








Are you ready to rock the block? **The 2024 Downtown Mount Prospect Block Party returns on Friday, July 26, and Saturday, July 27.** This annual event is downtown Mount Prospect's biggest party of the year, drawing close to ten thousand people in 2023! Friends, family, neighbors, and newcomers will join together at the corner of Emerson Street and Busse Avenue for two days of music, food, and festivities.

Block Party kicks off at 4 pm on Friday the 26th. Classic rock band Old School takes the stage at 4:30 pm to start off an evening of musical performances. Hang out by the stage on the Centennial Green or watch the show from afar on the event's jumbotron.

No block party is complete without food! Stroll through the *Picnic in the Park* area located at the Edwin and Elsie (Meyn) Busse Pocket Park for food booths and trucks from local restaurants (available Friday and Saturday). Diverse menus offer something for everyone, whether you're in the mood for pizza, gyros, hot dogs, tacos, or pierogis! Pair your meal with a beverage from the beer tent or one of the specialty drink providers.

At 6:30 pm, Whiskey Road performs their blend of classic, country, and southern rock before making way for the night's headliner, Sixteen Candles, providing one of the top '80s pop music experiences. End the evening on a sweet note! Don't leave without grabbing some ice cream or other sweet treats to complete the night.

Saturday the 27th offers fun for all ages starting at 11 am. Make core memories with the family by checking out the free games, rides, and activities in the *Kids Zone*. Kids can enjoy old favorites like face painting, pony rides, balloon art, and giant inflatables or explore





Property Tax Relief Grant

Property tax bills are expected to be on time this year and go out in July with a due date of August 1. Applications for the Property Tax Relief Grant will be available online sometime in September.

The Property Tax Relief Grant is meant to provide funds to qualifying owners of single-family residences. There will be an opportunity to receive assistance in completing the application, which will be announced at a later date.

Generous Food Donation from VFW Post 1337

This past May, members of Mount Prospect VFW Post 1337 delivered over 1,500 pounds of non-perishable food items to the Mount Prospect Food Pantry. The donation marked the culmination of a 5-week food drive sponsored by the Post.

Contributions came from residents throughout the community who dropped donations off at Mount Prospect Police and Fire Departments, Mt. Prospect Park District locations, the Village Library, Costco at Randhurst Village, Jewel Food Store on Euclid Avenue, and other places throughout town.

The Food Drive was organized through a joint venture between the VFW national organization and Humana's Uniting To Combat Hunger Grant Program (UTCH).

"Humana is a strong supporter of the Illinois VFW and UTCH is a great example of that. This drive gave our Post the opportunity to fight hunger locally and receive a grant from UTCH," Food Drive Chairman Jim Parker said. "This donation is a great example of the incredible generosity of Mount Prospect's citizens and government officials."

Post 1337 is planning another Food Drive this fall with the

target of matching this donation.

New Dining Option Coming Soon

The downtown Mount Prospect dining scene will expand later this year with the arrival of The Prospect.

The new eatery will fill a two-story 5,400 square foot space located in the 20West luxury apartment complex. General Manager Garrett Supples and Chef Mauro Berruti (Gibson's Italia, Bazaar Meat Chicago, and Chicago Cut Steakhouse) will offer an elevated food experience with an Italian Artisan flare, incorporating charcoal and wood-fired elements. Seating for the restaurant will span across two floors, accommodating 90 to 100 guests on the first floor and 50 to 75 guests on the second floor. A full-service bar will be located on each level, with the second floor offering outdoor rooftop dining. The long-awaited restaurant is actively under construction and expected to open in late 2024.



Connections Field

Community members gathered at Euclid Elementary School (711 E Euclid Ave) for the soft opening of Connections Field on Saturday, June 15. The 4,500 square foot mini-soccer pitch is open to the public from dawn to dusk, except for the hours that school is in session. The pitch features rebound boards and netting to keep the ball contained, and high-quality synthetic turf to provide a safe level playing surface. The project was conceived by Daniel Martinez, a former resident of Mount Prospect, in partnership with Euclid Elementary School staff. The Village contributed \$186,000 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds and Mr. Martinez secured private donations from community members and local businesses to bring the pitch to life. The field will positively impact the community by improving access to recreational amenities in the Boxwood area, increasing physical activity, providing a safe space for youth, and building community through stewardship of the field. Euclid School will host a grand opening and ribbon cutting in the fall when school is back in session.

Fire Department

Stay Safe during 4th of July Celebrations and Leave Fireworks to the Professionals

Celebrating the Fourth of July weekend is synonymous with barbecues, friends and fun. The Mount Prospect Fire Department would like to remind all residents that there are plenty of firework displays conducted by professionals to add to your celebration.

Every year, thousands of people are injured and require medical treatment for fireworks-related incidents. Most of these injuries occur to children and young adults. The Village of Mount Prospect Fire Prevention Code prohibits the use, purchase, and possession of fireworks. Fines for using fireworks can range from \$500 to \$2,500 per incident.

All fireworks are dangerous and can result in serious burns, hearing loss, and other serious injuries. One-third of these injuries result in permanent eye damage. In addition, fireworks have led to a number of fires that have caused significant property damage. Contrary to popular belief, sparklers are not a safe alternative as they can reach temperatures of up to 2000°F, hot enough to burn some metals! Sparklers can quickly ignite clothing and children have received severe burns by dropping them on their feet. Sparklers alone account for more than 25% of



emergency room visits for fireworks injuries.

Instead of fireworks, you can celebrate the holiday safely by using glow sticks, glow in the dark toys, flashlights, and party poppers.

Interacting with Your Powerlines



Whether you are performing some home maintenance or repairs, or cleaning up after a summer storm, powerlines require safe behavior. They are an important part of modern living, but are hazardous if not properly respected.

Always assume powerlines are live. This applies to utility poles and the powerlines that are entering a home or building. Even momentary contact with live powerlines can cause injury or even death.

If you ever see a downed powerline, call 911 and ComEd immediately to report your findings. Do not touch anyone or anything that is in contact with the downed powerline, as the ground around powerlines can be energized up to 35 feet away. Keep children and pets away and never drive over the powerlines.

Overhead powerlines can also be dangerous. Items like kites, balloons, and remote-controlled aircrafts should be flown away from overhead electric lines to avoid power outages, fires, and serious injuries. Avoid using metallic balloons outdoors; when metallic balloons come in contact with electric powerlines, they can conduct electricity and create a short circuit that overheats and damages electrical equipment. Enough damage can cause powerlines to fall to the ground.

If a balloon or a toy is caught in a powerline, contact ComEd immediately at 1.800.334.7661. Never attempt to retrieve these items on your own. When working around the home, look up before lifting ladders to avoid contact with electrical lines. Stay at least 10 feet away from all overhead powerlines. Use only wooden and fiberglass ladders outdoors as metal ladders conduct electricity. Never climb or trim trees that are growing into or near powerlines. Accidentally cutting or coming in contact with a powerline can be deadly.

Remember these important safety tips. Stay away to stay alive!

Lawn Mower Safety

Whether you view lawn care as a chore or an enjoyable hobby, safety should be a primary concern. You can keep your lawn looking great while still adhering to important safety steps.

An important first step is to dress for safety. Long pants and sturdy shoes are a good combination to protect your body from any flying debris or objects. Ensure that all shields on your lawn mower are in place and secure to protect any contact with the blades.

Protective eyewear and hearing protection are highly recommended.

Keeping your mower well maintained not only extends its life, but also keeps you safe. Check your lawn mower's belts for any cracks or broken parts. If you notice any wear and tear, that could be a sign of mechanical issues that could pose a fire hazard. Take your lawn mower to be serviced to ensure that everything is properly maintained.

When refueling the mower, make sure the engine is off and fully cooled. Hot engines can ignite the gasoline vapors causing fires and potentially major burns. Keep your gas container at a safe distance from a running mower.

Before mowing, be sure to check the area for any rocks or loose debris.

The Mount Prospect Police Department is now accepting applications for the Citizens Police Academy. The Academy is open to any Village resident 18 years old with no past criminal history. This year's Academy will begin September 9 and meet for 11 consecutive Monday evenings through November 18, from 6:30-9:30 pm. Classes will be held at the Mount Prospect Police Department (911 E. Kensington Rd.).

The Academy will allow citizens to get a firsthand look at police operations and give them the opportunity to experience police work from the officer's point of view. Topics covered in the Academy will include traffic enforcement, crime scene processing, traffic crash investigation, and criminal law. Academy students will also be allowed to make simulated traffic stops and learn from the department's master firearms instructors on the department's pistol range.

Watering Restrictions

As part of the Lake Michigan Water Allocation Program, water suppliers are required to place certain restrictions on outdoor water use to ensure that there is a continuous adequate water supply for drinking, bathing and fire protection. Water conservation measures are an important first step in protecting our water supply.

Current restrictions prevent anyone from using any water, drawn directly or indirectly from public wells and/or public water supply distribution systems, for the purpose of watering or sprinkling lawns and gardens, filling or refilling swimming pools, outside washing, or other exterior uses, except under these conditions:

Watering and/or sprinkling is permitted for odd numbered addresses on odd numbered dates and for even numbered

addresses on even numbered dates only between the hours of 4 pm and 10 am.

Newly sodded areas of lawns may be watered at any time on any day for the two-week period following the installation.

These rules are in effect seven days a week.

2024 Water Report

The state of Illinois and federal Environmental Protection Agency are now allowing water suppliers to offer electronic delivery of their annual Consumer Confidence Reports. Sending electronic copies will save thousands of dollars in printing and postage costs for the Village and fully meets the public notification requirements. Overhead Sewer Rebates

In order to provide financial assistance to residents who want to convert their existing gravity-fed sanitary system into an overhead sanitary sewer system, the Village has established an Overhead Sewer Rebate program. To be eligible for this program, homeowners of single-family dwellings must be a Village wastewater utility consumer.

The program offers a rebate for costs incurred from converting an existing gravity sewer system to an overhead sewer system. The Village will reimburse an eligible homeowner for up to 50%, but not more than \$7,500 of actual costs incurred. What is Stormwater Pollution?

When it rains, some of the rainwater soaks into the ground, and part of it flows over the ground and directly into creeks, streams or rivers. This water that runs off into the river is called runoff, or sometimes stormwater runoff. Sometimes this stormwater runoff gets polluted. Pollution is anything that harms natural resources, whether it is air, soil, or in this case, water. Sometimes the pollution is something you can see, like trash floating on top of the water. Other times you can't see the pollution at all, like when motor oil from a car washes into a nearby creek. Polluted runoff is the number one cause of water pollution in the United States.

Why is stormwater pollution a concern?

It is of concern for two main issues: one related to the volume and timing of runoff water and the other related to potential contaminants that the water is carrying from human and animal activities. These contaminants are picked up as water from a storm or garden hoses and sprinklers drain from streets, parking lots and lawns and enter the system through our catch basins and storm drains. From there, they are transferred straight to rivers and streams untreated. Anything that is dumped or dropped on the ground or in the gutter contributes to stormwater pollution.

Is stormwater treated before it reaches the river?

No! Stormwater systems flow directly into the rivers, lakes and streams. The cost of treating stormwater would be so high that it would exceed available resources.

Is there a difference between a storm drain and a sewer drain? Yes! They are two completely separate drainage systems. The sewer system takes all household wastewater from toilets, showers and sinks and routes it through your plumbing system and directs it to a treatment plant.

The storm drain is intended to route rainwater quickly off the streets during a heavy storm. Unfortunately, it takes all the runoff along with it. Chemicals, trash, debris from lawns, parking lots and streets, either intentionally or accidentally spilled, goes straight into our waterways.

The Effects of Pollution

Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals and people.

- Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment also can destroy aquatic habitats.
- Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.
- Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.
- Debris, plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette buttswashed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water. Polluted stormwater often affects drinking water sources. This, in turn, can affect human health and increase drinking water treatment costs.

Let's all work together to lessen the impact of stormwater pollution one drop at a time!

Tree Planting

As we do each year, the Village has set a goal to replace every tree that has been removed through the fall planting season to the extent that our budget will allow. Residents who have lost a parkway tree should expect to receive notification explaining the replacement. The Village will continue replacing trees, at suitable planting sites, in the order they were removed although in some cases replacement trees will not be available until next year.

To maintain a healthy variety of trees, species will be hand-selected by Village staff at an Illinois nursery and planted and guaranteed for one year by a landscape contractor. Eight to ten different species are generally available per planting season.

All requests for fall planting must be received at Public Works no later than August 1.

Paper Shredding Event

Public Works in partnership with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) will host a shredding/document destruction event on August 3 from 8-11 am. You can drop off up to six file-size cardboard boxes or shopping bags filled with paper material to be securely shredded at 1700 W. Central Ave. This is a great opportunity to securely destroy materials such as medical records, tax forms, personnel files, investment records, and more.

Paper clips and staples do not need to be removed, but please remove binders and **do not use plastic bags** to deliver the

Message from the Mayor

Prosperity and Opportunity

The last few years have been a time of great *prosperity and opportunity* throughout our Village with many new

buildings being built, new businesses opening up, growth in the actual land size of Mount Prospect through annexations, and major commitments of capital within our Village by the investment community.

What does this mean to the citizens of our Village? The more unincorporated land area we bring into the Village and the more the new development we can attract, there is and will be a growth in our Equalized Assessed Value (EAV) and growth in our overall real estate tax base. With more businesses opening their doors in Mount Prospect, there is and will be a growth in a variety of other taxes paid by those businesses to the Village with sales taxes being a primary example. The growth of EAV and new business openings are two very significant factors bringing huge benefit to *all* of the citizens of Mount Prospect.

Bottom line, our Village is growing and becoming more valuable. This growth in value and the growth in taxes paid based on that value benefit all of the residents of our Village by reducing our need for *residential* property taxes to operate the Village day-to-day. This, in turn, allows your Village Board to keep the Village's portion of your *Residential Property* tax low, flat, or reduced year over year.

• Annexations: Since 2017, 224 acres of land have become a part of the Village of Mount Prospect through annexation. These annexations have added \$134.7 million of new Equalized Assessed Value (EAV) which generates \$1.2 million of property taxes to the Village, annually. We have welcomed the businesses that are in those 224 acres to the Mount Prospect business community. These businesses generate \$215,000 of additional sales taxes to the Village, as well.

• **Development:** Three new developments being built on land that has recently been annexed into the Village include Cloud HQ Data Center, the Commonwealth Edison Substation, and the Dimeo Brother Contractors. In addition, we have also seen new developments being built or soon to be built on land in South Mount Prospect that has been a part of the Village for many years. These new developments include a mixed-use retail/residential building at 1798 Elmhurst Rd., a 53-unit senior living facility at 2040 W. Algonquin Rd., and a new car wash at 1791 Wall St.

As you have heard me state many times before, the entirety of Mount Prospect has huge potential for growth. However, more specifically, South Mount Prospect holds significant potential for development given the lack of investment that has occurred there over the years.

South Mount Prospect is the *Land of Opportunity* given its future potential for new development such as industrial development, additional data center development, and even residential development. This area is unique due to its close proximity to O'Hare Airport and other industry (potential business to business opportunities). Paired with planned public improvements like a newly renovated Fire Station 11, investment in water mains, roadways, and beautification projects, South Mount Prospect will be very desirable for new development into the future.

It is an incredibly exciting time of growth and development in our Village, and as your Mayor, I wholeheartedly believe Mount Prospect has an extremely positive future!
