The Village of Mount Prospect has completed an overhaul of its municipal website and the Experience Mount Prospect website. This project has been nearly two years in the making and brings cutting edge features to the residents of Mount Prospect.

The functionality of the website has become more user friendly. Mega menus facilitate the user's ability to find what they are looking for under the six main headings. The seven call to action buttons on the side of the home page allow residents to access the most frequently accessed features of the website.

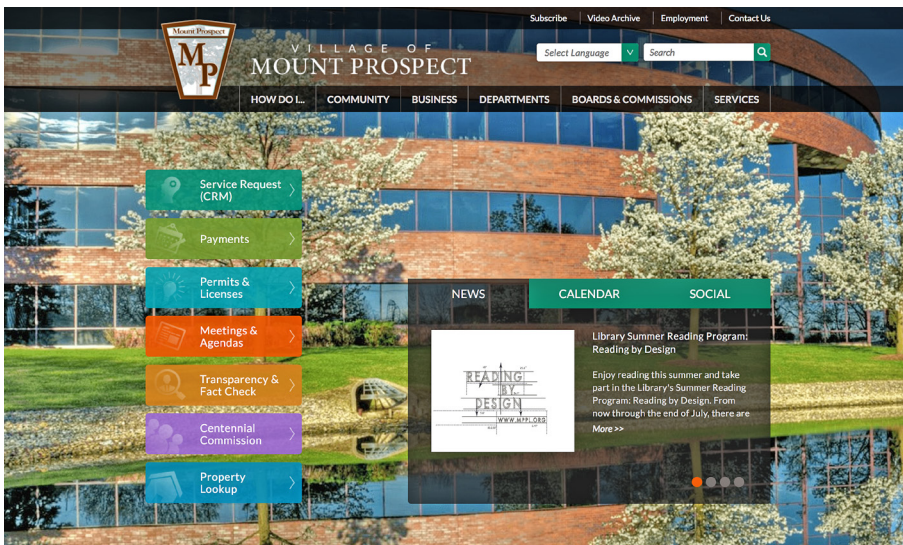
"A lot of thought has gone into the functionality of the website and we have made it much more intuitive than before," said Howard Kleinstein, Director of Communications. Residents will be able to find most of what they are looking for under the **How Do I** tab, a clearing house of the most important links to information residents are looking for.

A new feature of the website is the News/Calendar/Social Media feature placed in a box in the center of the home page. The **News** tab gives residents access to the latest news stories the Village has relayed to the public. The **Calendar** tab

is broken down into two sub tabs. **Events** and **Meetings**. Users can click on the Event or Meeting tab and see the next four upcoming events. There is also an interactive calendar that will show events when hovering above a date. Lastly the **Social Media** tab allows residents to see the latest feeds from the Village's Facebook, Twitter and YouTube. The user does not need to have a Facebook or Twitter account to click on and view the postings.

The **Service Request** or CRM call-to-action button is prominently displayed as the top button along the side of the screen. The CRM is the official customer service and civic engagement tool to connect with the Village of Mount Prospect. The CRM makes it easy for anyone to report a concern. Your service request is routed to the appropriate Village department for immediate action, allowing the Village to respond quickly and efficiently.

The Experience Mount Prospect sub-website has also been improved with many new features. The Experience Mount Prospect site is the Village of Mount Prospect's Official Entertainment, Shopping & Dining Resource. It can be accessed at [experiencemountprospect.org](http://experiencemountprospect.org) or you can click on the Experience Mount Prospect logo at the bottom of the main website.

## News

### Municipal Electricity Aggregation Program to End in August

Since 2012, the Village has managed an Electricity Aggregation program which has enabled us to negotiate electric rates for residents' homes and small businesses by aggregating the community's electricity usage. The average single family home who stayed with the program in its entirety would have realized \$135 in savings.

In the fall of 2014 the Village began to encourage participating accounts to switch back to ComEd or find an alternative electricity supplier as electricity rates fell below the electricity aggregation program rate.

The Village recently sought bids to renew the Municipal Electricity Aggregation Program expiring in August. However, bids received were not low enough to guarantee savings compared to the projected ComEd rate, so the Village is in the process of suspending the Electricity Aggregation Program. All residential and small business accounts currently in the program will automatically be returned to ComEd following meter readings in September. No action is needed on your part to revert back to ComEd.

All residential and small business accounts currently in the program will receive a letter from ComEd in July titled *Electric Supplier Choice – Confirmation of Drop* informing you that your account will switch back to ComEd. Again, no action is needed on your part.

No one from the Village or the Village's aggregation supplier will contact you by phone or in person. All communication about the Village's program will be communicated through the mail. Should you receive a solicitation from someone claiming to be associated with the Village or the Village's supplier, report the solicitor to the Illinois Commerce Commission at [www.icc.illinois.gov/complaints](http://www.icc.illinois.gov/complaints) or (800-524-0795) and inform the Village.

You are free to select an alternate supplier. Visit [www.PluginIllinois.org](http://www.PluginIllinois.org) to find a listing of offers from other suppliers. We suggest that when considering any solicitation or offer, you should avoid variable rates, early termination fees and additional monthly fees. It is recommended that you not share your ComEd account number with any entity, unless you have decided to move your account to that supplier.

## Did You Purchase a Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for displaying 2017-2018 vehicle stickers was April 30. The Police Department may issue citations to owners of locally registered vehicles who do not display the 2017-2018 stickers. If you are an established resident who purchased a new car after April 30, or a new resident who moved into the Village after that date, you have 30 days to purchase a sticker at Village Hall. Residents who change vehicles after having purchased a 2017-2018 vehicle sticker should contact the Finance Department at 847.392.6000 with updated vehicle information to determine eligibility for transference of the sticker from one vehicle to another for no additional fee. ## Garage Sales

The Village Board recently amended the Village Code to eliminate the permit requirement for garage sales. However, the following regulations still apply:

- Each homeowner may have up to 3 sales annually.
- In the event of rain occurring during the hours of sale on any day within a 3 day sale period, the sale period shall be extended an additional day for each day of rain; however, no garage sale shall exceed a total of 3 dry days.
- A minimum of 30 days between each sale is required.

All violations will be handled by code enforcement, which may include notices and adjudication appearances for offenses.

## Managing Your Village Water/Sewer/Refuse Bills

The Village offers an option to view your bill online and several easy-to-use payment options for water, sewer and refuse bills.

You can view bills or pay online with a credit or debit card through the Village website at [mountprospect.org/OnlineUtilityBill](http://mountprospect.org/OnlineUtilityBill). No service fees apply with the online options. Online payment is secure and available 24 hours/day.

You may also set up a direct debit payment to allow funds to be automatically withdrawn from your account on the date that payment is due. Authorization forms can be found at [mountprospect.org](http://mountprospect.org). Customers may elect to end participation at any time after the last billed debit has occurred.

Traditional payment methods are also available by using payment boxes located outside the front door of Village Hall and in the downtown parking garage next to the library book return. You may also make payments in person at the Finance Department on the first floor of Village Hall.





## A Brief Q&A Regarding Storm Water Pollution

### What is storm water pollution?

When it rains, some of the rainwater soaks into the ground and part of it flows over the ground directly into creeks, streams or rivers. This water that runs off into the river is called runoff, or sometimes, storm water runoff. Occasionally this storm water runoff gets polluted. Pollution is anything that harms natural resources, whether it is air, soil, or in this case, water. Sometimes the pollution is something you can see, like trash floating on top of the water. Other times you can't see the pollution at all, such as when motor oil from a car washes into a nearby creek. Polluted runoff is the number one cause of water pollution in the United States.

### Why is storm water pollution a concern?

It is of concern for two main reasons – one related to the volume and timing of runoff water and the other related to potential contaminants that the water is carrying from human and animal activities. These contaminants are picked up as water from a storm or garden hoses and sprinklers drain from streets, parking lots and lawns, and enter the system through our catch basins and storm drains. From there, they are transferred straight to rivers and streams untreated. Anything that is dumped or dropped on the ground or in the gutter contributes to storm water pollution.

### Is storm water treated before it reaches the river?

No, storm water systems flow directly into the rivers, lakes and streams. The cost of treating storm water would be so high that it would exceed available resources.

### Is there a difference between a storm drain and a sewer drain?

Yes, they are two completely separate drainage systems. The sewer system takes all household wastewater from toilets, showers and sinks and routes it through your plumbing system and directs it to a treatment plant. The storm drain is intended to route rainwater quickly off the streets during a heavy storm. Unfortunately, it takes all

the runoff along with it. Chemicals, trash, debris from lawns, parking lots and streets, either intentionally or accidentally spilled, go straight into our waterways.

Polluted storm water runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals and people.

- Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment can also destroy aquatic habitats.
- Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.
- Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.
- Debris such as plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles and cigarette butts washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water. Polluted storm water often affects drinking water sources. This, in turn, can affect human health and increase drinking water treatment costs.

Let's all work together to lessen the impact of storm water pollution by monitoring what we allow to enter into the natural systems around us.

## Rand-Central-Mount Prospect Intersection Study

The Village Board of Trustees recently awarded a contract to Christopher Burke Engineering Ltd. of Rosemont to study the three closely spaced intersections involving Rand Road, Central Road and Mount Prospect Road, as well as the nearby Rand Road corridor. The intersections form a triangle that experiences traffic issues on a daily basis such as blocked intersections and poor vehicle progression. Timing adjustments have been made over the years by the Illinois Department of Transportation with only minor improvement. The Village of Mount Prospect is committed to developing a plan that will provide long-term enhancements to the area transportation system that will benefit motorists, pedestrians, bicyclists, transit riders, and nearby businesses. The study will not only consider improvements to the intersections and roadways but

also improvements to sidewalk & bike paths, driveways to businesses, lighting, and drainage.

The Village's consultant is currently collecting data and developing various alternative designs. We also want your input. The Village will be creating a webpage dedicated to the study that will provide more information and a questionnaire. We encourage residents to share experiences and ideas to assist in the study. The Village will also host an Open House to give the community an opportunity to provide input on this important project. The study, which will culminate with a preferred design, is expected to be completed in 2018.



## Check Your Sewer Cleanouts and Reduce Basement Backups

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRDGC) collects and treats all of the sanitary sewer waste from the Village and also works to reduce the amount of rain water, often called clearwater, that can flow into their interceptor

sewers through their Inflow and Infiltration Control Program (IICP). The MWRDGC has found that improperly sealed or open cleanouts on private sanitary sewer laterals are one of the largest sources of clearwater into their interceptors. These poorly sealed or open pipes become direct connections for storm water to enter the sewers in times of wet weather. This excess storm water causes the pipes to become surcharged which leads to local basement backup. Over 65% of the Village is located within a separate sanitary sewer basin, so the Village is asking that all homeowners check their cleanouts to ensure they are properly sealed to prevent clearwater inflow into the sewers. Please help prevent sewer backups by ensuring that your cleanouts are capped and properly sealed.

## Prevent Sewer Gas from Building Up in Your Home

The traps in floor drains that haven't been used often, will eventually dry out, causing a room to fill with sewer gas from the Village's sewer system. Traps need to have a layer of water sitting in the lower portion to prevent sewer gases from entering your home. You can eliminate these problems with a little fresh water topped with cooking oil. The oil floats on top of the water and seals it against evaporation allowing your drain to hold water in the trap much longer.

## Refuse Carts

If your current refuse and/or recycling carts are not meeting your needs you may exchange the cart(s) for a different size at no charge to you. Refuse and recycling carts are available in 35, 65, and 95 gallon capacities.

The Village also offers additional carts for households needing increased refuse and recycling capacity. Additional refuse carts can be purchased for a one time non-refundable fee of \$25 per cart, regardless of size. Households desiring more than two recycling carts will be charged a one time non-refundable rental fee of \$25 for each recycling cart regardless of size. Please contact the Public Works department at 847.870.5640 to request an exchange or additional cart.

When storing your carts, please adhere to the following rules:

- Carts and yard waste containers may be stored in the garage, side or back of property.
- If carts or yard waste containers are stored on the side of a corner house facing the adjacent street, they must be screened by bushes or a fence.
- Carts or yard waste containers may not be stored in front of the property. Storing carts in front of the property is a violation of Village Code and may result in a citation.
- Carts or yard waste containers may not be placed at the curb earlier than 4:30 p.m. the day before collection.
- Carts may not be left at the curb beyond your scheduled collection day. Leaving carts at the curb beyond your scheduled collection day is a violation of Village Code and may result in a citation.
- Multi-Family Residents (town home) – check with your association, which may have further restrictions for cart storage.

## Summertime Checklist for Residents and Homeowners

### ☐ Watering Restrictions

As part of the Lake Michigan water allocation program, water suppliers are required to restrict outdoor water use. Restrictions are in place to ensure that there is a continuous adequate water supply for drinking, bathing and fire protection. Water conservation measures are an important first step in protecting our water supply.

The Village has set the following regulations to help monitor the effective use of our water supply:

- Watering and/or sprinkling shall be permitted for odd numbered addresses on odd numbered dates and for even numbered addresses on even numbered dates. All watering and/or sprinkling should only take place between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 10:00 a.m.
- Newly sodded areas of lawns may be watered at any time on any day for the two week period following the installation of the sod.

These rules are in effect seven (7) days a week. If you have any questions, please call Public Works at 847.870.5640

### ☐ Caring for New Trees

To help ensure the Village's urban forest thrives, the Forestry/Grounds Division is asking residents to continue to pay close attention to proper tree watering this summer. Young trees should receive at least one inch of water every seven to ten days during the first few years. Thorough, deep watering is much better than frequent shallow ones.

Not enough water can cause serious stress to trees. Primary effects occur as various plant tissues dry and become desiccated. This type of damage occurs to the leaves, twigs and roots. You may notice a yellowing and browning of the leaves, first along the margins, then progressing toward the center of the leaves. Prolonged drought will also cause the death of fine roots. This inhibits water absorption into the tree, reducing the vitality of the plant. Secondary effects include stress, which can inhibit the production of defensive chemicals in trees, making them more susceptible to climate extremes, such as winter injury, high winds and sunscald. Trees may also become more vulnerable to insect and disease pathogens. Established trees, although generally fine with normal precipitation, may need water in extreme dry or hot periods. You can contact Public Works for more tips on how to keep your trees properly watered.

### ☐ Hydrant Flushing this Summer

Designated fire hydrants in the Village will be flushed this summer. The project will occur during normal working hours allowing staff time to perform checks on the hydrants, tests on the water quality and to capture more inventory data about each hydrant. Village crews will be placing notice signs at the entrance points to the section of the neighborhood being flushed each week. After the hydrants in your neighborhood have been flushed, please run your tap water before using it for cooking, drinking or laundry as some rust or other stain producing particles may remain. These stain-producing particles remain only briefly in the water, giving your water a slightly rusty tinge which should disappear within a few minutes if you leave the tap on. Be careful as these particles may stain your laundry.

## Leave the Fireworks to the Professionals!

Each 4th of July holiday, thousands of people across the U.S., mostly children, are seriously injured in fireworks related incidents. About one-third of those incidents result in permanent eye damage. Did you know that sparklers reach temperatures of up to 1800°F and remain hot enough to cause serious burns even after they are extinguished? Children and teenagers sustain forty-four percent of these injuries with sparklers accounting for one-third of the injuries to children under five. Due to the hazards and injuries associated with fireworks, the Village of Mount Prospect prohibits all types of fireworks, including sparklers.

The Mount Prospect Fire Department wants all of our residents to have a safe 4th of July celebration by enjoying our spectacular, and professional, fireworks display at Melas Park and by keeping fireworks out of the hands of children.

## Grilling Safety Tips

While everyone enjoys cooking on the grill in the summer, July is the leading month for grill fires. To have a safe and enjoyable summer grilling, follow these simple tips:

- Check your gas tank hose for leaks by applying a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles.
- Place your grill well away from your home, deck, railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Always open your gas grill lid before lighting it.
- When finished using a charcoal grill, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

The most important thing to remember is to never leave grilling unattended.

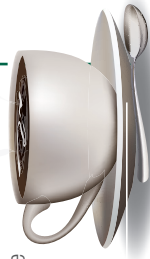
