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NEWS & NOTES

Better Electric Rates Available

ComEd has recently released the electric rate effective over the next 12 months which is LOWER than the aggregation rate the Village has through its contract with DYNEGY (formerly HomeField Energy). The current aggregation rate through the Village contract is 7.935¢ per kilowatt hour (kWh) through August 2016 and a rate of 7.499¢ per kWh between August 2016 and August 2017. The ComEd rate will fluctuate between 6.63¢ and 7.63¢ per kWh depending on the Purchased Energy Adjustment amount. Based on the ComEd published rates, residents know the maximum rate they could ever pay is the Village rate. The aggregation program has saved residents an average of \$325 per resident prior to the latest aggregation contract renewal.

However, residents are ENCOURAGED to consider other electric supply options since there are rates LOWER than the Village rate; ComEd is available as the default provider if the residents are so inclined to move back to ComEd. Residents may also explore other providers by checking on rates through pluginillinois.org or change to ComEd by calling 1-800-334-7661. There is NO penalty for leaving the Village's aggregation program. Residents may also call the Village's energy consultant NIMEC at 1-800-727-3820 for additional information.

Submit Water Meter Reading on the Web

For residents whose water meters have not yet been upgraded to an automatic meter reader, the Village continues to provide several options for those serviced by Village water to submit their water meter reads. In addition to submitting a water meter reading on the bill payment stub, residents may submit readings by phone, fax, and e-mail or electronically via the website, www.mountprospect.org/watermeter. Residents who have already received upgraded automatic meter readers are no longer required to submit readings. For any questions, please call Utility Billing at 847/392-6000.

Pay Village Utility Bills Online or through Direct Debit

The Village offers several different payment options for residents to pay for their Water/Sewer and/or Refuse utility bill. In addition to coming into Village Hall or mailing in payment, residents can opt to pay online through the Village's website, mountprospect.org, or by using direct debit (through their checking account).


The online payment option is an easy-to-use process that allows residents to pay utility bills using a credit or debit card. Online payment is secure, available 24 hours a day for convenience and is provided at no charge to residents. For direct debit, funds for payment of a utility account will be withdrawn on the due date, thus avoiding late fees. Authorization forms are available on the Village's

website. Utility customers may elect to end participation in the direct debit program at any time after the last billed debit has occurred. For any questions concerning either of these two programs, please contact Utility Billing at 847/392-6000.



Did You Purchase A Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for displaying 2015-2016 vehicle stickers was April 30, 2015. As of May 1, the Police Department could issue citations to owners of locally registered vehicles who are not displaying the 2015-2016 vehicle stickers in their vehicles. If a resident received a Police Department citation for not having the current period sticker, one may have to pay a fine, the basic cost of the new sticker, and the late purchase penalty. The penalty will not initially apply to



new Village residents or to residents who have purchased replacement vehicles after May 1. In these limited cases, residents have 30 days to purchase a sticker. During the grace period, proof of purchase or move-in date will be required to assure that a penalty is not imposed. If a resident changes vehicles during the year, a transfer is required. Expect Delays Along Rand Road (U.S. Route 12) Through Mid-August 2015



The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) announced that lane reductions and closures will occur along U.S. Route 12 (Rand Road) in Mount Prospect, Arlington Heights, and Des Plaines for a resurfacing project that began on Monday, May 4. In order to complete the work, there will be daily lane closures during the

daytime hours between Arlington Heights Road and Golf Road. The project along this six-mile stretch of road is planned to be completed by August 15.

Motorists can expect delays and should allow extra time for trips through this area. Drivers are urged to pay close attention to flaggers and signs in the work zones, obey the posted speed limits and be on the alert for workers and equipment.

Four New Restaurants Set to Open at Randhurst Village in 2015!

Four more restaurants are set to join the dining line-up at Randhurst Village this summer, expanding the already robust options at the center.

Truco Taqueria Margarita Bar opened in May adjacent to the AMC Theatres. Truco offers a variety of fresh Mexican fare and hand-crafted margaritas and will feature an outdoor dining café.

Smokey Bones is set to open in July across the street from the AMC Theatres. Smokey Bones is a fire-grill restaurant with a full service bar. They have two in-house smokers and offer a wide variety of barbeque fare including chicken, pork and steak entrees. They currently have 65 locations nationwide and their Randhurst Village location will be the first in the Chicagoland area.

Outback Steakhouse is constructing a new restaurant on the former Border Books' outlot and is expected to open for business this fall. Outback Steakhouse is an Australian-themed steakhouse restaurant. Although beef and steak items make up a good portion of the menu, the concept offers a variety of chicken, ribs, seafood, and pasta dishes.

Papa Saverio's Pizzeria will be occupying the former Tony Sacco's restaurant location and expects to open in late fall. Papa Saverio's Pizzeria features a wide variety of pizzas, pasta, salads and Italian sandwiches.

Downtown Dining Options to Expand

Trezeros Kitchen and Tap is planning a Labor Day grand opening in the former Jake's Pizza location on Northwest Highway. Trezeros will be an Italian/American casual dining restaurant that will offer steaks, seafood and pasta. They will also feature a brick oven on premises to prepare a variety of specialty pizzas and will have a full service lounge with local craft beers and upscale tap wines. The new owners, Julie and Pasquale Ergastolo, are Mount Prospect residents with years of restaurant experience including their current Club Casa Café and former Casa Royale Banquets in Des Plaines.

Tokens & Tankards (T & T) is a unique gastropub concept that is set to open in the former Ye Olde Town Inn space on Busse Avenue later this summer. T & T will feature a nostalgic atmosphere with an expansive menu of local craft beer, cider and food options, alongside a selection of vintage, coin-operated video and pinball games. Most of the 20-plus rotating handles of beer will be from brewers within 20 miles of Chicago. That coincides with the local theme that extends to the arcade cabinets. T & T wants to exclusively feature locally-made games, such as those made by Midway Games, based in Chicago, who created *Pac-Man* and *Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles*.



Enroll Now for 2015 Citizens Police Academy

The Mount Prospect Police Department is accepting applications for the 2015 Citizens Police Academy. The Academy is open to any Village resident or Village employee, at least 18 years of age and free of any criminal history.

The Citizens Police Academy will begin on Wednesday, September 9, 2015, from 6:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. and will continue for eleven (11) consecutive Wednesday evenings through November 18, 2015. Classes will be held at the Mount Prospect Police Department and various locations throughout the Village. The Academy will allow citizens to get a firsthand look at Police



operations and give them the opportunity to experience Police work from the officer's point of view. Topics covered in the Academy will include traffic enforcement, crime scene processing, field training, and criminal law. Academy students will also be allowed to make simulated traffic stops and arrests. The highlight of the Academy is the evening where students get to use the Department's pistol range.

Community Outreach Nursing

The public health nurse provides nursing care, under the order of a physician, to homebound residents, regardless of age. This care is provided at no charge to residents who do not have the services paid for by Medicare or private insurance. The nurse also provides additional medical care that is necessary in order for the patient to remain at home. The public health nurse also conducts screening clinics open to the public several times a month and private consultations in the nursing office regarding medical concerns.

Senior Walking Club

It is that time of year again - time to get out and get walking! The Village nurse and nurses from the Mount Prospect Medical Reserve Corps will once again monitor and walk with Mount Prospect seniors weekly in the park that runs along Centennial Drive behind the Mount Prospect Plaza. The Senior Walking Club takes place from May through October. Seniors are welcome to bring walkers and canes – no one is turned away. Wear comfortable gym shoes. Cholesterol/Lipid Profile Testing

Are you trying to control your cholesterol through diet and exercise rather than medication? Has your doctor recently switched your cholesterol medication and you're not sure if it is working? Does insurance only pay for one cholesterol/lipid profile test a year? Are you confused by "good" cholesterol and "bad" cholesterol and what the numbers mean?

If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, you may want to have a lipid profile test done at Village Hall the second Thursday of each month in the morning (by appointment). Patients must fast 10 hours prior to the appointment. Testing is open to all adults in the community and the cost is \$20, which includes a fasting blood sugar test as well. Testing is done by the public health nurse and includes post-testing education and instructional materials.

Prothrombin Time (PT/INR) Finger-stick Blood Testing Clinic

The Village nurse offers PT/INR finger-stick blood tests at the Human Services Department on Thursdays by appointment from 11 a.m. to noon. Residents who wish to use this service must obtain written orders for testing from their physician. The cost of the test is \$7 payable by check at the time of service. The Village nurse will call or fax results to the ordering physician the same day the test is done. The resident's physician is responsible for contacting the resident with any changes to their Coumadin dose and advising when the next test should be scheduled. Please call Human Services at 847/870-5680 for an appointment.

Leave the Fireworks to the Professionals!

The Mount Prospect Fire Department wishes all a safe Fourth-of-July celebration. Remember: due to the hazards and injuries associated with fireworks, the Village of Mount Prospect prohibits all types of fireworks, including sparklers.

Each Fourth-of-July holiday, thousands of people, mostly children, are seriously injured in fireworks-related incidents, about one-third resulting in permanent eye damage. Children and teenagers experience 44 percent of these injuries; sparklers accounted for one-third of the injuries to children under five. Sparklers reach temperatures of up to 1800°F and remain hot enough to cause serious burns even after they are extinguished.

Fireworks are especially dangerous for children because they entice them to play with matches. Leave the fireworks to the professionals and enjoy the professional fireworks display at Melas Park at the Annual Mt. Prospect Lions Club Festival (check insert in this Newsletter for dates and times).

What to Do With Your Refrigerated or Frozen Food When the Power Goes Out



Keep the refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible to maintain the cold temperature. The refrigerator will keep food cold for about four hours if it is unopened. A fully-stocked freezer will keep food frozen two days if the door remains closed. A half-full freezer can keep foods frozen about one day.

What can residents do if electric service will not be restored within one or two days?

- If friends and/or family have electricity, divide frozen foods among their freezers.
- Know where to buy dry and block ice. Dry ice freezes everything it touches; 50 pounds of it will keep an 18

cubic foot freezer below freezing for two days. When using dry ice, never touch dry ice with bare hands and do not stick your head into a freezer with dry ice as it gives off carbon dioxide. Add block ice to the refrigerator if the electricity is off longer than four to six hours.

• In order to eat refrigerated or frozen meat, poultry, fish or eggs while it is still at safe temperatures, it is important that each item is thoroughly cooked to its proper temperature to destroy any foodborne bacteria that may be present. However, if at any point the food was above 40° F for two hours or more – discard it.

Keep in mind: perishable food such as meat, poultry, seafood, milk and eggs that are not kept adequately refrigerated or frozen may cause illness if consumed, even when they are thoroughly cooked.

"Storm-chaser" Season has Arrived

Spring and summer can bring storms that damage homes and "chasing" those storms are contractors who use various techniques to gain the confidence of homeowners. In general, consumers should beware when a home repair contractor:

- contacts a homeowner directly or comes to their home uninvited (door-to-door visits offering home repair)
- insists that repairs need to be made immediately or the homeowner's safety may be in danger
- pressures the homeowner to sign papers today or talks too quickly, attempting to confuse them
- quotes a price that's out-of-line with other estimates
- offers to drive a homeowner to his/her bank to withdraw funds to pay for the contractor
- can be reached only by leaving messages with an answering service
- drives an unmarked vehicle or has out-of-state license plates
- asks to be paid for the entire job up-front.

Downtown Wayfinding Signage Program Underway

The Village's Downtown Implementation Plan calls for a Wayfinding Signage Program to be incorporated throughout downtown. Wayfinding signage is intended to direct both visitors and residents to nearby points of interest while creating a unique sense of place. In the first phase of starting the Program, the Village selected Media Objectives as the consultant to complete a Wayfinding Signage Plan. Using analysis of the current conditions, along with feedback from the Wayfinding Signage Steering Committee, the consultant is creating a wayfinding sign package. Specific sign locations, unified design, and sign content will be finalized in the summer of 2015. Designed to be informative and aesthetically pleasing, the Wayfinding Signage Program aims to make visiting downtown more enjoyable and convenient. Finding a Contractor

A homeowner should find out as much as possible about a contractor before hiring him or her. One can do this by calling the Illinois Attorney General and the Better Business Bureau. Get written estimates from several firms—but do not automatically choose the lowest bidder. Ask the contractor if subcontractors will be used on the project. If "yes," ask to meet them, and make sure they have current insurance coverage and licenses. Also ask them if this contractor has paid them on-time in the past.

Thank You for Your Input

Late last summer, the Village posted an online Community Survey on the Village website and also distributed hard copies around town. Village staff received 254 responses along with pages of additional comments, which are included in the Consolidated Plan as attachments. Thank you for your input!

The Community Survey was one piece of the citizen participation that the Village used to formulate a five-year Consolidated Plan, which is a requirement from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as Mount Prospect receives an annual allocation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding. Crack Sealing - Why?

Each year, Public Works gets numerous calls about our crack-sealing program. Public Works will be sealing cracks again this summer and the most often asked question is: "Why?" Crack sealing is done to prevent moisture from getting under our new pavement and ruining the base, thereby increasing the rate of road deterioration.

Another question asked is: "Why are we not given advanced notice?" The entire process is usually done in less an hour; the number of streets that can be done each day depends on the number of cracks. Since it is impossible to tell how many streets can be done each day, it would be difficult to guess which day crews would get to a specific block.

Streets are usually crack sealed five years after resurfacing or reconstruction to minimize and prevent further cracking.

Crack sealing is a messy job. Before applying the sealant, workers must make certain that any loose dirt or debris is removed from the crack. This is usually accomplished by blowing the debris out of the crack with an air compressor. Once the cracks are filled, it only takes an hour for the filler to set so vehicles can drive upon it. Public Works prefers to give the sealer an additional 24 hours to bond before sweeping it to avoid pulling the newly applied material out of the crack. This process can sometimes leave streets looking messy for two to three days. Please be patient. The street sweeper will return to clean one's street. Make your Home the Solution to Stormwater Pollution

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants. Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system or directly into a lake, stream, river, or wetland. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged, untreated, into bodies of water used for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water.

By practicing healthy household habits, homeowners can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground and out of the stormwater. Listed below are ten tips homeowners can adopt to improve the quality of stormwater runoff:

- Cover piles of soil, sand or mulch to stop them from being transported in stormwater. Plant grass where soil is exposed.
- Sweep your sidewalks and driveways rather than hosing them down.
- Put leaves and grass clippings in the compost, on the garden as mulch or mow back into the lawn to recycle nutrients.
- Divert roof water to lawns or gardens where it can safely soak in.
- Keep pesticides, oil, leaves and other pollutants off streets and out of storm drains.
- Keep cars tuned up and repair leaks.
- Wash your vehicle on grass or over gravel. Use as little detergent as possible and pour any leftover soapy water onto the lawn.
- Dispose of household hazardous waste according to the label directions.
- Clean up pet waste, bury it or flush it down the toilet.
- Never dump anything down storm drains! Water from these drains flows untreated into the river.

Public Works Offers Electronic Recycling Drop-off

Since 1999, the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) has provided electronics recycling programs for residentially-generated materials. In total, over six million pounds of electronics have been collected for recycling.

Materials accepted at permanent drop-offs and oneday events include: Answering Machines, Cable Receivers, Calculators, Camcorders, Cameras, CD and DVD Players, Computer Cables, Computer Monitors, Computers (Desktop, Notebook, Tablet), Converter Boxes, Copy Machines, Fax Machines, Humidifiers, Microwaves, Mobile Telephones, Mice or Keyboards, MP3 Players, Portable Digital Assistants (PDAs), Postage Machines, Power Tools and Cords, Printers (Multifunction Printers), Satellite Receivers, Scanners, Shredders, Small Home Appliances (Toasters, Blenders, Vacuum Cleaners, Mini Refrigerators, etc.), Stereo Equipment, Telephones, Televisions, Typewriters, Video Game Consoles, Video Recorders/Players and Zip Drives.

DO NOT Bring: Dehumidifiers, Refrigerators, Air Conditioners and other large appliances. Materials from businesses, schools or institutions will NOT be accepted.

FLOOD PREPAREDNESS AND PROTECTION

Local Flood Hazard

Five waterways carry stormwater into, through and away from the Village: the Des Plaines River, McDonald Creek, Feehanville Ditch, Weller Creek and Higgins Creek. Flood hazard areas are associated with each waterway. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has prepared a map that illustrates the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA). The Village's Engineering staff will help locate your property on the map and provide other basic Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) information. This information is especially useful for lenders, insurance agents, house hunters, real estate agents, and interested citizens. The most recent flooding event occurred in April of 2013 when almost every neighborhood of the Village experienced flooding.

Flood Preparedness

Floods always occur at the most inconvenient times and with very little warning. However, there are many things that one can do to prepare for a flood, such as:

- Prepare a list of emergency phone numbers that can be easily accessed during a flood event. Keep backup records at another location.
- Keep an inventory of one's personal property that can be used to identify what has been damaged and lost during a flood. Photographs or a video recording of each room can be helpful.
- Keep photographs of valuable items such as insurance policies, vehicle titles, deeds, bank and credit card account information, wills and important telephone numbers in a location away from your home such as a safe deposit box.
- Keep cleaning supplies on hand that will be needed to recover from a flood.

Flood Safety

If a basement or building has flooded, remember these precautionary steps:

- Turn off all utilities at the main power switch and close the main gas valve if evacuation appears necessary.
- Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage rather than candles or lanterns.
- Do not touch any electrical equipment unless it is in a dry area and you are standing on a piece of dry wood while wearing rubber gloves and rubber-sole boots or shoes.
- Be careful after a flood because the floors are often covered with debris and mud which can lead to slipping.
- Flood water is often contaminated and can cause severe health threats, so clean everything that got wet.

Flood-proofing

There are many methods that have been successful to protect a building from flood damage. These measures to alter your building to eliminate or reduce flood damages, called retrofitting, include:

- **Elevation:** This involves raising the house so that the lowest floor is above the flood protection level.
- **Relocation:** Moving a building out of the flood area is the surest way of protection.
- **Floodwalls:** Work to keep water from reaching a home by constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and the flood water.
- **Dry Flood-proofing:** Makes the building walls and floor watertight so water does not enter.
- Wet Flood-proofing: Modifies the structure and relocates the contents so that when flood water enters the building there is little or no damage.

Flood Protection

If a property is susceptible to flooding, here are some things one can do to reduce damages:

- Regrading the lot or constructing a small earthen berm may help to keep water away from the building.
- Watertight closures over doorways and windows can prevent flood waters from entering through the doorways during a flood event. This method is not recommended for houses with basements, or if water will get over two feet deep.
- Furnaces, air conditioners, water heaters and major appliances can be elevated on platforms or moved to higher floors.
- Temporary measures like sandbagging may prevent flood water from entering a building.
- Many houses, even those not in the floodplain, have sewers that back up into the basement during heavy rains. A plug or standpipe can stop this if the water does not get more than one or two feet deep. They can be purchased at a hardware store for approximately \$25. For deeper sewer backup flooding, talk to a plumber about overhead sewers or backup valves.

Drainage System Maintenance

Any debris that is deposited into any part of the drainage system can have a serious impact on flooding, and is against Village Code. Dumping materials such as grass clippings, branches, garbage and other unwanted material into creeks and ditches can decrease

the ability of the drainage system to carry water away from properties. Contact the Public Works Department at 847/870-5640 or publicworksdept@mountprospect.org if you see any debris that may potentially cause flooding problems.

Flood Insurance

Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover losses due to flooding. However, since the Village is a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), flood insurance is available to all property owners or renters in the Village. Coverage can be obtained on the building as well as on the contents. Contact an insurance agent to find out more about flood insurance. Also, since the Village participates in the CRS Program, property owners are eligible for up to a 15% discount on the flood insurance premiums. Please take note that there is a 30-day waiting period after the purchase of flood insurance before it goes into effect. Some insurance companies offer sewer backup and sump pump failure insurance that can be added onto a homeowner's insurance policy.

Floodplain Development Permit

The Village of Mount Prospect has adopted Floodplain Regulations (Chapter 22 of the Village Code). The Regulations help to minimize the potential losses due to periodic flooding. All construction activity within a floodplain requires a Floodplain Development Permit.

More Information

For any flooding or drainage concerns or any additional information, just by the Public Works Department (1700 W. Central Road) or call 847/870-5640 (TDD: 847/392-1235) and ask for the Engineering Division. The Engineering staff will freely assist homeowners with identifying possible ways to reduce the risk of property flooding. FEMA has a website that can also provide additional information: fema.gov.

Important note: Always check with the Mount Prospect Building Division before you build on, fill, alter or regrade your property or make building alterations. A permit is needed to ensure that all projects comply with our Village Code and does not create drainage problems on any other property.

Hydrant Flushing-Changes to the Program

In previous years, Public Works staff would flush all Village-owned hydrants over a fourday period in the spring. While this method was efficient at achieving the desired result of flushing debris and sediment from the system, the method did not allow enough time for staff to conduct water quality tests and tests on hydrant performance. Starting this summer, hydrant flushing will transition to a four year cycle that will be conducted during normal working hours over the course of several weeks. The change will still allow for debris and sediment to be flushed from the system, but will also allow enough time for staff to conduct necessary tests to ensure that residents are receiving the best quality water.

The orange section, as noted on the above map, will be the first section to be completed. Public Works staff is expected to start the flushing process in mid-July to early-August. The entire process is expected to take four-to-six weeks. Village crews will be placing notice signs at the entrance points to the neighborhood being flushed. After the hydrants in your neighborhood have been flushed, please check your tap water before using it for cooking, drinking or laundry as some rust or other stain-producing particles may remain. These stain-producing particles remain only briefly in the water, giving your water a slightly rusty tinge. Though the rusty-looking water may be upsetting, the water is safe to drink. The rusty tinge should disappear within a few minutes if you leave the tap on. Be careful as these particles may stain your laundry. Water Your Traps

The traps in floor drains, or for that matter any drains, that have not been used often will eventually dry out. This may sound harmless enough, but a dry trap can cause a room to fill with sewer gas from the Village's sewer system. Traps need to have a layer of water sitting in the lower portion to prevent sewer gases from entering one's home. One can eliminate these problems with a little fresh water topped with cooking oil. The oil floats on top of the water and seals it against evaporation.

Lawn Irrigation Sprinklers

As the weather gets warmer, residents will be landscaping their properties and restarting their lawn irrigation systems. The Illinois Plumbing Code requires that all lawn irrigation sprinklers protect the public through the use of properly installed cross connection control devices. These cross connection control devices, commonly referred to as backflow preventers or RPZ's, must be tested and certified each year by a licensed plumber certified by the State as a cross connection control device inspector. The Public Works Department monitors the annual certification of these devices and requires that a copy of the certification test results be provided to Public Works, along with a \$10 administrative fee per device. Watering Restrictions

As part of the Lake Michigan water allocation program, water suppliers are required to restrict outdoor water use. Restrictions are in place to ensure that there is a continuous adequate water supply for drinking, bathing and fire protection. Water conservation measures are an important first step in protecting our water supply. It shall be unlawful for any person to use or any owner to allow the use of any water, whether drawn directly or indirectly from public wells and/or public water supply distribution systems, for the purpose of watering and/or sprinkling lawns and/or gardens or for the purpose of filling and/or refilling swimming pools, outside washing, or other exterior uses, except as provided herein below:

- Watering and/or sprinkling shall be permitted for odd numbered addresses on odd numbered dates and for even numbered addresses on even numbered dates. All such watering and/or sprinkling shall be accomplished only between the hours of 4 p.m. to 10 a.m.
- Newly-sodded areas of lawns may be watered at any time on any day for the two (2) week period
 following the installation of such sod.

These rules are in effect seven (7) days a week. For questions, call Public Works at 847/870-5640.

Village Continues Reforestation Efforts

The Village is progressing with reforestation efforts in the wake of Emerald Ash Borer (EAB), and trying to replace every ash tree lost due to EAB. These efforts, budget permitting, will continue into the fall, and residents who have lost a parkway ash tree should expect to receive notification explaining the replacement. The Village will continue replacing ash trees, at suitable planting sites, in the order that they were removed. In some cases, replacement trees will not be available until the following year.

Additionally, residents who have not lost an ash tree, or would like to choose their replacement tree, can take advantage of the Village's full cost planting program. Property owners with suitable planting sites can order a 2 ½" diameter parkway tree by bearing the full cost of planting. These trees will still be hand-selected by Village staff at an Illinois nursery and planted/guaranteed for one year by a landscape contractor. Seven or eight species will be offered, ranging in cost from about \$250 to \$350 per tree. All orders and payment for fall planting must be received at Public Works no later than August 7, 2015.

Property owners can also beautify Village parkways by planting a tree on their own, with an approved Village permit. Planting permits are available through Public Works at no cost. All Village code requirements must be met, including having a suitable planting site and choosing an approved species.
