

Economic Development Update

Small Triangle Redevelopment:

The Village Board recently approved a mixed-use development for the small triangle area located at the northwest corner of Northwest Highway and Main Street. Heimbaugh Capital Development Corporation will pursue the construction of 97 residential condominiums and 31,000 square feet of restaurant and retail space. The project includes a public pedestrian courtyard that will allow for outdoor dining and public events and several landscaped rooftop terraces for the residents of the development. Heimbaugh will construct a 291 space parking structure that will provide 126 customer spaces and 165 private residential spaces. The Village anticipates that construction will begin in the spring of 2009 and that occupancy will occur by the end of 2010.

Holiday Inn:

The former Ramada Inn located at 200 E. Rand Road has been purchased by an investor and is currently being remodeled as a Holiday Inn Hotel. The new owner plans on opening a small banquet room and full service restaurant within the facility and completely remodeling the 120 hotel rooms. The \$4 million renovation is expected to be completed by August.

Victoria Banquets:

Victoria Banquets is renovating the former Chicago Title and Trust building located at 1700 S. Elmhurst Road. Once complete, the full service banquet facility will have capacity for approximately 300 guests. Victoria anticipates opening for business in August.

Greenest Region Compact

Village offering CFLs

Earlier this year, the Village Board adopted a resolution endorsing the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus' Greenest Region Compact. The Compact outlines a number of cost-effective environmental sustainability measures that enhance health and safety, reduce the consumption of energy and fossil fuels, conserve water, and reduce hazardous and solid waste, and air pollution emissions.



One of goals of the Compact is to increase use of compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs and to improve public awareness of their energy efficiency and cost-savings benefits. Did you know that CFLS use up to 75% less energy than incandescent light bulbs and last up to 10 times longer? In fact, CFLs can save approximately \$30 or more in electricity costs over each bulb's lifetime.

The Village recently received 14,000 free CFL bulbs from the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus to help achieve this goal. The CFLs are available at the Public Works Department, 1700 W. Central Road, during our normal business hours (Monday-Friday 7:30–5:00 p.m.) You can exchange a couple of old compact fluorescent light bulbs for new CFLs. Please do not bring your old incandescent bulbs. They can be safety disposed of in your regular garbage.

While the Village is committed to an ongoing CFL recycling program (you can bring in OLD CFLs any time), the free replacement CFLs are available only while supplies last. Limited quantities are available. Limit 10 bulbs per household.

> As a reminder, CFLs contain a very small amount of mercury vapor which can contaminate the environment if not properly recycled. Residents can bring their CFLs and four foot fluorescents to the Public Works Department during normal business hours for recycling. CFLs should be brought to Public Works unbroken and in a zip lock bag.

News, Notes & Reminders

Changes to Noise Ordinance

The Village Board has received a variety of noise complaints from commercial delivery and early morning lawn care activities. In an effort to classify the noise regulations and enforcement, the Village Board amended the Village Code on April 15, 2008. Enforcement of the revised noise regulations will be on a "complaint only basis" which would require a resident who is being disturbed by excessive noise as defined in the ordinance to call the police and be willing to sign a complaint form and potentially attend a court or administrative adjudication hearing. Highlights of the ordinance are as follows:

- Prohibition of loading and unloading a commercial vehicle (except moving and delivery activities) in a residential district between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- Run the engine and/or refrigeration unit of a parked commercial vehicle between 7:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. in a residential district.
- Operate percussion tools, power tools, power lawn tools or power construction equipment between 7:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. in a residential district.

If residents do experience noise which they believe is in violation of this ordinance they should call 911 to report it to the police. Enforcement of this ordinance may require residents to sign complaints and appear in court or administrative adjudication hearing.

Did You Purchase Your 2008-2009 Vehicle Sticker?

The deadline for displaying 2008-2009 vehicle stickers was April 30. The Police Department is now issuing citations to drivers of locally registered vehicles on which 2008-2009 vehicle stickers are not displayed. The penalty will not initially apply to new Village residents or to residents who have purchased replacement vehicles after May 1. In either case, you have 30 days to purchase your sticker. During the grace period, proof of purchase or move-in date will be required to assure that a surcharge penalty is not imposed if you change vehicles during the year. Water Quality Report



In this issue you will find the Village of Mount Prospect Water System 2007 Consumer Confidence Report (see insert). This report will provide residents and businesses served by the Village-owned water

distribution system with the information about Mount Prospect's water supply. The report is a requirement of the 1996 Safe Drinking Water Act amendments. It summarizes where your water came from, what it was made of, and how it compared to the standards established by regulatory agencies.

Plan ahead - are you and your neighbors planning to hold a block party this summer? Remember that in order to get the street blocked, you must complete and turn in a Block Party Request Form. Village Awarded Transportation Grant

The Village was recently awarded \$125,000 from the Regional Transportation Authority to evaluate the Village's current level of service, usage, and access to Metra, Pace and bicycle routes and provide recommendations for enhanced service. The Village will be holding a series of public meetings to solicit input from residents and business owners about the needs of the public transportation system in Mount Prospect and potential redevelopment opportunities in the STAR Line station area. FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Direct Debit Program

The Village is now offering a new payment option for your Water/Sewer and Refuse utility bill. You may now opt to pay through direct debit of your checking or savings account. The funds will be withdrawn on the due date, thus avoiding late fees. Authorization forms are available on our website, www.mountprospect.org. Listed below are some FAQs about the program. If you still have questions after reading this, please contact utility billing at 392-6000.



Q. Is there a fee to utilize the Direct Debit Program?

A. No; there is no fee associated with the Direct Debit Program.

Q. When will my initial Direct Debit occur?

A. Once your completed enrollment form is received, it will undergo a "prenotification" process where a test transaction (zero dollar amount) is created and used to verify the accuracy of the account information provided. You will know when automatic direct debit payments are scheduled to begin when you receive your utility bill and it indicates "Bank Draft – Do Not Pay". Please continue to make payments until that time.

Q. When will funds be debited from my account?

A. The determined amount will be transferred from your bank account on the due date listed on the utility bill. If the due date falls on a weekend or holiday, your account will be debited on the following business day.

Q. Who is responsible for the availability of funds?

A. You are responsible for having enough money in the designated account on your payment date for the actual or estimated usage billed. Usage will be estimated based on previous history if an actual reading was not received. It is your responsibility to review your bill prior to the automatic bank draft date. If you foresee an issue with the amount to be debited, it is necessary for you to contact us at 392-6000 at least ten (10) days prior to the scheduled bank draft date. As with checks returned for non-sufficient funds, there is a \$20 NSF charge on all returned items. Direct Debit Pay will be canceled if two payments are returned within a twelve (12) month period.

Q. Will I Have A Record of Payments?

A. Your monthly bank statement will indicate the amount and date of your automatic transfer. If a question arises regarding your transfer or if the amount differs from your bill, you must notify us and your financial institution within sixty (60) days of the date of the questioned statement. Your financial institution will advise you of your rights concerning the error.

Q How Do I Submit My Water Meter Reading?

A. If you choose to take advantage of the direct debit program, it is still necessary to provide a water meter reading. You may submit the reading via our website @ www.mountprospect.org by clicking on quick links and scrolling down to water meter reading; or submit the reading via your bill stub; or submit the reading verbally by calling 392-6000.

Parking Spaces Available

Village Hall Deck Overnight Guest Parking Passes Now Available

Parking on Village streets between the hours of 2 am and 6 am is prohibited. Overnight guest parking is permitted in the Village Hall Parking Deck on Level 4 in Spaces 282-316. Parking passes for the Village Hall Parking Deck are available to any resident of Mount Prospect for their overnight guests.

Each guest pass is valid for 3 days (pass will be stamped with valid dates) and an applicant/household/vehicle may have 3 consecutive passes for a total of 9 consecutive days. Passes must be clearly displayed in the rear window of the vehicle. The passes will be administered on a first come, first served basis. They are available in the Finance Department on the first floor of Village Hall, Monday through Friday 8:30 am - 5:00 pm.

Business/Commuter Spaces

Parking spaces are available for yearly rental in the Wille Street Parking Lot (near the downtown Metra Train station). Please note: overnight parking is not allowed. The spaces are available to Mount Prospect residents or Mount Prospect business owners/employees only. A specific space in the lot is assigned for one year and can be renewed annually. The cost per space is \$360/year for residents.

Overnight Residential Parking

There are also parking spaces available for a fee to residents of the Shabonee Trail and Mount Prospect townhome associations. Certain restrictions apply. For information or to purchase a parking permit, call Lisa in the Finance Department at 818-5277.

ACROSS THE BOARD

Since the last publication of the Mount Prospect Newsletter, the Village Board of Trustees has enacted the following ordinances from February 20, 2008 through May 27, 2008:

5679 amends Chapter 4 (Appointive Village Officers) Articles VIII and IX and Chapter 5 (Boards and Commissions) Article III of the Village Code; Board of Fire and Police Commission;

5680 grants a variation to allow a second (2nd) driveway for property commonly known as 1750 Azalea Lane;

5681 amends the official zoning map of the Village of Mount Prospect to rezone property located at 1040 West Northwest Highway from B-1 (Business Office) to R-2 (Attached single family residence);

5682 grants a Conditional Use permit for a Planned Unit Development, fourteen (14) unit townhome development for property located at 1040 W. Northwest Highway;

5683 amends Chapter 19 (Health Regulations) Article VIII, entitled "Clean Air Regulations" by adopting standards for outside smoking shelters;

5684-A amends the official zoning map of the Village of Mount Prospect for property at 1700 East Euclid Avenue, 1303 Wolf Road and Com Ed ROW; rezoned from CR Conservation Recreation to B-4 Commercial Corridor District; 5684-B grants a Conditional Use permit and variations for property located at 1700 East Euclid Avenue, 1303 Wolf Road and Com Ed ROW; mixed-use development;

5685 amends the code of ordinances of Village of Mount Prospect, Chapter 11, Section 2808 "Loud Noises and Speaking Devices," Chapter 12, Section 102, "Food Service Regulations," Chapter 13, Section 121 "Entertainment," Chapter 14, Section 307.D., "Standards for Home Occupations," Chapter 18 Section 1528.D. "Horns and Warning Devices," Chapter 23, Section 704 "Restrictions," Chapter 23, Section 1403.1 "Prohibited Activities within a Residential Zoning District," and Section 1403.H "Enumeration of Nuisances," and Chapter 25, Section 102 "Construing this Code," to appropriate requirements of noise restrictions.

5686 reserves Volume Cap in connection with Private Activity Bond issues and related matters of the Village of Mount Prospect for calendar year 2008;

5687 amends Chapter 18 (Traffic) of the Village Code by implementing components of the Village's Residential Intersection "Traffic Control" program and "Residential Speed Limit program, Zones 11, 16 an 18;

5688 grants a Conditional Use permit for a vocational school (sports training facility) Athletic Barn, for property located at 1920 Carboy Road;

5689 amends Chapter 18 (Traffic) Section 1322 "Pay Parking Zones" of the Village Code.

5690 authorizes the acquisition of TIF property through condemnation or otherwise in the tax increment redevelopment project area for property located at (108 South Main Street);

5691 amends Chapter 13 (Alcoholic Liquors) of the Village Code by deleting (1) Class "R" (restaurant only) liquor license for Cuisine Korea, Inc. d/b/a Kim's Restaurant, 1827 W. Algonquin Road and (1) Class "W" liquor license (restaurant, wine and beer only) for Rosati's, 1629 S. Busse Road;

5692 grants a Conditional User permit and variations for a Planned Unit Development, three (3) unit rowhome development for property located at 309-313 W. Prospect Avenue;

5693 grants a Conditional Use permit and variation for a Planned Unit Development/ Mixed-Use Commercial and Residential for Phase 1 of the Mount Prospect Town Center commonly referred to as the "small triangle," sub-area #1.

Voter Registration

Voter registration is available in the Village Clerk's office, Monday – Friday, 8:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. You must present two forms of identification with at least one showing your current address. To be eligible to vote in the General Election you must be registered to vote by October 7th. If you have moved or changed your name since the last election you need to re-register.

Voter registration requirements:

- United States Citizen
- At least 18 years of age by Election Day (High School Students If you are 18 or will be 18 by November 4th, be sure to register to vote and be a part of the electoral process.)
- A resident of your precinct for at least 30 days prior to an election.

Single Family Rehab Loans Available

Leaky roof...bad plumbing...old windows..but can't afford the replacement? Maybe we can help.

The Village's Single-Family Rehabilitation Loan Program provides an interest-free loan up to \$25,000, which is repaid upon sale or change in title of the property. The Home Weatherization Grant Program provides a \$1,500 matching grant to be used for energy efficiency improvements.

Loans are available to low-income Mount Prospect residents who have owned and occupied their home for a minimum of one year and can be used to correct housing code violations, increase energy efficiency, make improvements for disabled persons and more.

Where does this money come from?

The Rehabilitation Loan and Grant Programs are funded through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds allocated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

How do I know if my income qualifies?

The Village uses the Adjusted Gross Income from the previous year's Federal Tax Form. HUD's income limits, which are based on the total income of all people living in the home, change on an annual basis. 2008 Household income limits for one person is \$42,200, 2 persons \$48,250, 3 persons \$54,250, 4 persons \$60,300. Can I do the work myself?

The Village uses pre-qualified contractors to bid on rehabilitation projects and payment can only be made directly to the contractor hired for the job.

Can I replace my garage roof?

Repairs to detached garages or other out-buildings are not typically eligible expenses.

Preventing West Nile Virus

What can you do to reduce your risk of becoming infected with West Nile virus? The Centers for Disease Control offers these preventive measures that you and your family can take:

- Apply insect repellent to exposed skin.
 - Repellents may irritate the eyes and mouth, so avoid applying repellent to the hands of children.
 - Whenever you use an insecticide or insect repellent, be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's DIRECTIONS FOR USE, as printed on the product.
 - Spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin or another EPA-registered repellent since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing. Do not apply repellents containing permethrin directly to exposed skin. Do not apply repellent to skin under your clothing.
- When weather permits, wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants whenever you are outdoors.
- Place mosquito netting over infant carriers when you are outdoors with infants.
- Consider staying indoors at dawn, dusk, and in the early evening, which are peak mosquito biting times.
- Install or repair window and door screens so that mosquitoes cannot get indoors.

Help reduce the number of mosquitoes in areas outdoors where you work or play, by draining sources of standing water. In this way, you reduce the number of places mosquitoes can lay their eggs and breed.

- At least once or twice a week, empty water from flower pots, pet food and water dishes, birdbaths, swimming pool covers, buckets, barrels, and cans.
- Check for clogged rain gutters and clean them out.
- Remove discarded tires, and other items that could collect water.
- Be sure to check for containers or trash in places that may be hard to see, such as under bushes or under your home.

Village Requires Contractors to be Licensed

According to Village Code 11.901, all contractors doing work in the Village must obtain an annual license from the Village. Since the storms last August, we have had several reports of door-to-door solicitation of contractors and handy-men willing to repair resident homes for whatever the homeowners insurance would pay. In all instances, when the homeowners contacted the Building Division to verify licenses, these contractors were unlicensed. While the Village cannot suggest or recommend contractors for your project, we can verify that they have a current Village of Mount Prospect Contractor's License.

In addition to the Village License, roofing and plumbing contractors also require State Licensing. The Building Division only issues Licenses to these tradesmen upon proof of current State Licenses.

Home improvement is a significant investment in your most valuable asset and that old adage "you get what you pay for" applies to hiring a contractor. The Building Division would like to remind residents that the lowest priced contractor is not always the best value. Some things you can do to ensure you are hiring a licensed, reputable contractor:

- Ask to see their current 2008 Village of Mount Prospect Contractor's License or, call the Building Division 870-5675 to verify status.
- · Ask for bids from more than one contractor.
- Ask for references in the area; you can call or even drive by and see their work in person.
- Check with the Better Business Bureau or Angie's List for negative reports.

Project and Permit Reminders

Spring and summer are the busiest time of year for the Building Division. This means that inspection times are filling up quickly and review times can take a little longer.

Plan Review

Projects requiring plan review are routed to several departments to ensure code compliance.

Substantial projects and those requiring Engineering review, can take up to 30 business days for review.

As a courtesy, the Building Division offers pre-submittal meetings - these meetings are free of charge

but do require an appointment. During this meeting our Permit Coordinator will verify that your application is complete and includes all the necessary information to help your project through the review process. Contact the Building Division at 870-5675 to schedule your appointment with our Permit Coordinator.

Inspection Scheduling

The Building Division strives to provide inspection appointments to our residents within 48 hours of your call. With construction season in full-swing, we are experiencing very high call volumes and requests for inspections. Your cooperation in scheduling inspection appointments at least 24 hours ahead of time is greatly appreciated!

Permit Expiration and Bond Forfeiture

Permits and inspection bonds (deposits) are valid for ONE YEAR from the date of issuance. If your project is going to run over the allowed 12 months, you must request a permit extension from the Village Manager's Office. The requests should be addressed to the Village Manager, routed to the Building Division and must include the project address, the permit number and the reason for your request. Permits that are allowed to expire with no extension request are subject to forfeiture of all remaining bond money and may be required to completely reapply for the permit with repayment of all permit fees and inspection bonds.

PUBLIC WORKS

Who Takes Care of Parkway Trees?

There are approximately 25,000 "parkway trees" on public right-of-way along the Village's streets. The Public Works Department's Forestry/Grounds Division periodically inspects and maintains all of these trees and keeps a computerized inventory of all maintenance performed on them. All parkway trees are pruned on an approximate five-year cycle, budget permitting, by either Village crews or qualified contractors.

Sometime citizens are not certain whether a tree near their home is considered a "parkway tree". Any tree growing in the public right-of-way (ROW), regardless of who planted it, is considered to be a parkway tree. In many cases the ROW can be defined as the area between the sidewalk and the street. However, this may not be as easily defined in areas where the sidewalk is attached to the curb or there is no sidewalk at all. There is no set distance from the curb that the ROW extends toward the property; this distance can vary from street to street. Trees that appear to be on private property may actually be parkway trees. When in doubt, citizens should call Public Works for clarification.

Parkway trees may not be removed without a valid reason, as determined by the Forestry/Grounds Division. When tree removals are needed, they are performed either by Village crews or qualified contractors hired by the Village. Homeowners and private contractors may not remove parkway trees without obtaining a tree removal permit first. Those who do so may be fined as much as \$150.00 per diameter inch for the tree removed. Any issues with trees in the ROW should be brought to the attention of Public Works. If the ownership of the tree is in question, Public Works will send out a staff member to clarify ownership.

The Village also hires contractors to plant trees in the ROW. This is done twice annually, once in the spring and once in the fall. Residents who have a planting site can participate in the Village's Cost Share program for tree planting. Homeowners are allowed to plant on their own, or have a contractor plant on the ROW, only after obtaining a free permit from Public Works. The Village requires that species and spacing regulations are followed; these must be approved before a permit is issued. The Village will reimburse the homeowner for a portion of permitted tree(s) that are properly planted.

Gearing up for Fall Planting

Even though summer's just begun, it's not too early to start thinking about fall tree planting!!! The Forestry/Grounds Division is hoping we'll have many Cost-Share tree planting requests this season, because trees provide so many long-term benefits to Mount Prospect. Additionally, trees will also be available to purchase for private property.

Besides their obvious beauty, well-maintained trees have been proven in numerous studies to provide overlooked community benefits, such as increased property values, reduction of stormwater runoff and pollution, and even increased mental well-being for citizens.

Cost-share trees may be planted on publicly owned parkways in Mount Prospect wherever there is adequate room and proper growing conditions, as defined by Village Code. The amount of room required varies by tree species; minimum spacing between trees ranges from 20 to 40 feet. Interested property owners should contact the Public Works Department no later than August 1, 2008. Species selection and payment will be due in mid August.

As in the past, the fall 2008 program will offer citizens a list of roughly 8 to 10 tree species, all selected for their suitability as parkway trees. The species mix will include a selection of small, medium, and large-growing species. Although tree prices have risen over the years, the Village has decided to hold the property owner's share of the cost to \$100 for each $2'' - 2\frac{1}{2}$ " diameter tree. The cost includes both installation and a one-year guarantee.

In addition to the parkway trees, residents will also be able to take part in the private property planting program which will also offer a variety of tree species. Property owners purchasing private plantings will have to pay the full cost of each $2'' - 2\frac{1}{2}''$ diameter tree. Prices are expected to range from \$275.00 to \$395.00 for each private tree, depending on species.

Recycling/Refuse Carts

Cart Exchange

If your current refuse and/ or recycling carts are not meeting your needs you may exchange the cart(s) for a different size. There is no cost for exchanging carts. Refuse and recycling carts are available in 35, 65, and 95 gallon capacity.

The Village also offers additional carts for households needing additional refuse and

recycling capacity. Additional refuse carts can be purchased for a one time non-refundable rental fee of \$25 for each additional refuse cart regardless of size. Households are allowed one free recycling cart in addition to the recycling cart originally provided by the Village. Households desiring more then two recycling carts will be charged a one time non-refundable rental fee of \$25 for each recycling cart regardless of size in excess of two carts.

Please contact the Public Works department at 870-5640 to request an exchange or additional cart.

Cart Storage

- Carts and yard waste containers may be stored in the garage, side or back of property.
- Corner houses if carts or yard waste containers are stored on the side of the house facing the adjacent street, they must be screened (by bushes or a fence).
- DO NOT store carts or yard waste containers in front of the property. Storing carts in front of the property is a violation of Village Code and may result in a citation.
- DO NOT place carts or yard waste containers at the curb earlier then 4:30PM the day before collection.
- DO NOT leave carts at the curb beyond your scheduled collection day. Leaving carts at the curb beyond your scheduled collection day is a violation of Village Code and may result in a citation.

Sparklers reach temperatures of up to 1800 degrees Fahrenheit and remain hot enough to cause serious burns even after they are extinguished. The Mount Prospect Fire Department wishes all a happy and safe 4th of July celebration and requests everyone to leave the fireworks to the professionals who have been trained to use them safely.

High Rise Safety

Whether you live, work, visit, or even stay in a high rise hotel during your summer travels, it is important to be prepared for any type of high rise building emergency. The Fire Department offers the following high rise emergency guidelines:

- Familiarize yourself with two exit routes out of the building. Remember when you check-in a hotel or visit an office in a high rise building, take a few moments to find the two closest exits.
- If a fire is in your condominium, office suite or hotel room, leave the unit closing the door behind you. Proceed to the nearest stairwell. If a fire alarm pull station is present, pull the handle to set off the building's fire alarm.
- If the building's fire alarm sounds and the fire is not in your condominium, office suite or hotel room Make it a habit to always evacuate a building whenever the fire alarm is activated. Prior to exiting your unit, feel the door and door knob of the exit door with the back of your hand and check to see if the door or door knob is hot.
- If you are in a hallway and there is smoke or fire, proceed to the nearest stairwell. If there is no smoke in the stairwell proceed down the stairs or to the exit closing the door behind you. If you are unable to walk down the stairs, remain in the stairwell off to the side to enable others to evacuate. Remain calm and wait for help. If there is a working cellular telephone available, call 911 and tell them exactly where you are.
- In all cases, stay alert! There may be instructions given over the public address system. Remember
 that if you are in an area where there is smoke, stay as low to the ground as possible. IN CASE OF
 FIRE, DO NOT USE ELEVATORS.

Residential Burglaries

Unfortunately there has been a slight increase in residential burglaries in Mount Prospect. Opportunity to commit crime is one of the main contributing factors in why residential burglaries occur. The following list provides some examples of what can be done to help prevent a burglary of your home:

- Ensure all windows and doors are locked. Use a heavy-duty deadbolt with a 1" or greater throw. Install vertical bolts to prevent sliding glass doors from being taken off the track. Place a metal rod or similar object in the track of the sliding glass door to prevent it from being opened.
- Use adequate exterior lighting. The use of motion activated lights is encouraged.
- Trim trees and shrubs near your home. Excessive landscape, trees, and shrubs near the home may provide hiding places for burglars and "peeping toms". If you choose to have shrubbery near the home, attempt to plant trees and or bushes that have many thorns, under and around lower story windows.

GPS Units Most Desirable for Thieves

GPS devices' small size, portability, and street value make them among the most sought after items for thieves prowling among parked cars - to the extent that their presence may actually create crimes. The Mount Prospect Police Department reminds owners to lock their vehicles and remove GPS units and other valuables from parked vehicles. Also to remove telltale signs that the vehicle may contain a GPS unit, namely the mounts and the marks left on the windshield by their suction cups. These two simple crime prevention

tips lessen the chance of you being the victim of a burglary to motor vehicle and could save you hundreds of dollars in loses and damage.



- Lock all vehicles kept outside the home. Don't leave garage remotes or valuables in vehicles parked outside your home.
- Install a peephole on the front door and use it. Don't open the door to anyone you do not know. If the unknown person at your front door is claiming an emergency or dire circumstance, don't open the door. Tell them you will call "911" while they wait outside.
- Get to know your neighbors. Be aware of your surroundings and get involved with neighborhood activities.
- When on vacation, suspend any newspaper subscriptions. Have mail forwarded to the vacation address or held at the post office. Try to have family, friends, or neighbors watch the property.
- If you arrive at home and see your front door or windows open, or see other signs of forced entry into your home, don't go in! The intruder may still be inside, immediately find the nearest phone and call the police (911).

The Mount Prospect Police Department conducts free home security surveys. This comprehensive survey will be able to identify security deficiencies that could allow a burglar easier access to your home. Citizens' Police Academy

Traffic Unit

The Police Department's Traffic Unit was instituted in 2007 with the purpose of maintaining a climate where motorists and pedestrians feel comfortable and safe while moving about the community. The traffic unit is led by Sergeant Michael Eterno, who leads two officers assigned to the unit. The Traffic Unit employs unmarked police vehicles, each of which are equipped with three different state of-the-art speed detection (radar) systems that afford officers a great deal of flexibility when deploying radar in the field. Medicare Phone Scam

We remind residents to be on alert for a new Medicare Phone Scam. Recently, a suburban resident received a phone call from someone who said the following: "I have to send you a new Medicare Card." When the resident began to ask questions of the caller and requested a return telephone number, the caller threatened to cut off her Social Security. She hung up and called her local police to alert them of the scam. If you receive a similar phone, remember do not give out any information, and be sure to notify the Crime Prevention Unit at 870-5650.

Mentor Program Seeks Volunteers

Each year, teachers and social workers from five local schools identify at-risk children whom they feel would benefit from our mentoring program. During the school year, volunteers are paired in a school-based, one-on-one relationship, with the aim of helping a child toward a more promising future. The curriculum includes creative learning games, hands-on projects, noncompetitive sports, and guest speakers. Volunteers meet one night per week at a local school, and participate in one-on-one and group activities. The program begins the third week of September and consists of two ten week sessions during

Annual Blood Test

The blood test will consist of a Lipid Panel (T Chol, Triglycerides, LDL, HDL), Chemistry Profile (Albumin, BUN, Creatinine, Electrolytes, T Bili, Calcium, Alk Phos, T Protein, SGOT, Glucose) and a Complete Blood Count for \$30.00 for all three tests. For men, a PSA (prostate cancer screening) blood test will also be offered at \$20.00. Payment will be accepted at the time of the test. Appointments for the blood test must be made in advance by calling 1-877-RES-INFO or 1-877-737-4636 beginning July 15, 2008.

NOTE: Due to the Annual Blood Test held on Friday, September 12, the Thursday, September 11 Cholesterol Screening Clinic will be canceled.

Health Screening

Increase Your Car's Fuel Efficiency

With record high fuel prices, fuel efficiency has never been more important. Follow these steps for better gas mileage:

Step1: Take anything out that you do not need that will weigh the car down. The heavier the car, the more gas it takes to pull it. Make sure your golf clubs and other equipment from your car.



Step 2: Take off any extras that decreases

the aerodynamic quality of your car. Removing that bike rack will increase the aerodynamics of the car and use less gas in the process.

Step 3: Keep it Maintained. Change your oil and fluids regularly. Keep oil filters clean and this will help you burn less fuel.

Step 4: Check your tires regularly. When your tires are properly inflated, you burn less fuel. The next article will provide more information regarding this issue.

Step 5: Slow and steady saves the gas. Driving the speed limit will use less fuel. More fuel is pumped through when you hit the accelerator. (www.ehow.com)

Just so upu know...

Plan to change your motor oil every 3,000 miles or every 3 months if you want to be on the safe side, but know that most cars no longer require an oil change after every 3,000 miles. You will not damage the engine by letting it run 4,000 miles in between oil changes.

However, if you've been driving in very hot and/or dusty conditions you should stick to the 3,000 mile schedule, or even more frequent changes.

If your car is still feeling sluggish, try changing your air filter every 15,000 miles or 12 months. (www.ehow.com)

How to Find a Tire Leak

A tire leak can lead to many problems. The following is a way to find your leak before you are in a tough situation.

- Remove the tire from the vehicle. This allows you to get a good look at the tread area, especially the inboard side of the tire. Inspect the flat tire for any cuts, lacerations or other significant damage. If you find any of these, you can't fix it and must buy a new tire.
- Search the tread for any road hazards embedded in the tire, such as nails or screws. Remove any you find and plug the hole with a tire-plug kit. Continue with the remaining steps as there may be leaks that aren't visible.
- Re-inflate the flat tire to the proper operating pressure and listen for escaping air. If you get very close to the tire, you can usually hear air hissing out of any leaks.
- Circle leaks with a marker. Make a solution of soapy water with kitchen dishwashing liquid. Pour the soap solution on the tire, and places where air is leaking out will create bubbles in the soap solution. Circle any leaks with a marker.

• Take the flat tire to be patched. Even

if you were able to plug the hole, it is only a temporary fix. The only permanent fix for a leaking tire is a patch installed on the inside of the tire by a professional. (www.ehow.com)

Village of Mount Prospect Water System 2007 Consumer Confidence Report



Introduction

The Village of Mount Prospect is dedicated to providing you with an adequate and dependable supply of safe drinking water. As part of this effort, we have prepared this Consumer Confidence Report (CCR). This report will provide residents and businesses served by the Village-owned water distribution system with the information necessary to make prudent decisions about how they use tap water. Please note, information in this CCR does not pertain to Illinois American Water Company water customers. Illinois American Water Company will prepare and distribute a separate CCR for their water customers and they can be reached at 1-800-422-2782.

This report is a requirement of the 1996 Safe Drinking Water Act amendments. It summarizes where your water came from, what it was made of, and how it compared to the standards established by regulatory agencies. Information about water consumed during the reporting year will be made available in a CCR scheduled for distribution during the following year. CCRs will be published in July of each year.

Information in this report describes water consumed during the 2007 calendar year. We are happy to report that the Village-owned water system had no water quality standard violations last year.


Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. 
Where do we get our water?

Our water supply comes from Lake Michigan, one of the five Great Lakes. The lake water is treated and purified by the City of Chicago, Department of Water Management (312-744-6635). The finished drinking water is then pumped to the Northwest Suburban Municipal Joint Action Water Agency (NSMJAWA) reservoirs. NSMJAWA then pumps the water to Mount Prospect and six (6) other northwest suburban communities via large water transmission mains. Three of these mains terminate at receiving structures in Mount Prospect. The structures are situated at various locations throughout the Village. Prior to receiving lake water, the Village pumped water from as many as 17 public deep wells located throughout the Village.



By volume, Lake Michigan is the second largest of the Great Lakes. Hydrologically, it is inseparable from Lake Huron. The total shoreline, including all its islands, is almost 1,640 miles long. All 63 miles of shoreline within Illinois are considered to be in good condition.





- · Microbial contaminants such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- · Inorganic contaminants such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- · Pesticides and herbicides which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- · Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and may also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems; and
- · Radioactive contaminants, which may be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Untreated lake water has the potential to contain these types of contaminants. However, it is important to realize that these materials can be found throughout nature to some degree. Their presence does not necessarily mean that there is a health risk associated with our source water. Rather, the most important factor to consider is how much of a particular contaminant can be found in our source water.


Fortunately, the quality of raw, untreated Lake Michigan water is good. This means that conventional treatment methods, such as disinfection with chlorine, coagulation, and sedimentation with sand filtration can be used effectively to produce large quantities of safe drinking water.

Has an assessment been made of Lake Michigan water?

Yes. The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) completed a Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP). The IEPA implemented the SWAP to assist with watershed protection of public drinking water supplies. The SWAP inventories potential sources of contamination and determines the susceptibility of the source water to contamination. The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality.



At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to

Who decides if water is safe to drink?

In order to make certain that tap water is safe to drink; the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) prescribe regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in the water distributed by public water systems. All public water systems, including the City of Chicago and the Village of Mount Prospect, must monitor their systems and comply with these regulations. Failure to do so is a violation of federal and state laws and can result in severe penalties. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Is Mount Prospect's drinking water safe?

Yes it is. Last year, Mount Prospect complied with all of the federal and state regulations pertaining to the storage and distribution of drinking water. No violations were recorded. The table on Page 3 summarizes the tests that were performed to ensure compliance with water quality standards. Page 4 has additional tables and outlines the definitions associated with this information.

The City of Chicago conducted a number of additional water quality tests as well. In fact, they routinely performed over 70 different water quality tests as part of their raw water treatment process. The results of all of these tests complied with federal and state drinking water regulations. No violations were recorded. In addition to both the Village and the City of Chicago tests, the Village's water distributor, the Northwest Suburban Municipal Joint Action Water Agency (NSMJAWA) also performs a number of water quality tests. No violations were recorded. The results of NWSMJAWA and the City of Chicago's analyses are available to the public and are on file at the Mount Prospect Public Works Facility.

Are there any problems with lead in our water?

No. Village tests for lead and copper content indicate that there are no unhealthy levels of either contaminant in our drinking water. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. [Name of utility] is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking.



If you are concerned about lead in your drinking water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available form the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

Presently, the Village tests for lead and copper content once every three

(3) years. We collect samples from the taps of 30 private homes. These samples are then sent to IEPA laboratories in Champaign, Illinois for analysis. In order to avoid corrective action, the samples at the 90th percentile must be less than the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) established for each contaminant. The table on page 3 summarizes the results of our last round of lead and copper testing, which we completed in 2005. We will test for lead and copper again in the summer of 2008.

It should be noted that infants and young children are more vulnerable to lead in drinking water than the general population. It is possible that lead levels in your home may be higher than in other homes due to the types of materials used in your home's plumbing system. If you are concerned about elevated lead levels in your water, you may wish to have it tested at a local laboratory. Flushing your tap for 2 minutes before using the water will also reduce your risk of lead exposure. Additional information about lead in drinking water is available from the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791. Definitions

ppm - Parts Per Million (same as mg/l) or one ounce in 7,350 gallons of water

ppb - Parts Per Billion (same as ug/l) or one ounce in 7,350,000 gallons of water

#pos/mo - This represents the number of positive samples per month.

%pos/mo - This represents the percentage of positive samples per month.

AL - Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant that triggers treatment or other required actions by the water supply.

ND - Not Detectable: Not found at the testing limits.

NA - Not Applicable.

TT - Treatment Technique.

%<0.5 NTU - Percent of samples less than .5

"Amount" column is an average of all sample result data collected during the CCR calendar year.

NTU - Nephelometric Turbidity Unit, used to measure cloudiness in the drinking water.

"Range of Detections" represents a range of individual sample results, from lowest to highest, taken during the CCR calendar year. "Date of Sample" represents whether the sample was collected during the CCR calendar year or the last time IEPA required samples to be collected. If no date appears, then the sample was collected during the reporting year.

"pCi/L" – Picocuries per liter, used to measure radioactivity.

Turbidity - This is a measurement of how cloudy the water appears. It is monitored because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants.

Sodium - There is no MCL for sodium. However, individuals on a sodium restricted diet should consider consulting a physician about this level of sodium in the water.

Vulnerable Populations

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Important Note

In order to ensure that tap water is safe, USEPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. 


