n September 29, the Mount Prospect Fire Department will celebrate its 100th Anniversary – commemorating a century of service to the community. While the Department's mission has remained mostly unaltered since its inception in 1913, the people, equipment and techniques used to serve Mount Prospect residents have changed dramatically over the years.

From humble beginnings—with nothing more than a small group of volunteers equipped with ladders, buckets and an antique hand pumper—the Department has grown to encompass state-of-the-art equipment, innovative training and new fire safety methods. Today, the Department has three stations, two engines, one truck, three ambulances and 88 total personnel. Yet, it is the Department's flexibility that will allow it to

continue to adapt and prepare to face the challenges the next 100 years will present.

A Centennial Gift for the Fire Department

On August 21, the residents of Centennial Apartments presented the Fire Department with a check for \$2,300. Centennial Apartments, subsidized housing for seniors, is owned by Urban Innovations. Two hundred and fifteen people reside in the two-building community.

Urban Innovations Resident Manager Darcy Nichols said that the tradition began about 14 years ago. "One resident was so impressed with how the paramedics treated her, she went door-to-door collecting donations."

They have continued it ever since. Residents offer anonymous donations and Urban Innovations matches the donation. The donation will be used to purchase paramedic equipment.

Recent Amendments To Illinois Election Code

House Bill 2418 "Omnibus Elections Bill" includes: **On-line voter registration**

Eligible Illinois residents can register to vote on-line.
Residents can still register to vote in person at Mount Prospect
Village Hall (50 S. Emerson Street) and the Mount Prospect Public
Library (10 S. Emerson Street) during normal business hours.

House Bill 226

17-year-olds to vote in Primary Elections – Effective January 1, 2014 Allows a 17-year-old the ability to vote during a primary election if he or she will be 18-years-old on the date of the immediately following general election.



Vehicle Stickers Required

The deadline for displaying the 2013-2014 vehicle stickers was April 30. The Police Department issues citations to drivers of locally registered vehicles if the 2013-2014 vehicle sticker is not displayed. Vehicle stickers purchased after April 30 are subject to a late payment penalty. The penalty does not apply to new

residents/businesses or to those

who have purchased replacement



vehicles after May 1. In these situations, there is a 30-day grace period in which to purchase a sticker. Proof of move-in or vehicle purchase date is required to ensure that a penalty is not imposed. If you change vehicles during the year, call the Finance Department at 847/392-6000 for more information.

Property Tax Relief Grant

The Board of Trustees has approved funds to provide 2013 Mount Prospect real estate tax relief for qualifying owners of single-family residences. This opportunity is available to households having a gross annual income equal to or less than: \$22,980 for one person; or \$31,020 for two or more people. The rebate is equal to 50 percent of the Village's portion of the total 2012 Cook County real estate tax bill. Residents should only apply after receiving and paying the 2nd installment of their 2012 tax bill.

Assistance in completing the application will be available at Village Hall, 50 S. Emerson Street in the Finance Department. The dates for assistance have not yet been determined. 

Got Drugs?

The Mount Prospect Police Department will be participating in the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration sponsored National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day, which will provide a venue to dispose of unwanted, unused or expired prescription medications – including



controlled substances. Additionally, the Mount Prospect Police Department will also be collecting used and unused needles/syringes for proper disposal.

Items can be dropped off at the Mount Prospect Public Safety Building (112 E. Northwest Hwy.) on Saturday, October 26, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. inside the main lobby. A uniformed police officer will be present to answer any questions.

Firearm Safety

Firearm accidents in the home can be prevented simply by making sure firearms are kept unloaded and safely stored, with ammunition secured in a separate location. The Police Department has a supply of FREE gun lock safety kits available to residents provided by Project ChildSafe. Lock Your Doors

The Police Department has received reports of suspicious subjects attempting to gain entry into homes by checking for unlocked doors. In the past, Mount Prospect Police have taken reports of residential burglaries where entry was gained to the home through an unlocked door or window.

Residents should lock their doors, not only when they are away from home, but also while at are home. The same goes for locking vehicles, even if they are stored in the garage. Report all suspicious activity immediately by calling 9-1-1.

Halloween Safety

Halloween will be here soon. Here are some helpful tips to keep all of our little vampires and princesses safe.

- Make sure kids only trick-or-treat during the suggested times of 3 p.m. and 8 p.m.
- Avoid dark colored costumes, they are much harder to see at night. If dark costumes are worn, make sure kids carry a flashlight, glow stick, or wear a reflective belt or vest to make sure they are seen.
- Avoid wearing masks as they restrict vision, use face paint instead.
- Make sure kids trick-or-treat in groups, and an adult should always tag along for extra safety.
- Trick-or-treaters should always cross at the crosswalks and never go between parked cars.



- A quick note to the drivers out there...
 make sure you drive a little bit slower in
 the residential areas and watch for those
 kids that forgot the last tip and run out
 from between parked cars.
- And finally, an adult should always check all candy.

Try to keep these tips in mind and it will help make this a safe and happy Halloween.

A LOOK AT THE PAST 100 YEARS



HUMBLE BEGINNINGS (1913 - 1939)

On September 29, 1913, community leaders met at the Central School to form the Mount Prospect Volunteer Fire Department. Their goal was to protect residents from the very real possibility of a destructive fire. Within the first year, the Department was equipped with six lanterns, eight buckets, an extension and a roof ladder and a hand pumper (purchased for \$60 from the Niles Centre Fire Department). Over the next two decades, the Department would purchase numerous pieces of equipment including: a bell, and later an electric siren, to notify the volunteers in the event of a fire, three fire trucks, first aid kits and smoke masks.

PROGRESS (1940 - 1959)

In the 1940s, the Village approved pay for firefighters and the Department constructed its first permanent building, which cost \$112,600. In the '50s, the Department purchased an American LaFrance Fromite fire engine for \$22,000 and responded to two plane crashes – the first a B-26 bomber that made an emergency landing in a Mount Prospect cornfield and the second a Navy jet that crashed near Weller Creek.

GROWING WITH THE COMMUNITY (1960 - 1979)

In 1961, the Mount Prospect Village Board voted to make the Department full-time but "supplemented by 'paid on call' (volunteer) firemen as needed." Within just a few short years, and to accommodate the full-time personnel, the Fire Department would add a second story to the downtown fire station and build a second station at Golf and Busse Roads. The Department also purchased its first ambulance and welcomed a mascot—a dalmatian named Smokey.

In the early 1970s, the Department grew again when the Village annexed land and took over the Forest River Fire Protection District, adding a third fire station. The '70s saw the start of the Fire Cadet Program and the paramedic program through Northwest Community Hospital. After serving as the beloved mascot, Smokey died in 1972. In February 1977, Goldblatt's department store caught fire, requiring the assistance of many neighboring departments. The Department's first full-time public education officer was also hired in the '70s, which led to the start of the annual Children's Fire Safety Festival in 1979.

EXPANDING RESPONSIBILITIES (1980 - PRESENT)


The 1980s and '90s saw the formation of specialized response/rescue teams, greater resource sharing with neighboring departments through the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) and the replacement of the downtown fire station, which opened in 1993. Following the attacks on 9/11 and disasters such as Hurricane Katrina, the Department further expanded its responsibilities into emergency management, helping to better prepare the Village and its residents for natural and manmade emergencies. Only time will tell what additional duties the future may hold for the Fire Department.

Change the Clocks, Change the Batteries

When residents change their clocks on November 3, they should remember to also change the batteries in their smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors!

According to the National Fire Protection Association, almost two-thirds of reported home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. Working smoke alarms provide a necessary early warning, especially when people are asleep. If a fire occurs, having a working smoke alarm reduces the risk of dying in a home fire by 50 percent. The leading causes of smoke alarm failure are missing, dead, or disconnected batteries.

The Mount Prospect Fire Department recommends the following guidelines for installing and maintaining smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors:

- Install new batteries at least twice a year and immediately if the alarm "chirps" warning of a low battery.
- Test smoke alarms every month.
- Choose a device that bears the label of a recognized testing UL laboratory.
- Install smoke alarms on every level of the home and outside all sleeping areas.
 Smoke alarms should also be installed in every room where people sleep.
- Replace smoke alarms every 10 years and carbon monoxide detectors every five years. An easy way to remember is to write the install date on the base of the device.

Residents who cannot afford a smoke alarm, or have physical limitations that would hinder them from installing or maintaining their smoke alarm, should contact the Mount Prospect Fire Prevention Bureau at 847/818-5253 for assistance.

Christmas Tree Safety

Christmas trees account for approximately 200 fires annually, resulting in 13 deaths, 27 injuries and more than \$16.7 million in property damage. Tree fires typically occur as a result of shorts in electrical lights, and/or open flames from candles. Well-watered trees are generally not a problem, however dry and neglected trees can cause issues.

To eliminate a potential fire hazard this holiday season, the Mount Prospect Fire Department recommends residents use an artificial Christmas tree. If residents elect not to use an artificial tree, then the purchase of a fresh cut tree will reduce the risk of fire. When checking for freshness, residents should look for:

- A tree is that is completely green.
- Needles that are difficult to pull from branches and do not break when bent between fingers (when the trunk is bounced on the ground a shower of needles should not occur).
- A trunk that is sticky with resin.

Once the tree is home, follow these guidelines to ensure a safe holiday season:

- Place the trunk in a bucket of water to maintain freshness until they are ready to bring it inside.
- Cut off about two inches of the trunk before bringing it indoors, then mount it in a sturdy stand with wide spread legs. Use thin wire or fishing line to fasten large trees to walls or the ceiling to prevent the tree from toppling over.
- Place the tree at least three feet from fireplaces, radiators or other heat sources.
- •. Treat the tree like it is fresh flowers, making sure the water cup is filled at all times. Heated rooms tend to rapidly dry out trees, creating fire hazards.
- Do not rely on chemical coatings or sprays to flameproof trees.
- Never put lit candles on a tree.
- When decorating, make sure all electrical light cords are not frayed or split. Test lights before putting them on the tree.

Fire Prevention Week: October 6 - 12

The Mount Prospect Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) for Fire Prevention Week 2013, October 6 - 12, urging residents to "Prevent Kitchen Fires." This year's theme focuses on spreading the word that more fires start in the kitchen than in any other part of the home.

Each year, over 2,500 people die as a result of home fires and, according to NFPA, unattended cooking is the leading cause of house fires. Two out of every five home fires begin in the kitchen – and cooking fires are the leading cause of home fire-related injuries. Residents are reminded to never leave cooking unattended, to keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove and to clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops after each use.

In conjunction with Fire Prevention Week, the Mount Prospect Fire Department will once again be conducting its Annual Poster/Essay Contest for students in Kindergarten through 8th grade. All Mount Prospect schools have been given the guidelines for the contest and we encourage each student to participate in this educational activity. Mount Prospect to Host a Document Destruction Event

The Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) sponsors Document Destruction Events (DDE) to assist residents with recycling out-dated or sensitive documents. There is no cost to participate, but residents must live in one of SWANCC's member communities and ID's will be checked for proof of residency.

On Saturday, September 28, the Village of Mount Prospect will host a DDE at its Public Works Facility, 1700 W. Central Rd., from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

Typical documents to shred include medical forms, bank statements, personal files and retired tax forms. Staples and paper clips are acceptable, but binders should be removed. Residents will be limited to six file-size boxes or paper shopping bags per vehicle. Do not bring paper in plastic bags. At the end of the event, the shredded documents are transported to Groot's recycling facility in Elk Grove Village and baled before being recycled into new paper.



Fall Leaf Collection Program

The Village's fall leaf collection program provides residents with two methods to conveniently dispose of leaves at no cost. The program allows residents to set out loose leaves at the curb for collection by Public Works crews from October 7 - November 22. Additionally, bagged leaves will be collected from November 25 through December 13.

Loose Leaf Collection

The loose-leaf collection program is for LEAVES ONLY and will take place from October 7 - November 22. Any leaf pile containing grass clippings or other yard material will NOT BE COLLECTED.

- It is the responsibility of the homeowner to remove the unacceptable materials from the leaves for collection.
- Rake leaves onto the pavement one foot from the curb line one day prior to the scheduled collection day.
- Do not rake leaves into the street after the truck has passed. The machines travel each street weekly during the collection period, but only once on each side.

Bagged leaf collection

ARC Disposal will conduct the extended leaf collection program for bagged leaves on each resident's regularly scheduled refuse collection day from November 25 - December 13.

- Biodegradable compost bags containing leaves only will be collected without the Village imprinted sticker.
- All other yard material and/or leaves in rigid containers must have the Villageimprinted sticker affixed to pay for collection and disposal of the yard material. Bags and/or containers must not exceed 50 lb. Rigid containers must also have the yard waste decal affixed.

Yard waste and brush collection ends
December 13. Please make sure to place
all properly prepared yard waste and brush
at the curb prior to December 13. Yard
waste or brush placed at the curb after
December 13 will not be collected. Please




January 6 - 17, 2014

Residents are encouraged to participate in the Village's Christmas tree composting program. Christmas trees will be collected by the refuse hauler at no additional cost on residents' regular refuse collection day; no stickers required.

Christmas trees set out for composting must be free of all decorative debris such as:

- Lights
- Tinsel
- Ornaments/bulbs
- Strings/wires.



Caring for Your Vehicle and the Environment



Proper car care and maintenance is a very important part of efforts to protect the local environment. Many vehicle fluids can be hazardous to waterways. Whatever is dumped into storm drains or onto pavement will wind up in local creeks and, ultimately, in the Des Plaines River.

If you change your own oil, it is very important that it is disposed of properly. Put the used oil in a sturdy container, label it, and take it to a local oil recycling location. Call Public Works at 847/870-5640 for a current list of oil recycling stations.

Antifreeze is also dangerous to the environment. It contains ingredients that are poisonous to people, fish, and wildlife. It should be treated in the same manner as waste oil. In the case of a spill involving any of these types

of materials, use kitty litter, sawdust, cornmeal, or special oil absorbent products to absorb the spill. Sweep up the absorbent after a few hours. No Parking Reminder

There is no parking on Village streets between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. at any time of the year. There is no parking permitted on any Village street at any time within a 24-hour period of a snowfall of two inches (2") or more (Ordinance 2963). This ordinance cancels any overnight parking permission that previously may have been granted. The Village will tow parked vehicles not removed in time by their owner. Cost of the towing will be borne by the vehicle owners.

It is each vehicle owner's responsibility to monitor the weather conditions and to avoid problems if a snowfall of two-inches or greater occurs anytime. For more information about permission to park overnight on Village streets, call the Police Department at 847/870-5656.

Street Plowing Procedures

Since all streets cannot be plowed at the same time after a snowfall, there is a priority system.

- Principal intersections are plowed and salted first.
- Primary collector streets are then plowed enough to allow two-way traffic to pass safely. Cul-de-sacs are plowed after a 2-inch accumulation of snow.
- Feeder streets and dead ends are plowed last.

When all roads have been opened, repeat passes will be made to clear them curb-to-curb, and intersections also will be cleared completely.

Remember, it is hazardous and illegal to shovel or blow snow into any public street once the street has been plowed. All shoveled or blown snow should be piled in residents' yards or parkways. Shovel the snow to the side, in the direction of traffic, and clear a pocket for snow on the opposite side of your driveway. The accumulated snow in the plow will dump into the pocket and NOT into a resident's driveway.
