Valet Parking Pilot Program

As the list of new restaurants in downtown continues to grow, parking lots in the area have been experiencing heavy use. To support our downtown businesses, increase customer service, and ease demand for parking spaces, the Village is launching a one-month pilot valet parking program run by a private valet service serving the downtown triangle area.

Patrons of downtown businesses can drop vehicles off at a valet kiosk located between the 20 West apartment building and the Chase Bank parking lot at 2 West Northwest Highway. Valet staff will park cars in the nearby Metra/UP parking lot across Northwest Highway and the Emerson Street Parking deck. Patrons can pick their cars up at a second kiosk located at the north driveway in the Chase Bank parking lot.

Services are now available on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights beginning at 5:00 pm and running until midnight. Patrons visiting any of the downtown establishments can take advantage of the valet service during those hours.

Child Safety Seats

With families doing more traveling during the summer, and with kids home from school, now is the right time to ensure that your child safety seats are properly installed and operational. When placing your child in the seat, begin by properly positioning the harness. For rear-facing seats, harness straps

should lie flat without any twists and be placed through the slot that is at or below the child's shoulders. For forwardfacing units, straps should be in the slots at or above the shoulder, and similarly, flat against the child. After buckling the harness, make sure the chest clip is in position at armpit level and tighten accordingly. The harness is snug enough when extra material cannot be pinched at the shoulder.

Drivers and Pedestrians Need to

Share Responsibility

Drivers are encouraged to remain aware of these steps to keep pedestrians safe on our roadways.

- When pedestrians are on their half of the roadway or so close from the opposite half to be a danger while in a marked or unmarked crosswalk, drivers must stop to allow the pedestrian to cross safely.
- When approaching from behind, drivers may not pass another vehicle that is stopped to allow a pedestrian to cross a roadway.
- Whenever stop signs or red flashing lights are in place at an intersection or at a crosswalk in between intersections, drivers must give the right of way to pedestrians.
- Always exercise greater caution when driving when signs are posted to watch for people walking, biking, and at school crossings.

Some responsibility also falls on pedestrians and bicyclists.

- Bicyclists on the roadway must follow the rules of the road like any motor vehicle including stopping at stop signs and traffic lights, stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks, and using the right-hand side of the roadway.
- Whether walking or biking, everyone is expected to follow Walk and Don't Walk indicators at intersections.
- Pedestrians and cyclists using marked or unmarked crosswalks at locations not controlled by traffic signals or stop signs may not walk, ride, or run off a curb or place of safety into the path of a moving vehicle that is close enough to present an immediate danger.
- Before walking or biking across any intersection or roadway, • pedestrians should check for oncoming traffic from all directions.
- When crossing a road at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, pedestrians shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on the road.



Freezee Fridays are Back

Keep an eye out every Friday throughout summer for members of the Mount Prospect Police Department who will be out sharing freeze pops throughout the community. It's a great way to beat the heat and build relationships between residents of all ages and our police officers.

Don't Leave Kids Unattended in a Hot Car

As the summer heats up, the Police Department would like to remind everyone about the dangers of leaving children or pets inside vehicles. The inside of vehicles can heat up very guickly, and even with windows cracked open, the heating process does not slow down. The inside temperature of a vehicle can reach up to 125 degrees in minutes. Do your part to prevent a tragedy from happening:

To be sure you never leave a child in a car:

- Place the child's diaper bag or other item in the front passenger seat as a visual cue that the child is with you.
- Make it a habit of opening the back door every time you park to ensure no one is left behind. To enforce this habit, place an item that you can't start your day without in the back seat such as an employee badge, your laptop, phone, or handbag.
- Ask your childcare provider to call you right away if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.
- Because miscommunication can lead to thinking someone else will remove the child from the car, clearly announce and confirm who is getting each child out of the vehicle when you arrive at your destination.

It's also important to make sure a child cannot get into a parked car on their own:

- Always keep vehicles locked, especially in the garage or driveway. Ask neighbors and visitors to do the same.
- Never leave car keys within reach of children.
- Use childproofing knob covers and door alarms to prevent children from exiting your home unnoticed.
- Teach children to honk the horn or turn on hazard lights if they become stuck inside a car.
- If a child is missing, immediately check the inside, floorboards, and trunk of all vehicles in the area carefully, even if they're locked.

Other general tips include:

- Never leave children alone in or around cars even for a minute.
- If you see a child alone in a vehicle, get involved. Call 911 immediately. If the child seems hot or sick, get them out of the vehicle as quickly as possible.
- Be especially careful during busy times, schedule changes, and periods of crisis or holidays. This is when many tragedies occur.
- Use drive-thru services when available at places like restaurants, the bank, pharmacy, or dry cleaner and pay for gas at the pump.



MPFD TO OPEN FOURTH FIRE STATION

Earlier this year, Mount Prospect became the primary emergency service provider of the Elk Grove Rural Fire Protection District, and we would like to officially welcome the unincorporated area of Cook County to our response area! With this service agreement comes a newly acquired fire station at 1415 Algonquin Road, which will serve the southernmost areas of our Village as well as the unincorporated areas along I-90, formerly known as the Elk Grove Rural Fire Protection District. The new fire station, Station 11, is currently being renovated and is expected to be fully operational early next month.



Balanced Service Throughout the Village

This significant enhancement to our response capabilities means that for the first time in our 100-year history, the Mount Prospect Fire Department will be serving the community out of four fire stations. For over 50 years, our emergency response plan has been configured around three stations, two north of the UP/Metra railroad tracks and one south. Over the past several years, calls for service south of the UP/Metra railroad tracks have steadily increased, due in part to new residential development and an aging community. When our southside station units are out responding to a call, we have had to draw resources from either one of our two northside stations or from neighboring departments when a second call comes in. With the fourth station, we can now truly split our resources evenly on both sides of our community. We will now have two fire stations north of the tracks and two south of the tracks, giving us two ambulances and two fire suppression vehicles north and south.

South Mount Prospect is home to our most densely populated areas. It also consists of the highest hazard occupancies in the Village, and for the last several decades, south Mount Prospect has consistently generated the most fire calls as well as emergency medical (EMS) calls. The new station will improve overall response times to the entire Village and cut our requests for help from other fire departments by over 50%. The maps depict how going from a 3-district response to a 4-district response evenly distributes call volume and improves response times.

Superior Staffing and Equipment

Just like our other three fire stations, Station 11 will be staffed with a lieutenant and four firefighters, all five being licensed paramedics. With 75% of our calls for service being emergency medical calls (EMS), this significantly improves our service capability. It means that no matter which vehicle arrives first, our firefighters are trained and equipped to provide the highest level of care, including advanced life support (ALS). What will be unique to Station 11 is the 2000-gallon tanker truck. Tender 11 is a mobile water source built to quickly provide water for fire suppression to the unincorporated areas currently without fire hydrants.

Our fleet includes three fire engines and one ladder truck. The two northside stations house three of our four frontline fire apparatus, leaving just one fire engine south of the railroad tracks. With a 1500 gallon per minute pump, a full complement of fire hoses, and staffed with three firefighters, our ladder truck has essentially the same firefighting capabilities as our other three fire engines



and can effectively operate as a fire suppression vehicle when needed. This gives us the ability to reallocate one of our engines to Station 11 to balance capabilities across the entire Village.

With increasing call volume and dissolution of the Elk Grove Rural Fire Protection District, early last year we hired six additional firefighters and purchased a fourth frontline ambulance. This enabled us to place a second ambulance in service south of the railroad tracks. This has had an overall positive impact to the entire Village as it allowed us to adjust our response plan to evenly distribute the workload of all our apparatus covering the nearly 7,300 calls for service we receive each year. Later this year we will hire an additional three firefighters to shore up our fire suppression capabilities on our tower ladder truck.


No Financial Impact to Residents

Our goal is to continue to provide enhanced levels of service our residents have come to expect, while extending that same level of service to those in the unincorporated areas we now protect.


Services to the unincorporated area will be paid for through a Special Service Area tax (SSA) unanimously approved by the Cook County Board. This tax levy will replace the previous Elk Grove Rural Fire District tax that residents had been paying and ensure Mount Prospect receives \$1 million annually to offset the costs of providing emergency services to the area. The special service area will have its first levy for the year 2024 payable in 2025. Other services we will be extending to the unincorporated areas include public education programs.


We are excited about this transformational opportunity and the ability to balance, and more importantly, improve response times across the Village. Public Works

Flood Management

Last month we shared some tips on protecting your property from potential flooding. This month we will continue that topic with information on ways to minimize the possibility of damage from flooding.

As noted, some property is more susceptible to flooding than others. If your property has a higher risk, consider these preventative measures:

- Regrade the lot or construct a small earthen berm to keep water away from the structure.
- Prevent water from entering through doorways during a large rain event by adding watertight closures over doors and windows. This method is not recommended for houses with basements, or if water will get over two feet deep.
- Place air conditioners, water heaters, and furnaces on a platform or move them to a higher floor in the property.
- If a major rain event is expected, placing sandbags around your home or building can prevent water from getting in.
- Many houses, even those not in the floodplain, have sewers that can back up into the basement during heavy rains. A plug or standpipe can stop this if the water doesn't get more than one or two feet deep. These options are available at most hardware stores for approximately \$25. For deeper sewer backup flooding, talk to a plumber about overhead sewers or backup valves. These measures are called floodproofing and retrofitting. More information is available at the Mount Prospect Public Library.

Before building, filling, regrading, or otherwise altering your property, be sure to check with the Building Division as permits may be required. The staff will review to ensure that any changes you make do not adversely impact surrounding properties.

If you are planning construction within a floodplain, the Floodplain Requirements of the Village Code require a Floodplain Development permit from the Building Division. Most properties are designed with the home or building at the high point with the intention of having stormwater runoff down and to the property lines where it should eventually connect with a storm sewer or street. If your property is experiencing water collecting in your backyard, it is most likely because the flow of water is being obstructed in some way. To utilize your backyard draining system as designed, try to adhere to these general guidelines:

- Avoid installing sheds, detached garages, raised gardens, or other structures that could restrict the flow of water along the property line.
- Trees and bushes will lift the ground around their roots as they grow, so it is best not to plant them along the property line.
- Fences may be installed on the property line but any fence which is largely solid should be elevated 6" above the ground where it crosses a swale.
- Avoid dumping materials such as grass clippings, branches, garbage, and even woodchips in a swale or drainage structure.
- It is a common misconception that placing dirt in a low area will reduce pooling of water. It is likely to divert the water and can cause damage elsewhere. Don't try to fill a low spot; instead remove any obstructions that prevent water from flowing along the property line.

The Village's public drainage systems include storm sewers, combined sewers, and parkway drainage ditches. It is the Village's responsibility to keep these clean and functioning properly, but if you observe what appears to be a blocked inlet, or water ponding over a grate after a storm, contact the Public Works Department.

Never dump any materials such as grass clippings, branches, garbage, oil, paint, or other chemicals into any of the Village's waterways, including the Des Plaines River, McDonald Creek, Feehanville Ditch, Weller Creek, and Higgins Creek, or any drainage ditches. This not only compromises the ability of the system to carry water away, but it can also adversely affect the health of the overall ecosystem. Contact the Public Works Department if you see any debris in any part of the water system that may potentially cause flooding problems.

While the Village is responsible to maintain the drainage ditches along the side of the road, the culverts under driveways crossing the ditches are considered part of the driveway, and are therefore the driveway owners' responsibility to maintain and keep unobstructed.

If you have flooding or drainage concerns or would like any additional information, call the Public Works Department at 847.870.5640 (TDD 847.392.1235) and ask for the Engineering Division. Engineering staff welcome the opportunity to assist you, including visiting your site, to identify possible ways to reduce the risk of flooding your property.

In addition, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) website can provide additional information at fema.gov.



This information is provided by FEMA and shared as an annual requirement to maintian the Village's CRS rating, which provides a 20% discount on flood insurance for Village residents.

Work Zone Safety Tips

The American Society of Safety Engineers (ASSE) reminds us that for many workers, their vehicle is their primary place of business. Everyone from police officers and construction workers to salespeople and local or long-distance truck drivers spend much of their day in their vehicles. For the rest of us, it serves as a reminder to keep these workers safe as they do their jobs all around us.

According to ASSE, transportation accidents have been the leading cause of on-the-job deaths in the United States every year since 1992. Each year, hundreds of deaths are the result of motor vehicle crashes in road construction work zones in the U.S. Do your part to keep work zone areas safe during construction season by following these important guidelines:

- Pay attention to the orange diamondshaped warning signs or electronic message boards posted in advance of a road construction project.
- Always obey the posted speed limits in the work zone area.
- Drive carefully and slowly through the construction site.
- Stay alert. Avoid all distractions in your car while driving in a work zone, particularly your phone and radio.
- Watch for stopped or slowing traffic. Follow traffic flow patterns.
- Anticipate potential dangers and be ready to react to unexpected events.
- Watch for construction workers, their equipment, and vehicles moving in and through a construction zone.
- Use extra caution when driving through a site at night.
- Be prepared for detours and lane diversions.

DON'T

- Significantly alter your speed while going through a work zone.
- Slow down to look at the construction work being done you can admire their work when the project is complete.
- Resume normal speed until after you emerge completely out of the work zone area.
- Follow other vehicles too closely. Most of the accidents within a work zone are rear-end collisions.
- Change lanes until you are safely out of a work zone.

In most states, penalties for speeding in work zones are double that of the normal penalties for speeding in a non-work zone stretch of road.

You'll also see hanging baskets throughout the downtown area and along Prospect Avenue.

Our monarch and pollinator gardens will soon be receiving additional plantings. The Village has several butterfly gardens, with the Village's largest ones located at Mount Prospect and Central Roads. The Garden Club of Mount Prospect maintains a butterfly garden at Moehling Park, which serves as a focal feature of the park. The Village also maintains five gardens as part of the Monarch Waystation program. By creating and maintaining these gardens, Mount Prospect helps to contribute to useable habitat for the purpose of increasing monarch butterfly populations.

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Message from the Mayor

As you have heard me say in my Mayor's Message before, Public Safety is *Priority One* for your Village Board. In line with that priority, providing excellent Fire and Emergency

Medical Services to the Village has been a priority identified in our Strategic Plan for the past several years. This priority is also supported by our recent Community Survey which indicated a high degree of citizen satisfaction with our Fire and Emergency Response Services.

In this Mayor's Message, I have some significant and exciting Fire Department updates I would like to share with you

Over the past few years, the Village has been growing in the south with the annexing of unincorporated properties adjacent to Mount Prospect. In 2016 and 2017, we annexed the Birchwood Manor Condominium and the former United Airlines property, among other formerly unincorporated commercial and industrial properties. Our goal, over time, has been to annex most of the unincorporated properties all the way to the Tollway (I-90). By doing this, all of the property tax revenues associated with those new properties will come to the Village of Mount Prospect and help your Village Board keep our residential property taxes low throughout the entire Village. As you may know, there has been no increase to the Village portion of the property tax levy for the past 3 years.

As we moved forward with this objective of annexation, we were providing those new properties that had come into the Village with emergency services from Station 12 located at Golf Road and Busse Road. With the abrupt closing of the Elk Grove Rural Fire Protection District that was providing emergency services to the remaining unincorporated areas, the Mount Prospect Fire Department is now the primary emergency service provider to those remaining unincorporated areas just south of our Village.

With the agreement to provide these emergency services, the Village took over the former Elk Grove Rural Fire Station. The Village now has a fourth Fire Station (Station 11) from which to provide Fire and Emergency Services. Station 11 is located just south of Algonquin Road at Linneman Road. We are currently in the process of upgrading that building to meet our standards. We have increased our staffing and emergency vehicles to cover this area and we retain a Mutual Aid Agreement with the City of Des Plaines and Elk Grove Village when additional help is needed.

Again, in line with our *Public Safety Priority*, in 2023, we hired six new firefighters, and placed a fourth frontline ambulance in service. With our ambulances and our *paramedic staffed* fire trucks, this gives us eight Advanced Life Support (ALS) vehicles in our fleet from which to save lives throughout our community. I am also very happy to tell you that the number of new-hire firefighter candidates is up, and our proactive hiring process has resulted in greater diversity.

As an aside, you should know that we are extremely fortunate to have a team of very talented firefighters serving the entire community who are building their skill sets by going above and beyond their required training. Our firefighters hold advanced degrees and certifications in over a dozen *rescue* areas ranging from Below Grade Trench Rescue to Confined Space Rescue to High Angle Rope Rescue to Underwater Dive Rescue to Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT) Response. Rest assured that you and your fellow citizens are safer because of the dedicated, highly skilled members of the Mount Prospect Fire Department.

In closing, I wholeheartedly believe South Mount Prospect is the *Land* of Opportunity. With the upcoming development of the Cloud HQ Data Center and the recently approved new Dimeo Brother Construction facility along with the additional property annexations on the Oakton Street Corridor, there is extremely high potential for new economic development in South Mount Prospect. The new revenues coming from these potential developments will benefit all the citizens of the Village of Mount Prospect. With the Emergency Service enhancements I have described in this Mayor's Message, we are well prepared to provide emergency services to the citizens and businesses of South Mount Prospect as well as continuing our excellent track record of service to our community, as a whole.
