

# **A YEAR OF PROGRESS**

IN THE LAST YEAR, THE VILLAGE HAS TAKEN SIGNIFICANT STRIDES IN ITS STRATEGIC GOALS & COMMITMENT TO QUALITY OF LIFE. BELOW ARE A FEW KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS & MILESTONES FROM 2024:

### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

- The Village issued 54 new business licenses. Six new restaurants opened in the downtown with a seventh anticipated this year.
- Mount Prospect's 3.7M sq. ft. of commercial space is currently 3.5% vacant, well below the 10-year average of 8%. Macy's, Planet Fitness, and O'Reilly Auto Parts announced new locations in town, occupying a combined ~80,000 sq. ft. of formerly vacant space.
- Mount Prospect's 5.6M sq. ft. of industrial space is currently 4.4% vacant, below the 10-year average of 5.32%. A new 190,000 sq. ft. spec industrial space is being built at 1305 E. Algonquin Rd. by Seefried Properties, and an addition to the CVS laboratory and distribution center will create 17,000 sq. ft. of new warehouse space.

### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

- The Village officially opened a fourth fire station, Station 11, at 1415 Algonquin Rd. With a new four station response, the Fire Department is seeing up to 90-second response time improvements in some of its busiest areas and a reduction in mutual aid requests.
- The Police Department hosted a successful spring and fall season of beat meetings to enhance community engagement. See page 7 for the November meeting schedule.
- The Village Board approved the addition of a school resource officer, taking the Police Department from 89 to 90 sworn officers.

### **VILLAGE FINANCES**

- The 2025 Proposed Budget includes a property tax reduction from the Village by 6.4%. This new levy will be the lowest in the last ten years.
- The average household will see a reduction of \$65 in the Village's portion of property taxes. Combined with the 5% reduction in 2024 and the elimination of vehicle stickers, the average household will save approximately \$208.
- The estimated fund balance at the end of 2024 is \$41.9M, which equates to 50% of the 2025 annual budget and expenditures.

### **VILLAGE INFRASTRUCTURE**

• Public Works staff put a new stormwater pumping station at Levee 37 into service. Pump Station "2.5" will provide an unprecedented level of flood protection for hundreds of homes west of River Rd. and will increase pumping capacity by at least 120 cubic feet per second.

- The Village completed major improvements to the intersections at Rand Rd., Central Rd., and Mount Prospect Rd. Total vehicle delay has been reduced by almost 45% and travel time through the intersections has been reduced by 30%.
- The Village worked with the Northwest Suburban Municipal Joint Action Water Agency and Northwest Water Commission to successfully complete a unique, three-party emergency water interconnect system. The interconnection can provide the Village with up to 7.5 million gallons per day.

### **VILLAGE INITIATIVES**

- As part of the Aging in Community Initiative, a Senior Activities Coordinator joined the Human Services Department.
- An inaugural Health & Wellness Expo was held for older adults in October.
- The Village piloted a Downtown Valet Parking Program that parked more than 100 vehicles every weekend from March-September.
- The Village secured a lease to rent 40 parking stalls for public use in the St. Mark's parking lot, and 92 additional stalls were painted on Prospect Ave. to add to parking capacity in the area.
- The Village launched a Prospect Ave. Alfresco Dining Pilot Program.

### **VILLAGE RECOGNITION**

- The Village received its second consecutive *Leading the Way* award from ETC Institute for ranking in the top 10% for overall quality and value of services.
- The Finance Department was awarded a third consecutive *Triple Crow*n from the Government Finance Officers Association for Excellence in Financial Reporting, the Popular Annual Financial Reporting Award, and the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award.
- The Community Connections Center celebrated 15 years in August.
- The Village's Community Emergency Response Team was recognized in August for 20 years of service.
- The Village's Strategic Marketing Plan received a national *Award of Excellence* from the City-County Communications & Marketing Association in September.



## Safety in the Kitchen




Expecting a big crowd at your house this Thanksgiving? We all know things can get a little hectic in the kitchen on that big day, but keeping things under control in the kitchen goes beyond just having a fun family celebration. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), Thanksgiving Day has the highest number of home-

cooking fire incidents. Fires are about three times more likely to occur on this day than on any other day of the year.

Family and friends gathering in the kitchen can cause distractions while preparing a meal that can greatly increase the risk of a fire while cooking. Set yourself up for a safe and successful Thanksgiving by following these cooking tips:

- Give your complete attention to one dish at a time. Be aware of what's in the oven or on the stovetop.
- Use timers to prevent distractions from allowing things to overheat or burn.
- Keep all flammable materials such as oven mitts, dishtowels, and wooden utensils away from heat sources.
- Keep kids busy with games and activities in another room during peak cooking times.
- Keep your cooking away from the edge of the stove and turn all pot handles inward. This will prevent kids or pets from knocking them down.

If a pot catches on fire, never attempt to move it and don't pour water on top of a fire ignited with grease or oil. The splashing action might spread the fire. Put a lid on top of the pot to smother the fire, leave the pot where it is, and turn the heat off when the fire has been suppressed.

# Fall Leaf Collection

A few weeks remain for residents to participate in the Village's fall loose leaf collection program, which provides a convenient means of disposing of leaves at no cost. This year the program will run until December 6. There will be no leaf collection on Thanksgiving or the following day. During Thanksgiving week, Public Works will attempt to collect across the entire town between Monday and Wednesday, so we recommend having all your leaves ready by Monday, November 25. No bagging is required as you simply need to place loose leaves at the curb on your weekly collection day. You can visit mountprospect.org/publicworks for a collection schedule map.

Leaves may be raked onto the pavement one foot from the curb one day prior to the scheduled collection day. The program is for leaves only; please do not include twigs, branches, or grass clippings with the leaves.

## Say Goodbye to Those Pumpkins

Make your Halloween clean-up easy and green this year by composting your pumpkins. You can drop off clean pumpkins at Public Works, 1700 W. Central Rd., on November 2 from 8-11 am. Pumpkins may have acrylic paint on them, but please remove decorations such as candles, yarn, stickers, or other materials. The event is for pumpkins only and is open to Mount Prospect residents and residents of other SWANCC member communities. No business or commercial drop-offs. For additional information, contact the Public Works Department at 847.870.5640. If you miss the pickup, please do not rake leaves to the curb. The collection equipment will travel each street just once on the scheduled collection day.

# Remember, burning leaves in Mount Prospect is not allowed.



# Season Ending Soon for Organics and Yard Waste Pick-up

The Village's organics/yard waste pick-up program concludes for the year on December 13. Please be sure to have properly prepared organics/yard waste at the curb prior to your final collection. There will be no additional pick-ups after the 13th. The start date for the 2025 pick-up program will be posted at mountprospect.org/organics prior to the start of the pick-up season.

## Your Vehicle and the Environment

Proper car maintenance is important in the effort to protect the local environment. Many vehicle fluids can be hazardous to waterways as whatever is dumped into storm drains or onto pavement will wind up in local creeks and, ultimately, in the Des Plaines River.

If you change your own oil, it is very important that you properly dispose of it by putting it in a sturdy container, labeling it, and taking it to a local oil recycling location. Call Public Works at 847.870.5640 for a current list of oil recycling stations.

Antifreeze is also dangerous to the environment. It contains ingredients that are poisonous to people, fish, and wildlife and should be treated in the same manner as waste oil. In the case of a spill involving any of these types of materials, use kitty litter, sawdust, cornmeal, or special oil absorbent products to absorb the spill and then sweep up the absorbent after a few hours. ### Prevent Water Line Freeze-ups in Your Home

Winter may bring a major water problem to some homes. Frozen pipes can rupture and cause flooding in your home, which can lead to significant damage. Follow these steps to reduce the risk of a frozen water line in your home.

- Insulate indoor water lines in unheated areas, along exterior walls, in crawl spaces, and in garages.
- Drain and disconnect all outdoor hoses from the hose bibbs on the exterior of your house. Cover the bibbs for extra protection.
- Constant movement will help decrease the chances of water lines freezing, so leave a slow drip of water running at a faucet located in a lower part of the home. Remember to run cold water and not hot water when doing this.
- Frozen lines usually occur where the water line enters the basement or crawl space. When thawing a frozen water line, do not use a torch. Too much heat too fast can cause the ice inside the pipe to fracture. This could rupture the pipe and cause flooding. Rather, try using a hair dryer, space heater, or rags soaked in warm water to gradually warm the frozen pipes.
- In the event of a water line rupture, it is important to know both the location of the main shut-off valve for your home and how to operate it.


### Mailbox Guidelines

The United States Postal Service has very specific criteria for the placement of mailboxes at your home. Now is a good time to check the location and condition of your free-standing mailbox to make sure it is structurally sound.

If you need to replace a mailbox for any reason, be sure to adhere to these requirements:

- The front face of the mailbox, once mounted, should be 12" from the back of the curb, or if no curb is present, shall be 24" from the road pavement.
- The distance from grade to the bottom surface of the mailbox should be 48".
- The mounting structure for a post-mounted mailbox must be either:
  - A wood post of which the area of an average cross section may not be more than 16".
  - A metal post not more than 2  $\mbox{\sc 1}{}/\mbox{\sc 2}$  in outside diameter.

Residents should take all necessary precautions to prevent damage to any existing utilities located in the parkway. Before digging, residents should contact JULIE at 1.800.892.0123 or by simply dialing 811.

# Message from the Mayor

2024 has been an exceptional year in Mount Prospect with so many positive things happening and we are all the collective beneficiaries of those positive things. New large-scale developments, new retail opportunities resulting in sales tax growth, responsible spending of our tax dollars, and proactive preparation for the

future has created tremendous economic growth. These key factors allowed your Village Board to support and approve the **reduction** of the Village's portion of our property tax levy by 6.3% in the 2025 budget.

When the 2025 tax levy reduction of 6.3% is combined with the 2024 tax levy reduction of 4.8%, the Village's portion of your property tax levy has been reduced by 11% over the last 2 years. In dollars, this equates to a reduction of \$118 on the median priced home. In 2024, your Village Board also *permanently* eliminated vehicle stickers providing an additional annual savings of \$90 for an average 2 car household. Positive things are happening.

I look forward to 2025 with great anticipation because as your Mayor, I believe 2025 will be another year of strong growth for the Village of Mount Prospect. Your Village Board, the Village Manager Mike Cassady and his Leadership Team, and all of our dedicated Village staff will continue to work to move things in the right direction and to keep Mount Prospect a great place to live, work, raise a family, and simply enjoy life.

### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2024**

Below is a small sample of the more than 150 documented accomplishments which occurred in the Village in 2024. These accomplishments helped enhance citizen safety, improve our quality of life, rebuild our physical infrastructure, and add to the financial strength of our Village.

### Improving Citizen Safety/Our #1 Priority

- Increased the number of sworn Police Officers serving our Village by 3 to a total of 90 sworn Police Officers protecting our citizens.
- Activated a Special Response Team to focus on high profile criminal incidents.
- Put the Village's 4th ambulance in service at Station 11 in South Mount Prospect. This is in line with our plan for improving Emergency Services coverage and response times throughout the Village.
- Added 6 firefighter/paramedics in 2024 and after the addition of 3 more in 2025, there will be a total of 81 sworn firefighter/paramedics.
- The Four-Fire Station model now in place is already serving its intended purpose as evidenced by call-volumes and resources being more equitably distributed Village-wide.

### **Driving Economic Growth**

Completed the annexation of the remaining 224 acres of unincorporated properties in South Mount Prospect to the I-90 Expressway. With a few exceptions, all of the properties in South Mount Prospect are within the Village's corporate boundaries.

- Property tax revenues of those newly annexed properties now come to the Village and benefit all Mount Prospect taxpayers as well as create potential new development which will generate additional tax revenues.
- . Building continued in Downtown Mount Prospect at a strong pace, adding many new living units. New citizens have moved in and are helping to increase the overall vibrancy of our Downtown as evidenced by the new restaurants and retail establishments.

### Staying Ahead of our Aging Infrastructure

- Resurfaced over 9.0 miles of Village streets under the annual Village Street Resurfacing Program thus avoiding more costly street reconstruction.
- Lined 20,000 SF of sewers thus preventing costly open trench replacement. .
- . Created a funding program to replace private lead water services at no cost to Village residents to meet new EPA mandates starting in 2027.
- Connected to the Northwest Water Commission as a new backup to our primary water source using the American Rescue Plan Grant.

#### **Building Financial Strength, Spending Responsibly and Being Financially Prepared**

- Renovated Station 11 in South Mount Prospect which came into the Village as a result of the dissolution of Elk Grove Rural Fire District. Our highly skilled Public Works staff conducted the renovations rather than hiring an outside contractor. This saved our taxpayers over \$1.0 million.
- Created and funded an *Economic Emergency* Fund to prepare our Village for softer economic times in the future. This Emergency Fund can only be used for very specific reasons and only after approval of the Village Board.

### **KINDNESS AND BEST WISHES**

As I close my last Mayor's Message for 2024, I wanted to share a couple more thoughts around kindness and the upcoming Holiday Season.

Given my experience living in Mount Prospect for the past 42 years, it is my belief that the people of Mount Prospect are inherently kind and regularly perform acts of kindness for their fellow citizens. Helping people who cannot help themselves is always the right thing to do. We are all in this together, and all of us, at one time or another, will need the help of others. Pay it forward !!

If you are observant and if you celebrate your holidays at this time of the year, your Village Board wishes their very best to all for a fulfilling and safe 2025!

My Ask is that on New Year's Eve, first and foremost, lift a glass to your family and friends for a happy and healthy 2025 but also lift a glass to your fellow Mount Prospect citizens and to our incredible Village, the place we all call home.


