News from the Finance Department EyeOnWater Portal

Mount Prospect offers direct and secure access to your water usage data with the EyeOnWater suite. The secure website which can be accessed at mountprospect.org/eyeonwater allows you to review and analyze your water usage patterns. You can also download the EyeOnWater app to your smart phone for convenience.

The EyeOnWater suite allows you to view your hourly water usage and gain greater control of the amount of water you use. The online portal provides easy to understand graphs and gives you the ability to establish alerts, including identifying potential leaks.

To access your personalized online portal visit mountprospect.org/ eyeonwater. To register for an account, you will need your zip code, account number (enter only the digits before the dash) and email address.

Property Tax Relief Grant

The Board of Trustees has approved funds to provide 2024 Mount Prospect real estate tax relief for qualifying owners of single-family residences. This opportunity is available to households having a gross annual income equal to or less than \$29,160 for 1 person or \$39,440 for 2 or more persons. The rebate is equal to 50% of the Village's portion of the total 2023 Cook County real estate tax bill, up to a maximum of \$250. Please apply after you have paid the 2nd installment of your 2023 tax bill.

Assistance in completing the application will be available at Village Hall, 50 S. Emerson St. in the Finance Department on Tuesday, October 8 from 1:30 to 4 pm and Thursday October 10, from 9:30 am to noon. No appointment is necessary. Information will be mailed out in September to those who have participated in the program in the past. Visit mountprospect.org/propertytaxrelief to obtain the 2024 Property Tax Relief Grant. Bill Delivery and Payment Options

Simplify your bill payment process for your water, sewer, and refuse bills by enrolling for electronic billing at mountprospect.org/BillPay. The service provides automatic email notifications when a new bill is ready for viewing and allows you to review your current bill and check your entire billing history from the time you sign-up for the service. Electronic billing allows you to manage e-billing delivery and email address preferences.

For bill payment, there are several convenient options available based on your preferred method.

- One-time online credit/debit card or bank account payment (no service fee) at mountprospect.org/billpay.
- Recurring credit/debit card or bank account payment (no service fee) at mountprospect.org/billpay. With this option funds are withdrawn on the due date of the bill.
- We have a 24-hour payment kiosk outside of Village Hall at 50 S. Emerson St. where you can access your account. The kiosk accepts credit/debit cards, checks, and cash, and can scan the account information on a blank check and process the payment via the kiosk screen. Partial or entire balance payments are accepted. Receipt options include print, text, or email.
- We also have 24-hour lock boxes on the north side of the parking deck and outside the main entrance to Village Hall where you can leave payments via check.
- You are always welcome to drop payments off during normal business hours at the Finance Department in Village Hall.



News From TV Services MPDC TV is On the Move

For those cable customers who get their channels through Astound/RCN (formerly WOW), you will have changed from a tabletop cable box to an IPTV (Internet Protocol Television) streaming box in recent months. The Village's Government Access Channel, MPDC, is no longer found on channel 17 but has moved to 1172. You can still find all the local events and meetings on MPDC there.

If you are on the Comcast/Xfinity system you will still be able to find MPDC on Channel 17.

Village of Mount Prospect Launches Monument Signage Project

In mid-June 2024, the Village of Mount Prospect initiated a Request for Proposal (RFP) to engage environmental graphic design consultants for the design of three monument signs at key locations within the Village. This project aims to enhance the Village's community identity and visibility.

One of the new Village gateway entry signs is planned for South Mount Prospect, to be located along the east side of Busse Rd., just north of the I-90 freeway. Additionally, two existing monument signs at the Kensington Business Center — situated at the key intersections of Rand Road/Business Center Dr. and Feehanville Drive/Wolf Rd. — have been identified for updating and replacement.

The Village conducted interviews with qualified design firms in late July and is currently evaluating and selecting the best candidate. The selected team will provide professional services for the design and development of these key signage elements. The design process will encompass a site selection study for the gateway sign in South Mount Prospect and the replacement of the two Kensington Business Center signs.

A steering committee will guide the design phase, and the proposed sign designs will be presented at a Committee of the Whole Meeting for community input. The project will conclude with a final design and a construction cost estimate, which will be presented to the Village Board at an upcoming meeting (TBD). The total budget for the design and construction of these signs is \$800,000.

CERT Team Recognized for 20 Years of Service

At the Village Board meeting on August 20, Mayor Hoefert read a proclamation to honor the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) for 20 years of service to the community.

The CERT Team is a volunteer organization under the direction of the Mount Prospect Emergency Management division of the Fire Department



and is comprised of 30 members who help during disasters or serve as support personnel at special events in the community. Team members are trained in multiple skills including basic first aid, traffic control, communications, urban search, and disaster preparedness.

These dedicated citizens attend monthly training meetings and typically support one community event a month. The events fall into either planned or unplanned categories. Some of the planned events in the community include the Family Bike Ride, 4th of July parade, Fire Department Open House, Police National Night Out, Emergency Management Disaster Preparedness Expo, local 5K run/ walk events, Celebration of Cultures and others. Unplanned or emergency events may involve assisting with fires, traffic incidents, area flooding, missing persons, or any time emergency services need extra help.

National Preparedness Month

During September the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the National Weather Service (NWS) focus their outreach on educating and empowering Americans to prepare for, and learn how to respond to, all types of emergencies including tornados, flash floods, water main breaks, and power outages. These events can last several days, and the ramifications can be devastating, so having a plan on how to handle any of them is crucial. When unexpected emergencies occur, the whole community is affected, which can be overwhelming for first responders. When more people are prepared, the quicker the community will recover. This month is a good time to challenge yourself to follow these steps to formulate a family plan of action should an emergency or disastrous event occur.


Step 1 - Be Informed

A NOAA weather radio is a portable, programmable device that can detect and alert you to severe weather threats in your area. It will emit alert tones that correlate to the severity of a storm. It allows you to monitor reports when sheltering where a tv is not available.

Step 2 - Make a Plan

Be prepared to evacuate or shelter in place depending upon the nature

of the emergency. Make sure you know where the nearest shelters are, as well as the appropriate evacuation routes/plans for specific

Step 3 – Build a Supply Kit

For any type of emergency, you should prepare a supply kit with provisions for up to three days without electricity, water service, access to a grocery store, or other local services. There are many lists online of what items to include in a kit, but some suggested items include water, non-perishable food, a can opener, paper and plasticware, flashlights, a first aid kit, chargers, masks, sanitation wipes, and a whistle to signal for help if needed. Don't forget important items such as prescription medication, pet food, blankets, a change of clothes, personal hygiene products, paper, and a pen.

Being proactive rather than reactive could save your life or that of someone you love.

How to Identify a Scam

The easiest way to avoid being caught in a scam is to know the signs and prevent the situation from escalating.

Scammers pretend to be from an organization you know.

Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of a government agency such as the IRS, Social Security Administration, or Medicare. They might make up a name for a government agency or say they are from a business you know, perhaps a utility company. It is also common for them to say they represent a charity assuming you will donate if asked. Be aware that they have the technology to alter their name and number as it appears on your caller ID to further convince you that they are legitimate.

They will say there's a problem or offer a prize.

The caller might say you're in trouble with the government, you owe money, someone in your family had an emergency, or that there's a virus on your computer. They might also say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information to help them correct it. Others will say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to receive it.

They will pressure you to act immediately.

This is their way of getting you to act before you have time to think. They will tell you not to hang up and threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, deport you, or say your computer is about to be corrupted.

They will ask you to pay in a specific way.

Scammers often insist that you pay by sending money through a money

transfer company or by putting money on a gift card and then giving them the number on the back. Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), tell you to deposit it, and then send them money.

There are some steps you can take to prevent falling victim to these crimes.

- Block all unwanted calls and text messages.
- Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect. Legitimate organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for your personal information, like your Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers. If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy, or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.
- Resist the pressure to act immediately. Legitimate businesses will give you time to decide. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.
- Know how scammers tell you to pay. Never pay someone who insists
 you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service. And
 never deposit a check and send money back to someone.
- Stop and talk to someone you trust. Before you do anything else, tell someone — a friend, a family member, a neighbor — what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.


National Child Passenger Safety Week

If you can't make it to this event, you can also schedule a car seat check by calling the Police Department at 847.870.5656 or by using the mpDelivers app (powered by SeeClickFix).

We always recommend registering your car seat with the manufacturer to receive recalls and safety notices. You can also sign up with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to receive email alerts about car seat and booster seat recalls.

Tree Care Season

If you enjoy fall colors on your trees and look forward to the return of leaves each spring, now is a great time to care for your trees. Trees will be moving into dormancy soon and you can protect their health with some important steps this fall.

Begin by keeping trees sufficiently watered during the fall. Generally, an inch of rain per week provides enough water but if we encounter a dry period, additional watering is necessary. Run a sprinkler under the tree canopy, keeping in mind that roots can extend out as far as a tree is tall, so keep the entire area watered.

You can then help retain moisture and prevent freezing when the cold weather arrives by applying a 2"-3" layer of mulch under the tree canopy. Wood chips make a good, natural source of protection and help prevent weed growth. Just be sure not to place the mulch directly against the base of the tree.

Fertilizing should take place as well, but timing is essential. If not completed by early September, it is better to wait until a tree has gone dormant in late November. This prevents a flush of new growth that will not be hardened off prior to the arrival of freezing temperatures.

Fall is a great time to inspect trees, looking for insect damage. While most insect damage occurs early in the season, some control measures may be needed in the fall for best results. If significant damage is noted, it is best to consult a tree-care professional as insect life cycles vary and can impact your trees at different times.

Some light pruning in fall is a great idea. Removing dead and broken limbs can improve the health of a tree, as well as reduce insect damage and fungi. Removing fallen leaves, fruit, and other tree debris from the landscape can help reduce foliar diseases the following season. If you don't feel like you can safely take on the pruning, call a professional to get the work done for you.





IEPA Tips for Improving Water Quality

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) invites you to review these tips about water quality hot spots in your home and yard.



Good Practices

- Compost your grass clippings and leaves into nutrient-rich mulch for your planting beds and gardens.

 Create natural areas and planting beds to
 - lend variety to a residential lawn, attract wildlife, and reduce the amount of lawn to mow and fertilize.
- Direct downspouts to unpaved areas to allow rainwater to soak into the ground, controlling the flow of runoff into local waterways.
- Protect your family and waterways, streams, and lakes by safely storing chemical products. Make sure lawn chemicals, car care products, and household cleaners are properly sealed in their containers and safely stored away from people, pets, and runoff water.

Practices to Avoid

 Excessive use of fertilizers and pesticides. If you do use them, sweep excess amounts off paved areas to prevent runoff into storm sewers.



- Improper car maintenance will cause small oil drips or gas leaks, which become runoff that washes these toxic chemicals into waterways.
- Bare soil allows runoff into sewers. Prevent this by planting the area with grass or some other vegetation, and then immediately cover with mulch or hay until vegetation takes root.

Keep your home toxin-free by recycling items that should never be thrown in the trash, recycling bin, or thrown down the drain, sewer or flushed in a toilet. This event is for residents only; no commercial or business waste will be accepted.

Open Enrollment for Medicare D

The Open Enrollment period for Medicare D begins October 15 and runs through December 7. Premiums, co-pays, deductibles, and drugs covered change from year to year, so it is important to be aware of the details.

A limited number of appointments will be available to Mount Prospect residents looking for assistance with determining which plan may be best for the coming year. You can meet with Human Services Department Social Workers and senior health insurance volunteers to discuss options and complete your enrollment. Behavioral Health Subsidy Program
