratings are 39% above the regional average and an astonishing 42% above the national average. While these results are outstanding, we also understand that there is always room for improvement and positive change.

It is no secret that I love this community, and I am truly honored to be your Mayor. Since putting down roots in our Village more than 40 years ago, I have firmly believed that Mount Prospect is one of the best communities in the country. I also believe our Community is a "Community with Opportunity" and incredible future potential.

The 2023 survey results show us that Mount Prospect is trending in a very positive direction when compared to the results of our previous two Citizen Surveys in 2016 and 2020. At the time of the second survey in 2020, Mount Prospect received some of the highest survey ratings in the country. Yet, with the 2023 Citizen Survey results, we managed to best our 2020 Citizen Survey, with satisfaction ratings increasing or staying the same in 68 of 112 areas. The company that conducted our surveys tells us that this runs counter to the national trend, as most communities have seen an overall decrease in citizen satisfaction.

Three areas identified in the 2023 survey by our residents as top priorities are *traffic flow, sound financial management,* and *crime prevention.* Over the years, I believe we have made significant progress in each of these categories. However, based on this feedback, we will continue to focus on improvement. I share the following examples to show that our priorities are aligned with the priorities of our Citizens.

Traffic flow through roadway improvements is the responsibility of our Public Works Department. Public Works recently won upwards of \$15 million in federal grants to move forward on improving two of the most challenging intersections in the Chicago metro area: Rand-Central-Mount Prospect Road and Rand-Kensington-Route 83.

Sound financial management and spending our collective tax dollars wisely has always been a keystone of our Village Board. As such, based on direction from your Village Board, the Finance Department developed our 2023 budget with a 5% reduction in the Village's property tax levy and the permanent elimination of vehicle stickers.

Crime prevention and citizen safety has been and continues to be a top priority of your Village Board. Toward that end, the Village Board authorized our Police Department to hire 3 additional sworn Police Officers, bringing our total to 89 sworn officers. We also created a *Special Response Team* to deal with the changing nature of crime.

I want to thank all of our Citizens who took the time to provide their feedback for the 2023 Citizen Survey as well as our Citizens who take the time to provide feedback to the Village Board and Village Staff throughout the year. Your feedback is invaluable and helps your Village Board, our Village Manager Mike Cassady, and the Senior Leadership Team focus on *continuous* improvement. I also want to thank all 385 talented and dedicated staff members of our Village who are on the front lines each and every day making it happen. The fact is, we could not have achieved these incredibly positive survey results without your daily commitment and efforts.

In closing, I want to say to the Citizens of Mount Prospect, we recognize that our job does not end with this survey but rather it begins with this survey. I guarantee that your Mayor and Village Board will continue to focus on your priorities, as your priorities are our priorities. As we move forward as a community, we will continue to look for ways to improve our Village and make positive changes to meet your future expectations with the ultimate goal of keeping Mount Prospect a great place to live, to raise a family, and to do business!
